DE-CONTROL MAY MEAN HIGHER FOOD BILLS

WASHINGTON, July 2 UP—Housewives were put on notice Wednesday that their food bills probably will go up soon and push the cost of living an all-time high.

Price Stabilizer Ellis Arnall made the prediction, and blamed the new controls law. He said the cost of living may not increase drastically as a result of the act but that it will rise enough so that "every American family will feel it."

"Winnie" Wins Confidence In Korean Conduct

By W. G. Landrey LONDON, July 2 (UP)—Prime Minister Winston Churchill won a confidence vote on the Allied front of the Korean war Tuesday night after warning that further criticism might lead to election of an isolationist president in the U. S.

The House of Commons backed up Churchill by defeating a Labor party motion of censure, 300 to 270. Liberal party members lined up with Churchill's own Conservatives in the crucial vote.

Churchill outmaneuvered his Labor party critics by deflecting their attacks on his government's part in the conduct of the Korean war onto the U. S., then playing on Europe's fears American may return to isolationism.

He warned Laborites against trying to find fault with Americans on every occasion, particularly in a presidential election year.

"There might come a time, especially during a presidential election, when a very sharp reaction or emotion, even in anger, might sweep large sections of the American people, and any candidate for the presidency who gave full vent to it would gain a considerable advantage," he said.

Churchill said the U. S. should have consulted Britain in advance of last week's raid on a Korean power plant on the Manchurian border, but agreed that it was a legitimate military target.

Make UP 20 Per Cent

Arnall, relieved to find he had any real price control authority left at all, said the law "is not as strong as we had hoped for but it could have been very much weaker than it is."

He based his cost-of-living prediction mainly on the act's exemption from price controls of all fruits and vegetables. They make up 20 per cent of the average family food costs and seven per cent of the average family budget.

This removed ceilings from prices of canned, frozen and other processed fruits and vegetables. Although some of these are selling below those ceiling, price officials estimated that 65 per cent are selling at ceiling levels at retail and therefore can be expected to rise.

"Authority Was Deterrent" Fresh fruits and vegetables—except potatoes for a brief time—were not under ceilings and now are supposed to be in a seasonal price decline. But, Arnall said, the authority to place ceilings on them under the old act was a "deterrent against unreasonable price increases."

Price officials started Wednesday to decide what "borderline" items should be decontrolled as processed fruits and vegetables. They said they don't think coffee would come in this class but were uncertain about such things as baby food, chili, pork and beans, and raisin bread.

They said milk and cigarette ceilings will go up in some areas because the new act bans ceilings below price levels established by state minimum price laws. They could not yet estimate the extent of such increases.

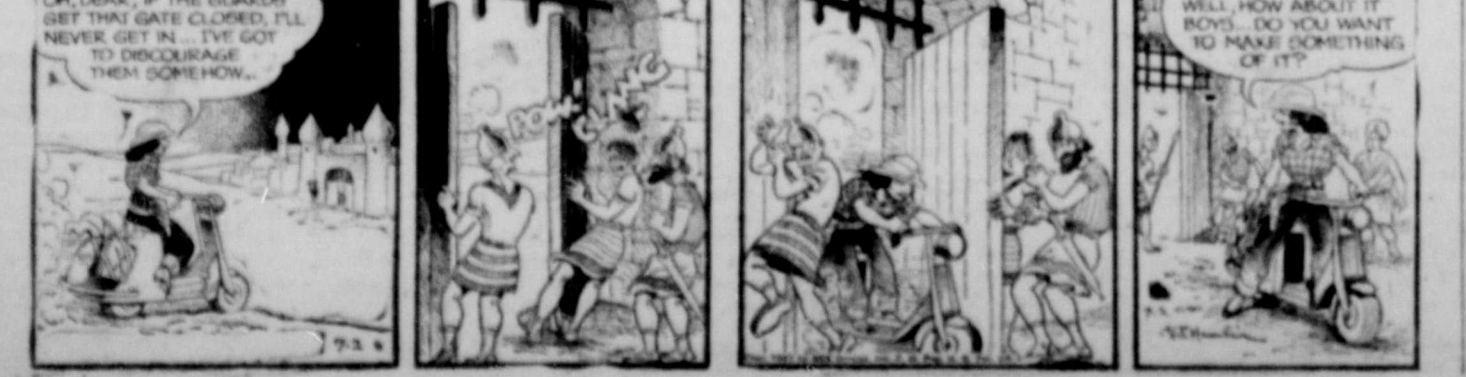

Installation Sales On Increase

DALLAS, June 30 (UP)—Department store installment credit sales in the Dallas Federal Reserve district increased 90 per cent in May, 1952, as compared with May, 1951, the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas said Monday.

The gain was apparently the result of the suspension of Regulation W credit controls the bank said in its monthly business review.

Installment sales showed a 49 per cent increase from April,

1952, to May, 1952, the bank said.

In April, installment sales represented 12 per cent of the total department store sales, about the same percentage as in the first quarter.

In May, however, installment sales rose to 16 per cent of total store sales.

The district also showed an overall gain of 14 per cent in sales, both as compared with May, 1951, and with April, 1952. More than 75 per cent of the increase over May, 1951, figures was the increase in installment sales, the review said.

Agricultural conditions in the

district are very good, the bank said, although some areas still need more moisture and "moisture reserves in other areas are becoming depleted."

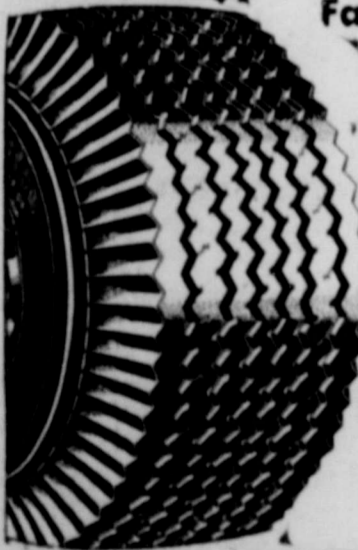
