Fat Ones Carded for Early Grave; Dietary Habit Change Suggested

AUSTIN. Are you packing too much fatty beef for the size of your frame? If so, you're probably one of the 100,000 or so Texans contributing to what State Health Officer George W. Cox calls a "significant public health problem."

The number of these (dangerously overweight) people in the state is growing, the doctor says, and they're laying themselves wide open to trouble.

For instance, if you are carrying too much fatty tissue you're twice apt to get diabetes, and three times as likely to have heart trouble. Furthermore, if you get arthritis it will hurt you a good deal more because of your obese condition.

Many other conditions are made worse by a person's being too fat.

"Obesity is just as serious a form of malnutrition as starvation in the long run," the health officer will tell you. Ask why some people get fat while some don't and he'll tell you plain and simple reason is that usually the fat ones eat more than their systems need or want.

"Obesity is exactly the opposite of starvation. Overweight people eat too much. Emaciated people don't get enough. Both types are malnourished."

But why do they eat too much? There may be many causes. The glands may not be working just right. They may be having emotional trouble.

"Dietary habits perhaps established in Childhood. Part of the reason might be than an overly full stomach gives them a sense of emotional relief. They might be trying to satisfy an emotional hunger as well as a physical one."

The best way to fight obesity is to cut down the caloric intake, he says. But to do this you've got to have a real desire to have normal weight.

"This means," he explains, "the underlying emotional factors which created the obesity must be corrected by a greater urge, such as avoiding an early death."

When you get this desire you'll be willing to have your doctor prescribe a reducing diet, and medicine if necessary and you will follow his advice.

"If you don't," Dr. Cox cautioned, "you'll probably find an early grave."

Fat people should get a good physical examination from their doctor before they start on a rigid reducing diet.

Health Factor In Nation's Accident Toll

CHICAGO—There was something wrong physically with one of every 18 drivers involved in the 32,500 fatal motor vehicle accidents last year, according to the National Safety Council.



In "Accident Facts," the Council's statistical yearbook, which is just off the press, three-fifths of the defects were listed as fatigue and sleeping while driving. One out of every nine pedestrians killed by motor vehicles had some physical defect. Defective eyesight was reported in more than one-fourth of these cases, defective hearing in one-tenth, and illness or other bodily defects in the remaining three-fifths.

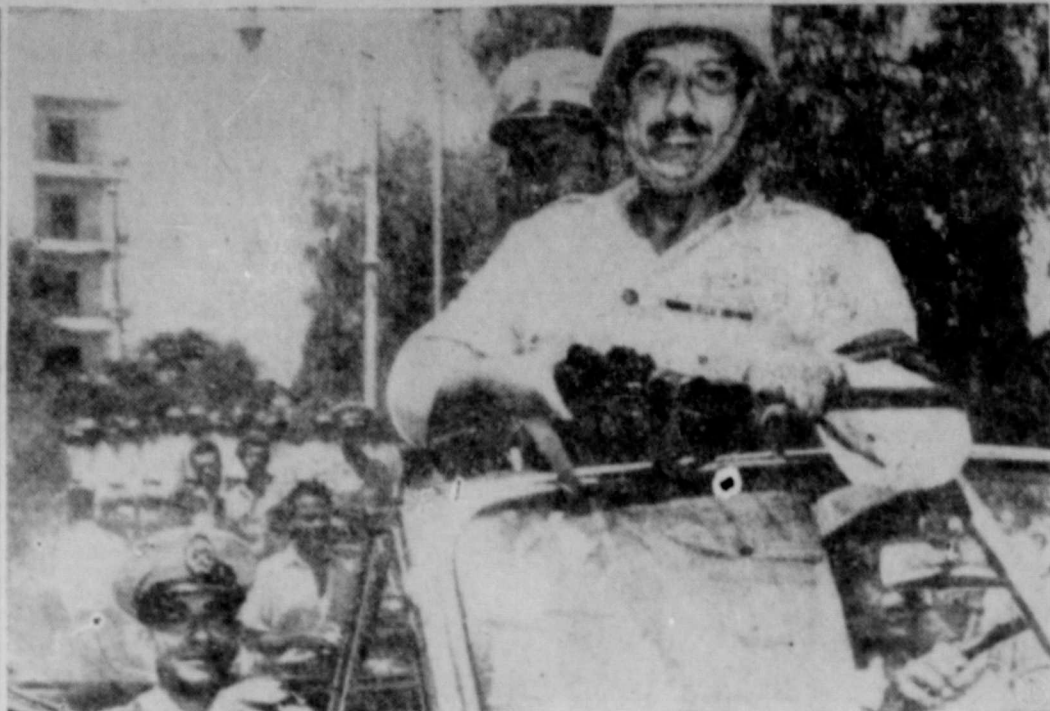

## Abundant "Saucers" Alarms Air Force

WASHINGTON, July 29 (UP)—Those "mystery objects" swooping in over the capital again Tuesday as an aroused Air Force called in top scientists to find out what flying saucers really are.

