## Army Clothing Contracts Will Stay In South

ABILENE, June—The West Texas Chamber of Commerce joined in an effort that has just resulted in an OPS ruling that prevented diversion of defense garment contracts to New England "labor distress areas" from the south and southwest.

The Defense Production Act provides that such contracts be awarded to the lowest acceptable bidder. Using the Secretary of Labor's designations of "labor distress areas," the organized labor leaders had sought for months to have defense contracts given New England manufacturers without taking of bids. Their plea was that surpluses of labor exist in the north and northeast.

The OPS decision was to abide by the bid-taking provisions of the law. Southern and southwestern manufacturers are now making 65 per cent of so-called "fatigue garments" for the Armed Forces because they have been able to underbid the New England firms, they declare.

Among those who testified in a May 22 Washington hearing on the issue was A. B. Lankford of T. S. Lankford & Sons, Abilene. He reported that a CIO representative contended that organization and the AFL should place the contracts "because they know the people with the equipment and know-how to do the job."

## Bus Driver At Houston Picks Out Assailant

HOUSTON, June 7, (UP)—A 47-year-old negro carpenter is being held by police today charged with the stabbing of a city bus driver Thursday night.

The Negro is Reese Hightower who surrendered to police late yesterday. He is charged with stabbing bus driver Roy Calvin when Calvin intervened in a fight between the Negro and a white man on his bus.

Both Hightower and the white man ran from the bus after the fight but Calvin identified the suspect in a police lineup last night.

## Building Awards Hit New All Time High Past Month

AUSTIN, June 7, (UP)—The Texas Contractor reports that an all-time total high in construction awards was made during the month of May, a sum of more than 89 million dollars.

The awards total was higher than for any previous May on record. It was approached only by the 88 million 432 thousand dollar total for May, 1950.

Despite the upsurge in construction activity last month, awards for the first five months of 1952 were somewhat below the total over a comparable period last year.

Eleven million dollar projects were put under contract during the month. It was headed by the 18 million dollar General Motors Plant at Arlington, awarded to Thomas S. Byrne Incorporated of Fort Worth.

The Texas Contractor, a trade publication foresees "good" prospects for all types of construction to show increases this summer.

"Home financing," the magazine says "will undoubtedly be eased soon, more steel is becoming available and overall prospects are good for all curbs to be lifted this fall or early next year on construction."

Perrin spent his entire life in Ranger, with the exception of the last ten years in which he has been living in Ft. Worth. He was in the trucking business.

Reverend Jasper C. Messinger, pastor of the Second Baptist Church, will officiate. Interment will be in the Alameda Cemetery. Survivors are his wife of Abilene; two daughters, Mrs. Claude Young, and Mrs. J. W. McElroy both of Odessa; sons are Theron of Odessa, Almas, Bobby Joe, Truman, W. D. and Jimmie, all of Austin; two sisters Mrs. W. F. Allen and Mrs. Virgie Lee of Ranger; three brothers, Henry and Luther of Ranger and Carl of Sundown; three grandchildren also survive.

## Mission Farmer Raises First Bale Of 1952 Cotton

HOUSTON, June 7 (UP)—A 41-year-old Mission Texas farmer reared into Houston in a pickup truck shortly after 2 a.m. this morning with the year's first bale of cotton.

Ray Barnick, weary from four hectic days of cotton picking, stands to gain better than three thousand dollars from his efforts. He says he got the year's first bale because an unkindly weatherman refused to give his crop enough water. Sounds strange but here's the way Barnick explains it.

He says he had no thought of growing the first bale when he planted his cotton January 24th. But the dry weather caused his cotton to mature early. Says Barnick "I would much rather have seen more rain and a field of big green stalks."

It will be Monday however before Barnick actually knows how much his 498-pound bale is worth. The cotton exchange, which annually pays the attractive bonus for the first bale, is closed today.

