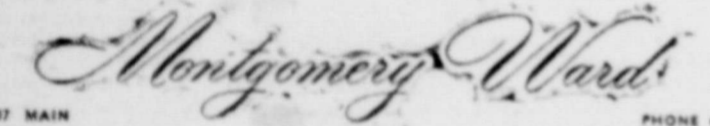

SENATOR SAYS OBJECT OF FOREIGN AID BEEN REACHED

ABILENE, June 19—Senator Allen J. Ellender of Louisiana has uncovered a hoax which affects every American taxpayer, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce noted today.

"This hoax is being put over by the federal office-holders who are desperately seeking arguments in favor of continued heavy foreign economic aid," said a bulletin issued by the regional cham-

ber's Taxation and Legislation department.

Remainder of the text of the bulletin follows:

Sen. Ellender tried unsuccessfully to cut \$500 million from the \$1.6 billion economic aid authorization last week. In the debate over his amendment, he quoted some testimony by Paul Hoffman, former ECA Administrator, that when industrial production in any

country reached 125 per cent of the 1939 prewar levels, America's recovery help could be discontinued.

The startling facts presented by Sen. Lellender show that industrial production in Belgium and Luxembourg actually has reached 146 per cent of prewar.

Industrial production in Denmark has reached 162 per cent. It has reached 144 per cent in Italy.

It has reached 446 per cent in the United Kingdom.

And so on.

The average rate for all NATO countries was 15 per cent. Other countries participating in M S A

have boosted their industrial production to an average of 136 per cent of prewar levels.

By comparing Hoffman's testimony with these figures, it would appear that continued economic aid from the United States should be stopped now.

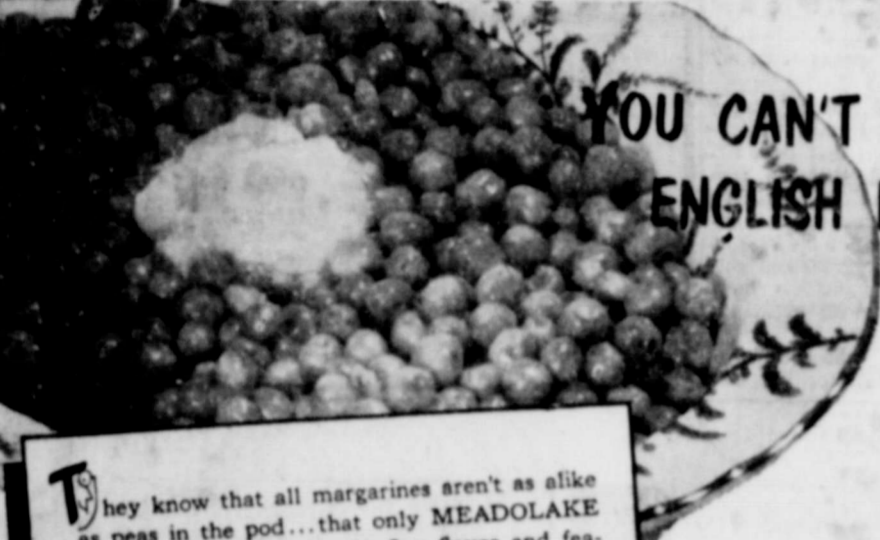
But nothing could be farther from the wishes and unrealistic ambitions of the office-holders who would have American taxpayers foot the recovery bill for years to come.

So they have switched yardsticks. Paul Hoffman's measurement was too good for them. And this is where the hoax comes in.

The substituted for the original 1939 index figure the much higher base rate of 1948—the year the ECA program began. This put the economic aid program in a different light.

But even with 1948 as a base the average industrial production index for NATO countries is 125 per cent—the same figure used by Hoffman—while for other countries it is 137 per cent of 1948.

He is a native of Travis in Falls county, is married and has two daughters.