The Civil Aeronautics Administration traffic control center reported that its radar picked up the objects for about six straight hours early Tuesday morning.

The objects, a CAA official said, were traveling about 100 to 120 miles an hour in a 10-mile arc around the capital, between Herndon, Va., and Andrews Air Force Base in nearby Maryland.

It was in this same area that radar screens recorded the strange "targets" the past two Saturday nights, setting off a new rash of "flying saucer" rumors in the capital.

Top Air Force brass has decided to get to the bottom of the mystery. Forwarding an earlier attitude that "there ain't no such animal," they are enlisting top scientists in a major new saucer study, it was learned Tuesday.

Followed Airliner  
A CAA official said the control center radar first started picking up the strange "blips" about 1:30 a.m. and that they continued showing up on the radarscope until 5 a.m.

A pilot aboard an Eastern Airlines Constellation was directed to check on the objects at about 3 a.m., but he reported he saw no lights despite a 15-mile visibility. The CAA official said the objects disappeared from the radar screen when the plane was in the area where they had been tracked and "then came back in behind him."

The Air Force will rely primarily on physicists for its "flying saucer" investigation. This is in line with a tentative opinion already reached in some Air Force circles that various described mystery objects in the sky actually are physical phenomena, however imperfectly understood.

happily on ignorance, not on military security, they said.

Sources who have followed the "saucer" saga through five years asserted with renewed vigor that the glowing, vari-colored objects sighted visually all over the land, and recently by radar, are not secret aircraft or weapons developments.

The present "saucer" craze has been building up for two months and came to a head when mysterious "flying objects" were sighted on radarscopes at the Washington National airport two Saturday nights running. On the latest occasion, last Saturday, the National airport sightings were verified by military radar.

Air Force spokesmen insisted there was no military secrecy veiling the quest for "saucer" data. Any seeming reluctance to give out information was based un-

### Egyptian King, Whiskey Supply, Land At Capri

ISLE OF CAPRI, Italy, July 29—Deposed King Farouk of Egypt arrives in Italy aboard the royal yacht Mahroussa Tuesday with 40 cases of whiskey, champagne and more than 200 other pieces of luggage, to begin his exile.

With the former monarch aboard the big white yacht as it shipped into Naples Bay were his six-month old son and successor, King Amed Fuad II, and his 18-year-old wife, Queen Mother Narriman.

The Mahroussa first halted two miles off the swank resort Island of Capri. Three hours later, it moved closer to Naples, where Baron Scamaeca, chief of protocol of the Italian foreign office, and Egyptian ambassador to Italy Abdel Aziz Badr Bey were waiting to greet Farouk and the infant king.

The vessel halted about midway between Capri and Naples and there was no immediate word where it would dock. The capri harbor master, who boarded the Mahroussa immediately after its arrival, said the crew was awaiting orders from Farouk.

During the three-hour layover off Capri, two launches went out

to the Mahroussa. The first returned with 40 assorted cases clearly marked champagne, gin and whiskey, and with the gold ship's bell, apparently a memento from the ex-king.

The alcoholic cargo and the bell were transferred to Farouk's personal yacht, the smaller 130-ton Fakhr El Bihar from the 4,561-ton Mahroussa, which is under orders to return at once to Alexandria after taking the royal family to a destination of their choosing.

Farouk left Alexandria on Saturday's notice Saturday on orders from Gen. Mohammed Naguib Bey, who seized power in a military coup. It also was at Naguib's demand that he abdicated the throne in favor of his infant son.

The city champ of Fort Worth Carl Vandervoort, Jr., is signed

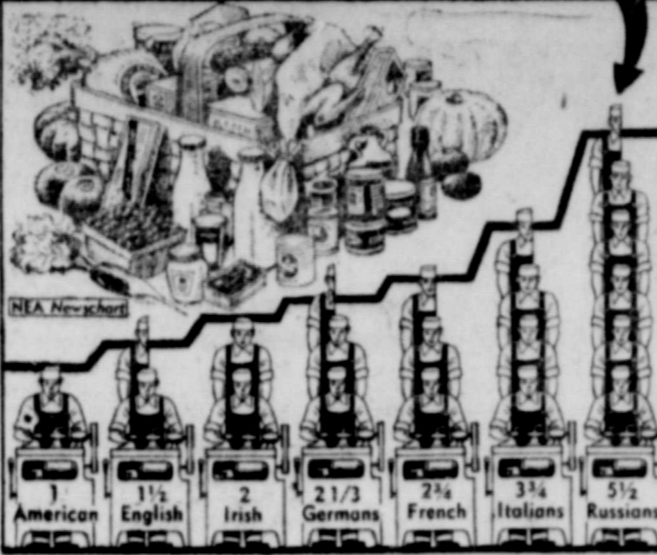

AUSTIN, July—Wyoming needs outside help to reduce an overpopulation of pronghorn antelope, reports Lester Bagley, Wyoming Game and Fish Commissioner, in a letter to the Executive Secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

