consideration to remain a strong nation and to be safe from forces both internal and external.

The national defense effort has received my vigorous support. At the same time, I have supported every effort to turn the spotlight of facts upon wasteful spending by the military, in an attempt to see that our money is spent wisely and that we receive value for our dollars.

My efforts in matters relating to military preparedness and foreign policy have all been directed at one objective—a permanent and lasting peace.

In these years of experience, I have held that both labor and business monopolies should be subservient to the public interest. In voting for the Taft-Hartley Law, I supported the inclusion of labor unions in the anti-racketeering Act, to curb the power of labor racketeers and protect honest union members against high-handed methods of a few labor homes and against Communist influence.

As your Congressman, I have been consistent in working for a sound farm program. The record shows my continuous interest in the betterment of rural living by working for fair prices for agricultural products, farm-to-market roads, REA services, and the protection of the farmer against bureaucratic controls, such as the Brannan Plan.

Most veterans are aware of my work in assisting deserving veterans in all their problems with the Veterans Administration. Everyone is, of course, familiar with the fight to retain our Tideland. As one of the authors of the measure to keep the Federal Government from robbing the State of Texas of its Tidelands, I have remained in Washington to lend every effort against the President's veto. In the future, I shall continue to fight for the fundamental principles involved in this action.

Highly important legislation is now pending in the Congress.

There are measures which are likely to be up for action and vote in the next several days, such as the controls program, more Federal public housing, a bill which if passed would threaten to nullify the labor laws of Texas, and other matters which vitally affect us all, directly or indirectly. I am opposed to these particular measures, and will be at my post of duty to vote against them. These and other highly important bills will keep me in Washington several more days, and I know that you want me to stay on the job. My attendance record in Congress is 98 per cent. Not once has Omar Burison failed to cast his vote on important issues.

It is my intention to return home just as soon as I feel it possible to do so without neglecting my responsibilities. You sent me to Washington to represent you in the Congress. I would be doing less than my duty if I returned to campaign at a time

when measures so vital to us all are pending on the legislative calendar.

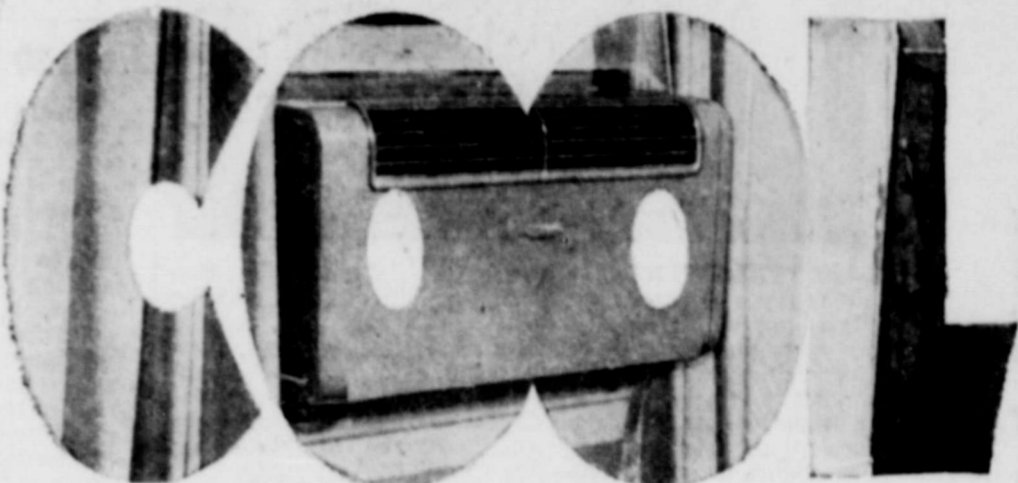
In the meantime, I trust that you, my friends, will consider that you have an investment in experience, which can only be attained by time. Evidently there are interests outside our own area which would like to see me removed from Congress, because they know I am independent and stand by my convictions. They know I cannot be controlled and that I will not yield to the pressures which are constantly bearing down. They cannot, however, successfully question by record or integrity, my conduct of my af-

airs, nor the devotion and faithfulness to the trust you have placed in me.

96-Year-Old Is Still Active In Hunting, Fishing

George Howard Walker of Lufkin, who is an active hunter and fisherman at 96, is the subject of an article—"Tenacious Texan"—in the forthcoming issue of Texas Game & Fish magazine.

He is a native Texan and remembers the early days when game was so abundant that there were no seasons or bag limits. He bagged his 96th deer last fall and estimated that:

"All the ducks I have killed couldn't be pulled by a team of horses."

He doubts that game ever will be restored to the status when antelope populated he ranges like "waving grass" but he thinks present restoration work will be effective and that there will always be something to hunt.