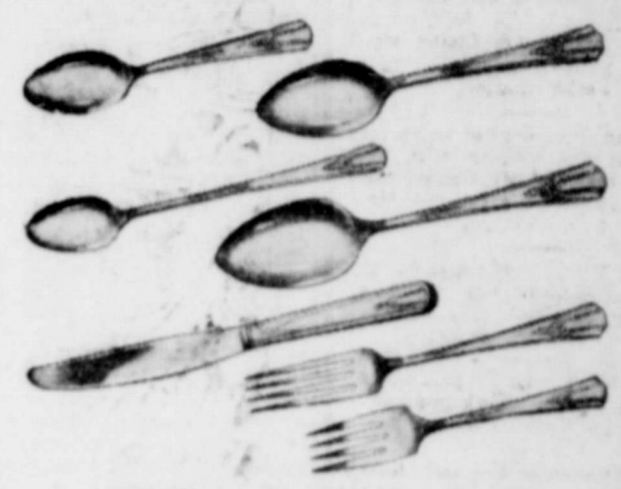

our many state and federal courts. When chosen to serve, very few of these violate their oath with intentional misconduct. But honest mistakes have all too frequently brought the sincerity and ethics of an individual juror into question.

Usually such errors arise from his misunderstanding of his function as a juror—for the jury is judge of the facts in the case before it.

Hold yourself aloof from all persons (except other jurors) in any way connected with the trial of the case. That means that you should not mingle with nor talk to the lawyers, witnesses, parties, nor the judge, even though the discussion is wholly unrelated to the trial.

Do not guess at the judge's motives or mention it to you or in your presence during the trial. If anyone insists upon talking about the case after you have explained to him that you are a juror and must not listen, report the matter to the judge immediately.

Do not commence your deliberations until you have heard all the evidence from both sides, the argument of the lawyers, and the court's charge. You should not mention the case except in the jury room when all other jurors are present.

Do not become a private investigator. All properly admissible evidence will be brought before you. Do not try to search out additional facts you believe to have been omitted. Do not even guess

or speculate about facts not in evidence. Be attentive to the evidence as it is presented. If you are to properly aid the other jurors in settling the fact questions, it will be necessary to listen carefully to all evidence presented.

Do not guess at the judge's opinion of the facts. You are the judge of the facts. He is not allowed and will not try to invade your province. His rulings on admissibility of evidence reflect no ideas or opinions on any fact question.

You should not mention or discuss your own personal experience.

Accept no favors from and bestow no favors upon any person interested in the trial. However innocent the conduct may be, it will raise doubts in otherwise undoubting minds, and may even be subject to more serious insinuations and charges.

When in doubt ask the judge. If you are in doubt about your rights or duties as a juror, you should not ask anyone but the judge for information.

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Operation Fails To Cure Thief; Back In Old Trade

PITTSBURGH June 19—Mil-lard F. Wright, 42, was back in jail Thursday convinced that a delicate brain operation was not enough to "cure" him of his "urge to steal."

The former Leechburg, Pa. resident, who risked his life so the operation could be performed, was arrested Wednesday night and held in connection with a string of jewelry store burglaries.

The arrest shocked Wright's attorney and doctor. They believed he had been leading an exemplary life since he underwent the operation, and was paroled from Western penitentiary in 1949.

Wright, too, was disappointed to be back in jail. He shrugged off questions about the success of the operation, saying: "With me it wasn't."

Before he was paroled three years ago, Wright spent almost half of his life behind bars. Then after he landed in Western penitentiary Wright volunteered to undergo brain surgery to "cure my urge to steal."

Dr. Yale David Koskoff, noted brain surgeon, performed the operation in 1947. At that time Dr. Koskoff explained that he severed nerve fibers in Wright's brain hoping to effect a personality change. Two years later Wright was paroled and since then psychiatrists and criminologists have followed his case with great interest.

Coupland Bank Robbed \$1,857

COUPLAND, Tex., June 19 (UP)—A leisurely bank bandit who told the woman cashier he robbed "I haven't killed but two men previously" eluded state and county officers Thursday after escaping with \$1,857 loot.