Bagley writes that Wyoming is faced with the problem of reducing its antelope herd by approximately 40,000 head, and adds: "We are soliciting your cooperation in sending as many of your (Texas) hunters as you can to hunt antelope in Wyoming."

The Wyoming request coincided with the Texas Game and Fish Commission's decision to close the season on Texas antelope this year because of severe herd losses from drought.

**Pork Prices Up One To Eight Cents Per Pound**

WASHINGTON, July 29 (UP)—Ceiling prices on lean pork—from hams to chops — jumped from one to eight cents a pound Tuesday.

The Office of Price Stabilization authorized the higher pork prices Monday night to conform with a provision in the new economic controls law requiring higher hog prices during the summer months. OPS said the increase was seasonal and the ceilings will probably be lowered again after October.

Ceilings were increased by one cent a pound on pork shoulders, by three cents on hams, bellies, Boston butts and neck bones, and by eight cents on loins and spare ribs. These cuts account for 40 to 45 per cent of pork sales. Sausages are not affected.

The higher ceilings, effective immediately, were authorized on the wholesale level, and retailers were permitted to increase their prices by the same amount.

Callender warns that hunters and campers should never go to the woods without a snake bite kit. He urges home owners to keep their premises clean and to be on the look out at all times for the poisonous snakes. All except the rattler strike without warning — and the rattler sometimes does his biting before sounding off — so the safe thing to do is stay out of the way of all snakes and discourage them to stay out of your way.

**Pipe Shortage Causes Lone Star Delays**

Pipe shortages directly attributable to the recent steel strike have forced Lone Star Gas Company to delay laying more than 130 miles of major transmission and gathering lines especially designed to meet increased customer demands anticipated this winter.

Huley of Dallas, who said that the two pipe line construction projects represented in the 130 miles had been set for completion in that numerous other transmission and distribution lines reinforcement and extension projects throughout the company's operating area also have been set back.

**CHOKED with GAS?**

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**YOUR LIFE MAY DEPEND ON HOW WELL YOU KNOW SNAKES**

COLLEGE STATION, July—Someday your life may depend on how quickly and accurately you identify a snake. Only four of the 103 species of snakes known in Texas are considered dangerously poisonous, says R. E. Callender, specialist in wildlife conservation for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He urges Texans to become familiar with these poisonous snakes so that positive identification can be made quickly in case a member of the family is bitten.

The four species of snakes that are poisonous are the rattlesnakes, copperheads, cottonmouth moccasins and the deadly little coral snake. Rattlesnakes are easily identified by their rattles; the copperhead by its distinct brown hour glass markings over light brown or brownish gray background color; the cottonmouth moccasin is a dirty brown in color and is usually found around water — on old logs or driftwood and they can bite under water. The coral snake is the beauty of the group, but adds Callender, it's also the most deadly. Don't say the specialist, confuse it with the more commonly found king snake because the mistake could be fatal. The color rings of the coral snake are red, yellow and black and completely circle the body and if the red ring touches the yellow, you've found a coral snake. Treat him with care.

Fangs for ejecting the poison are common to all poisonous snakes. The marks left by the fangs are a sure identification sign. The venom injected by the rattlers, copperheads and water moccasins is known as hemotoxic venom because it affects the blood cells. The coral snake, on the other hand, injects a neurotoxic venom and it affects the nervous system. Antivenoms, which are available at most drug stores, are ineffective for treating the bite of the coral snake.

Snakes can be discouraged from moving in on the home lot, says Callender, by keeping the place clean. Rubbish should not be allowed to accumulate and trash should be removed for such debris about the place is usually inhabited by snakes and mice. These rodents are favorite food for snakes and unless kept under control, snakes will move in to clean them up.

Here's a word of advice from Callender on what to do in case a person is bitten by a poisonous snake. Keep the victim quiet; don't let them walk, become over-heated or take alcoholic stimulants. Don't cauterize the wound with strong acids nor inject potassium permanganate. Get the victim to a doctor as soon as possible but first aid measures will help. Apply a tourniquet above the bite and make cross cut incisions at the bite and on the advancing edges of the swelling. Apply suction with the mouth or a suction cup but re-
