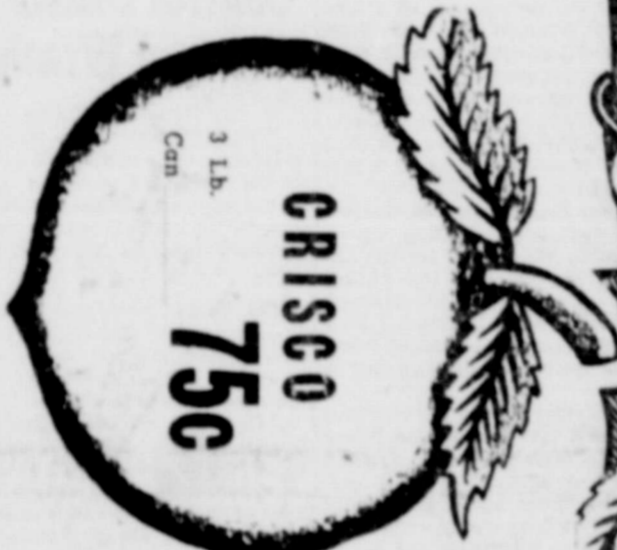

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

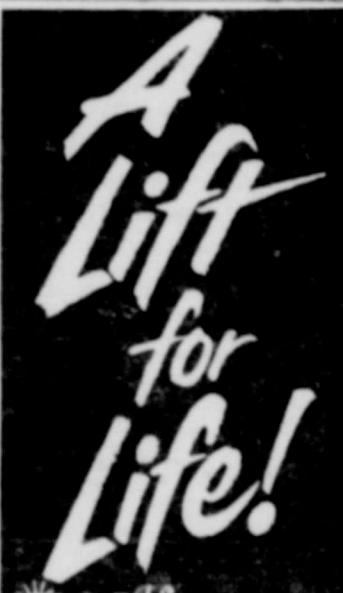
JUDGES STATEMENTS OF LAW BINDING UPON JURORS

Judges set the law by which they decide the legal questions arising in a lawsuit from three sources: federal and state constitutions; federal and state statutes; and from previous judicial decisions and legal writings. Previous decisions state the public standards of rights and duties in matters not covered by constitutions and statutes.

Lawyers say that if judges and juries were not bound by law and precedents—if in each lawsuit, the judge or jury could set up a private standard of rights and duties as a basis for deciding that case—no one would know in advance of the decision how he should have acted in a particular situation. Cases arising out of similar circumstances would not be decided on settled principles but on the personal ideas of the trial judge or jury.

Because cases must be tried and determined on established and recognized public standards of right and wrong, we call our a government of law and not a government of men.

Highway Patrol Looks For Men

AUSTIN, June 26—The Department of Public Safety announces it is accepting applications until Aug. 1 from young men who want to be highway patrolmen.

Requirement for a recruit patrolman are that they be between 21 and 35 years of age; at least 5 feet, 8 inches tall, weighing not less than two pounds per inch of height nor more than three and one-half; physically able to pass a rigid examination, a resident of Texas for at least one year and have high school or equivalent education.

Men meeting these requirements will be given an examination for the patrol after Aug. 1.

Moisture Being Depleted By Heat and Winds

AUSTIN, June 26—Soil moisture in Texas is being depleted to a "critically low point" by strong dry winds, high daytime temperatures and growing crops. The U. S. Department of Agriculture reported Wednesday.

The USDA singled out the cotton crop as responding favorably to hot, dry weather but said corn, sorghums and pastures needed rain.

Summer weather aided progress of combining wheat, baling hay and cultivation of growing crops.

The USDA said that peanuts were in "good" condition, rice was making "exceptionally good" progress, and conditions were favorable for field curing of broom-corn.

Conditions were reported favorable for harvest of commercial vegetables, but the USDA said surface moisture was becoming deficient.

HOUSTON, June 26—The Liberty Broadcasting System, which has been declared bankrupt, will hold its first meeting with creditors in Dallas July 8, I. M. Oldham, referee, said here Wednesday. It is expected that a trustee will be appointed to sell assets of the system which includes \$83,194 in equipment.

money, arms and men to a degree "equalled by no other country."

Spanish diplomat Jose Antonio Vaca de Oama, reports these interesting details of the story of Spanish aid in the war for American independence.

Count of Aranda and the American representatives, Frank and Lee, produced a loan of what would amount to about \$4 million in these lines. It was from the Spanish royal treasury. These funds were used to buy 216 bronze cannon, 209 mortars, 12,826 grenades, 51,134 rounds of ammunition, 700,000 pounds of gun powder, 300,000 muskets with bayonets, 4,000 tents and 20,000 military uniforms.

And More Financial Aid The Spanish ministers Grimaldi and Floridablanca gave more financial aid by placing orders with Dutch banks in the amount of \$65,000 pounds and for 120,000 pesos. Don Diego Cardoqui sent six shipments of blankets from Bilbao. The royal treasury advanced three million reales and at the same time 12,000 guns were sent aboard the ships 'Amphitrite' and 'San Julian.'

The Spanish embassy says that Spanish troops were placed at the disposition of the American leader George Korgan, commander of Fort Pitt.

These troops drove the British out of the Mississippi area and occupied Saint Augustine in a joint maneuver with American boys.