He had demanded not less than \$10,000, but fled with \$1,000 in \$20 bills, \$400 in \$1 bills and \$457 from a cash drawer.

The bandit took his time at robbing Miss Lydia Etzel, assistant cashier, hanging around the bank had to pay out about \$30 per day during Wright's 63-day stay in the hospital.

Miss Etzel said the man first entered the bank, and posing as a tractor mechanic, sought to locate someone for whom he claimed he had repaired a tractor. SENATE SHELVES TRUMAN'S NON-POLITICAL JOB PLANS

WASHINGTON, June 19 (UP)—President Truman's plan to take 21,000 postmaster appointments out of politics went to the dead letter office Thursday.

The Senate Wednesday by a 56-40 vote disapproved Mr. Truman's plan to remove postmaster jobs from the political patronage system. Then it quickly killed similar plans affecting some 94 U. S. marshals and 51 officials of the Customs Bureau.

The plans would have taken effect Friday had they not been disapproved by either the Senate or House.

There is politics in filling the jobs, McClellan said, but it is "open" local politics for which congressmen can be held accountable.

Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey D-Minn. led avowed foes of the spoils system in a losing battle for the plans.

"The American people are sick of corruption and the political patronage system," Humphrey said. He added that congressmen have more important things to do, such as running the country, than spending their time filling minor jobs.

USDA PREDICTS NEW RECORD FOR U.S. WATERMELON CROP

WASHINGTON, June 19—The watermelon season is with us, and if the Department of Agriculture isn't mistaken we'll cut more this year than ever before.

In 1951, 83,207,000 melons, valued at \$36,297,000 were consumed. This record is expected to be bettered this year.

The department has an interesting little booklet out called—quite properly—"watermelons."

There are 29 more or less common varieties of the giant of the cucumber family, making it a pretty big business.

Some Unusual Names

The growers have tacked some rather unusual names to the various kinds. For example there is the "Georgia Rattlesnake," which has a sweet taste and is fine-grained. There is the "Irish Gray," which grows up to 46 pounds.

Among others, there is a variety known to the trade as the "Yellow Ice Cream." It's yellow on the inside and has a sugary flavor.

Watermelons are fine to eat but not so easy to grow. A lot of things can go wrong from watermelon hill to the table, making it a highly speculative crop.

The Department of Agriculture lists all sorts of enemies of the melon. There are the cucumber beetles, which destroy the seedling.

Cut worms and wireworms have been known to cause considerable damage. There is a small house-like insect known as the watermelon aphid. It obtains its livelihood by sucking plant juices.

The size of the grown melons often is affected by the weather. On hot, sultry days the demand often exceeds the supply; but on rainy days, or in cool, unseason-

Green Card Can Take Guesswork Out Of Marketing

Farmers can take the guesswork out of selling their cotton with a green card.

This green card shows that the cotton has been classed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration. A green card showing the grade and staple is issued for every bale of cotton classed.

Farmers belonging to cotton improvement groups receive this classification without paying a fee. Also they receive a USDA price quotation sheet to keep them posted on what the cotton is worth.

Both services come from PMA's classing office at Dallas Texas. Manager of this office is Mr. Sam W. Martin.

Any group of farmers organized to promote improvement of cotton adopts a variety files an application, arranges for sampling and meets certain other requirements for its members is eligible for these services.

Administration Pushes Opening Essential Mills

By Robert E. Lee WASHINGTON, June 19 (UP)

The administration rushed plans Thursday to reopen a few steel mills for "urgent" defense production before Congress formally demands use of the Taft-Hartley Law to end the 18-day old strike of 650,000 CIO Steelworkers.

Democratic and Republican leaders agreed that the House was "certain" to give overwhelming approval late Thursday or Friday, to a Senate passed rider to the economic controls bill "requiring" President Truman to invoke the law and seek an 80-day anti-strike injunction.

Industry officials expected the government to announce Thursday which steel plants will be reopened by agreement with the union, to provide war goods for Korea.