## Murphy Appointed Manager-Sec'y of Newspaper Group

HOUSTON, June 6—The appointment of John H. Murphy of Houston as Secretary-Manager of the Texas Daily Newspapers Association was announced today by Ray L. Powers, president of the Association and business manager of the Houston Press.

Mr. Powers also announced that officers of the Association have been opened at 808 Milan building in Houston.

Mr. Murphy, well known in Texas newspaper circles, recently resigned as general manager of the Shamrock Publishing Company, ending a five-year association with the Glenn McCarthy interests.

His newspaper work began in 1931 when he joined the sports staff of the Galveston News. In 1937 he joined the editorial staff of The Houston Post. He returned to Galveston in 1938 as news bureau manager for The Post.

Enlisting in the Air Force in 1942, Mr. Murphy served three years. Returning to The Post in 1945, he was real estate and business news editor before resigning to join in forming Suburban Newspapers, Inc. When that group was purchased by Glenn McCarthy in May 1947, he became Vice-President and Editorial Director of all the Citizen papers.

## Potatoes Return To Markets, But At Higher Price

The experts say the American housewife is the boss of the potato the price depends on her bargaining ability.

A United Press survey of markets across the nation shows a big increase in the quantity, and the price, of potatoes. Observers say that both are due to the ending of price controls on white potatoes.

Economists say the housewife can have a major effect on the price by buying at favorable prices.

Elsewhere on the economic scene, officials say the government probably will relax its regulation "X" governing down payments and mortgages on new homes. They predict the federal Reserve Board next week will lower the minimum down payments required, and probably will "smooth down" the deposits required on homes in the 7 to 12 thousand dollar bracket.

## East Germans Taught Use of Arms by Reds

The war of nerves steps up in Germany and Austria.

In Berlin, Russia has told the Allies that it wants Daily payments for use of the railroad connecting West Berlin with West Germany. Previously, the payments were twice a month.

In East Germany, Communist officials have ordered almost all adult and teenage men and women to learn to shoot. They say the training is necessary to defend "The Fatherland."

An American GI who escaped from a Berlin guardhouse last December and wound up in East Germany is back in West Berlin. He is private Ray Schultz of Batavia, New York. The Reds called him a "peace fighter."

Schultz told Army authorities he was arrested by the Reds the day after escaping from jail. He then was forced to work in East German factories. Schultz escaped from a factory and surrendered to American authorities in Berlin. He says he doesn't know what became of two other GIs who escaped with him last December. They were Private Charles Scott of Decatur, Illinois, and Private Sidney Sparks of Tennessee, Georgia.

Meanwhile, the United States has protested an air incident. A note sent to Soviet officials in Austria charges that two Russian jet fighters "endangered" a transport carrying the American High Commissioner Walter Dornley. Dornley charges that the jets "circled at dangerously close range," coming within 250 feet of the slow-moving transport.

The French government again has struck at the Communist party.

Military counter-espionage agents have raided Communist cells in four big ports and naval bases, seeking documents which officials say dealt with the national defense.

The agents hit Red cells in Brest, Lorient, Bordeaux and Toulon. In Toulon, a naval tribunal has charged that the Communist Party was acting against the external security of France "on behalf of a foreign power."

Obviously Russia. Conviction of any Communist leaders for this offense could entail the death penalty.

## Mercury Hits 111 at Presidio; Palacios Gets 5 Inches of Rain

The thermometer at Presidio didn't know when to stop going up yesterday, and at Palacios the rain didn't know when to stop falling. That's the weather story today, and it means, if possible, the victory of the Lone Star state.

Palacios had a real deluge yesterday, almost five inches of rain. Presidio, in Big Bend Country all the way across the state, had no rain but the mercury went to 111 degrees, high for Texas and the nation.

It's coincident that while Presidio's temperature went higher, readings in the rest of Texas went lower. Weathermen say all reported stations had temperatures in the 80's with the one exception. That was a comedown from previous readings this week in the lower 90's in most sections.

