IT'S THE LAW in Texas

DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE EXPRESSES BASIC AMERICAN PRINCIPLES

Our Declaration of Independence, signed 176 years ago, is considered by lawyers as expressing a basic principle of our American way of life—our belief in a government of laws rather than a government of men, and in certain individual rights that must not be denied by government bodies.

The indications set out in the document against King George III of Great Britain charge him with numerous violations of that tenet. Among the complaints enumerated are the following:

"He has assuaged representative Houses repeatedly, for invasions with mainly forcible his invasions on the rights of the people." "He has obstructed the administration of justice, by refusing his assent for laws for establishing judiciary powers."

"He has made judges dependent upon his will alone, for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries."

"He has refused his assent to laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good."

"He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitutions, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation—For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury; For transporting us beyond seas to be tried for pretended offenses;—For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our governments;—For suspending our own legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever."

"Our forefathers who subscribed to the principles of the Declaration of Independence were willing to fight for their beliefs. The Revolutionary War followed, dragging through weary years of suffering and suspense. Each of us takes pride in their eventual triumph over gigantic obstacles. In 1787, when the framers of our Constitution met at Independence Hall in Philadelphia, where the Declaration of Independence had been signed 11 years previously, they set to work to create a system of checks and balances in government which was to perpetuate the fundamental theory mentioned in the preamble of the earlier document:

"We hold these truths to be self-evident: That all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness."

"That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed."

Some 5 years later, the first ten amendments to our Constitution were adopted at one time, specifically detailing various basic civil rights stemming from the underlying theory of the Declaration

Fighting Mad General Heads For Convention

DENVER, Col., July 3 (UP)—A fighting mad Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower leaves Thursday for the Republican national convention pledged to crusade for a "clean, decent operation" at Chicago.

Eisenhower, stung by what he regards as high-handed Republican national committee tactics, steps aboard his special train to begin a slow, barnstorming trip through the farm-rich middle west.

He regards the fight as the battle of his life. He is determined to pursue it on the basis of what he regards as a moral principle, regardless of the outcome.

All this Eisenhower made clear Wednesday night. He was informed by a reporter of the national committee vote in Chicago to replace Georgia's pro-Eisenhower delegation with a slate pledged to Sen. Robert A. Taft. The general first declined comment but then he stopped, wheeled on his interrogator, and snapped:

"I'll tell you this, though I'm going to roar clear across the country for a clean, decent operation. The American people deserve it."

Nine Appearances Sated He will make at least nine back platform appearances from his campaign train, speak from the steps of the Lincoln, Neb., state capitol Thursday night, and participate in a nationwide television broadcast on Friday. It is a far cry from his determination of a month ago to hold himself aloof from the pre-convention fighting.

Here in capsule form is the situation in the Eisenhower camp as it shifted its battle flag from the Rocky Mountain area to Chicago:

1. Expectations that Eisenhower will hit hip-and-thigh at what he regards as a brazen effort by the national committee to deal him out at the convention.

2. Hope among the Eisenhower leaders that the general, steaming his way across country, can stir up public reaction to the national committee votes on the disputed state delegations with a view to overturning them in the convention's own credentials committee and on the convention floor itself next week.

3. A belief by Eisenhower leaders that many delegates who expect to cast a first ballot vote for Taft, will shift to the general thereafter, and confidence that Taft claims of delegate strength have been considerably exaggerated.