The emergency plan engineered by Presidential Assistant John R. Steelman, is aimed at restoring some 600,000 ingot tons of steel production a month—about five per cent of the industry's total capacity.

Some capital quarters thought the move might provide the administration with an argument that the steel strike no longer

posed a "national emergency" warranting use of the Taft-Hartley Law.

Others believed, however, that Mr. Truman would "bow to the inevitable" and invoke the law after the House made it official that Congress wants him to do so.

As government, industry and union maneuvering continued with no settlement in sight the loss of 300,000 tons of steel production a day began to have its effect on the civilian economy.

The Ford Motor Co. announced in Detroit that most of its plants across the nation will go on a four-day week Friday, in an effort to stretch out dwindling steel supplies and avoid a complete shutdown June 30.

"Ike" Favors State Control Of Tidelands

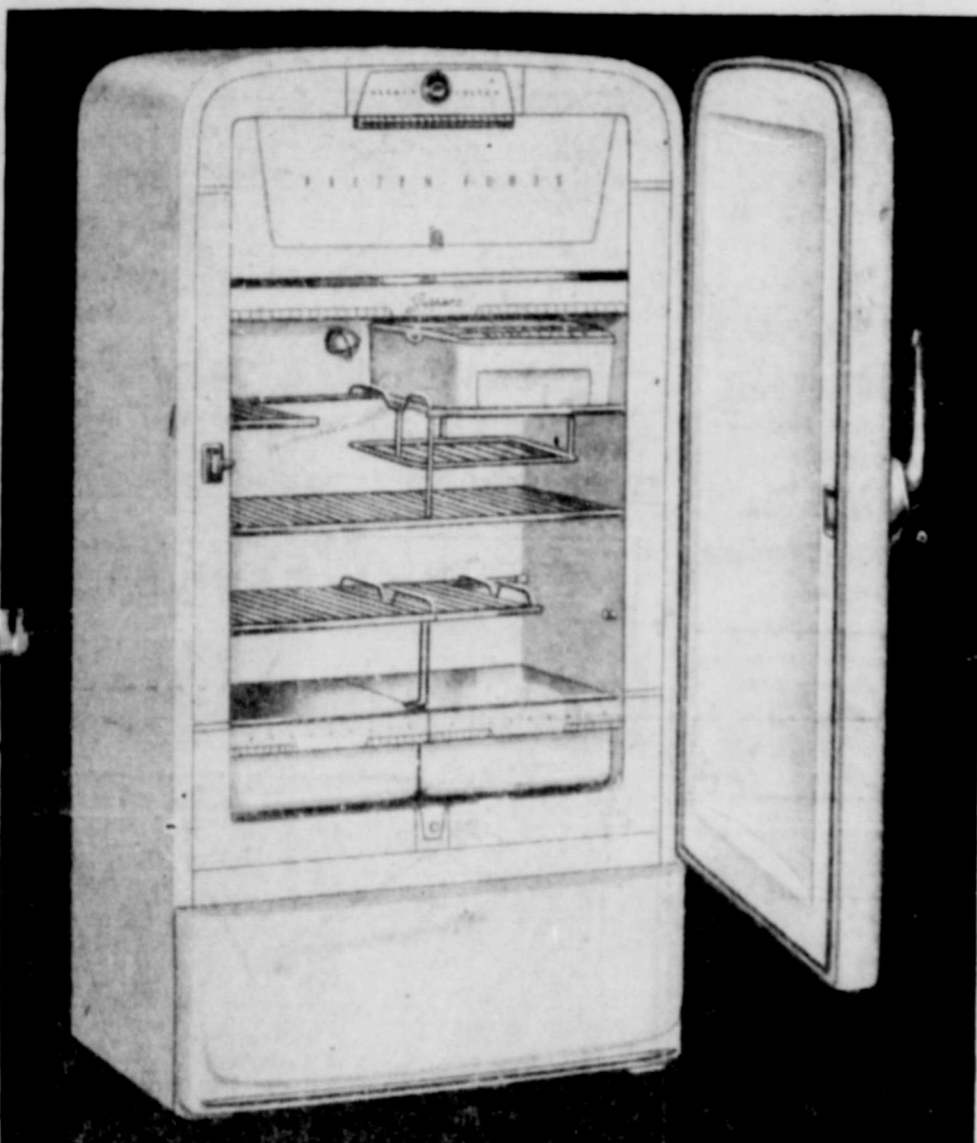
HOUSTON, June 19 (UP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower put himself in favor of state ownership of the tidelands again Wednesday after supporters of Sen. Robert A. Taft had charged the general had backed down on an earlier statement to that effect.
H. J. Jack Porter, Eisenhower's Texas campaign manager, he asked the general for a clarification of his position. In a telegram the general replied:
"To the extent constitutional, I favor legislation by the Congress to vest control in the states to the three-mile limit or three-league limit, as appropriate."
The general went on that he favored "decentralizing government" and added he "must recognize the right and responsibility of the federal government over national resources essential to the national security. However I see no conflict in this responsibility which interferes with the vesting of title of tidelands to the states."