Rain also fell at Ackerly, Brownsville, Houston, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Palestine, Galveston, Laredo and Victoria but to lesser degrees. However, Houston had more than one and one-quarter inches and Victoria more than an inch and one-half.

The forecast calls for more scattered showers around the state today and tonight with somewhat warmer temperatures.

## Twelve Firemen Injured in Chicago; Roof Collapses

CHICAGO, June 7 (UP)—At least 12 firemen were injured this morning when the wall of a blazing paper factory collapsed. Some firemen were swept from the roof of a nearby building and other men were buried in debris. Fellow firemen rushed to the aid of the trapped men and dug them out from beneath a pile of bricks and mortar.

The victims are being treated for injuries which include broken legs and arms and skull injuries.

A hospital spokesman says one person has been injured "very seriously."

The firemen were battling a 5-11 alarm fire in a paper box factory when the wall gave in.

So they walked out. The senior Allied delegate, Maj. Gen. William Harrison, told the surprised Communist negotiators he would be back next Tuesday night.

He said the Allies are fed up with Communist stalling and what he called propaganda "drivel."

Today's walkout was the first time in 11 months of truce talks that either side left the conference tent in the middle of a session.

A UN spokesman said the walkout left the Reds "surprised and baffled."

PANMUNJOM, Korea, June 6 (UP)—Allied truce negotiators got tired of waiting for an answer from the Reds today.

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## Billy Graham Closes Houston Revival Sunday

HOUSTON, June 7 (UP)—Evangelist Billy Graham closes his five week engagement in Houston tomorrow with a record crowd indicated for the Houston stadium.

Movie cowboy Roy Rogers and his wife, Dale Evans, are scheduled to appear with Rev. Graham tomorrow. And the evangelist says he hopes to have more than 70,000 persons in the high stadium. If he does, it will be a new record. There is every indication that his conversions record may be broken too. So far, 6,338 persons have been converted, 57 short of the five-week record set in Washington. But should the performance of last Sunday be repeated when some 2,000 persons rededicated their lives, the total will be well above 7,000.

## Congress Warned About Cutting Atomic Allotment

A Congressman warned that Russia will overtake America in the production of atomic weapons unless Congress votes enough money for the atom program.

Representative Carl Durham said he does not think Russia is ahead in a bomb now. But the North Carolina Democrat urged Congress to waste no time in passing the three-billion 200 million dollar program for atomic research asked for by President Truman.

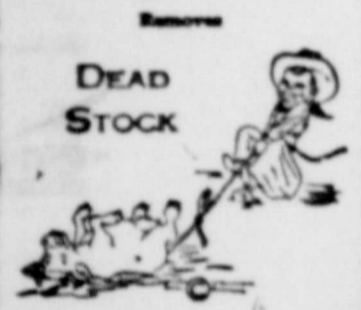

**Newest Trawler Is Fish Factory**

LONDON (UP)—A revolution-type of radar and radio-equipped fish-factory trawler with an operator in the stern, similar to whaling factory ships, is being built at the Aberdeen Yards of John Lewis.

The 245-foot-long, 44-foot-broad ship is equipped with a 300-horsepower electric motor-operated winch which pulls the trawl nets through the stern aperture instead of the usual over-the-side procedure.

Kept in Storage

The fish then are packed into cartons and passed by conveyor belts to storage holds, where they are kept at a temperature of 3 degrees fahrenheit.

Very little of the fish is wasted. Offal is fed by conveyers to the fishmeal plant where, it is processed into fishmeal for use by cattle and poultry. Fish liver oil is extracted from the livers.

The ship, which is being built for Chris. Salvosen and Company, which formerly operated whalers, carries fuel to enable it to stay at sea 30 days without refueling. It is powered by a 1900-horsepower marine oil engine.

A full installation of radio equipment has been ordered from the Marconi Company. This includes long and medium range communication facilities to keep the ship in touch with shore and other fishing vessels, radar direction finders and sounding apparatus.