Twenty-two Men Charged In Huge Theft Of Timber

CENTER, June 19 (UP)—Charges of stealing \$200,000 worth of pine timber, filed against 22 Shelby county men, were turned over to a grand jury Thursday for hearing July 7.
The 22 men were freed Wednesday in \$2,500 bond after their arrest earlier in the day. Deputy Sheriff Avery Dalton said all signed statements admitting the thefts.
Dalton said the thefts, from the Frost Lumber Industries, mostly occurred on weekends and moonlight nights. The timber, he said, was sold as pulp wood and railroad cross ties.

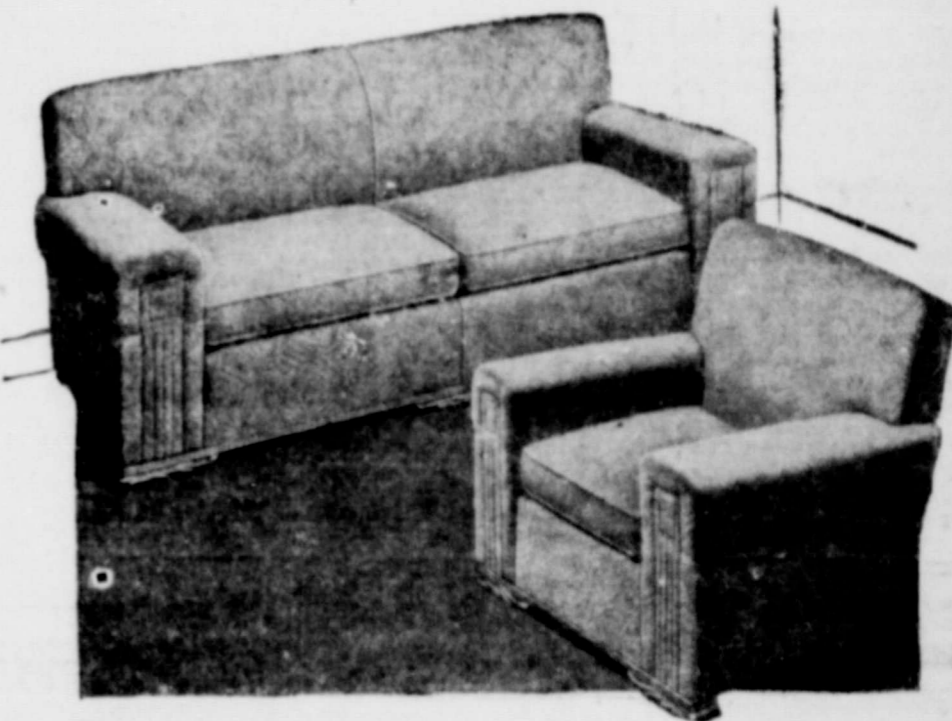
