Oklahoma Lawmen Puzzled By Decapitated Nude Girl's Body

YUKON, Okla., July 31 (UP)—The decapitated nude body of a young woman, the letters R-A-T carved across her abdomen and chest, was still unidentified Tuesday, after being found in a dry creek bed southwest of Yukon.

Police said they were concentrating on identifying the girl whose hands were also cut off. She was mutilated in other places too, according to Canadian county Under-sheriff, H. L. Penwell.

Penwell estimated the victim was "not over 16-years-old." Officers said the investigation could move in only one direction now—"to find out who she was."

Part Still Not Found
A search of a two-mile area around the mutilated torso failed to turn up the head or hands of the girl. Sheriff Royce said the girl had probably been killed elsewhere, and the missing members discarded to slow identification.

Royce said the girl was a brunette. Besides the scars on her leg, the only clues to identification were a red plastic belt found knotted under her body and a blood-stained cap lying nearby.

An autopsy was ordered to determine whether the woman had been raped. She had been dead since Tuesday night, or early Wednesday, a doctor said.

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Britain's Foreign Policy Faces Major Debate, Vote

Shivers Won't Promise Support Of Stevenson; "May Go Fishing"

AUSTIN, July 31 (UP)—Gov. Allan Shivers was sticking with his threat Thursday to "go fishing" during the general election if Democratic presidential nominee Adlai Stevenson doesn't express support for state ownership of the tidelands.

The governor said Wednesday, he could not support any candidate who is for federal ownership of the oil-rich submerged lands.

Shivers said he plans to confer with Stevenson at the Illinois governor's "convenience," on the tidelands issue.

He Will Be Fishing
If Stevenson does not come around to the state ownership side, Shivers said, "I may have to just plain old go fishing."

Shivers said he has sent Stevenson information on Texas' fight for state ownership, since the Illinois governor said he was not sufficiently informed on the question.

President Truman has twice vetoed legislation for state ownership of tidelands.

The governor also blasted the Democratic party's Civil Rights plank as "not acceptable," but left no doubt that the main issue on which his support of a nominee hinged was the tidelands question.

Like Support Possible
Shivers did not rule out the possibility that he might support Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Republican presidential nominee.

Senator Nixon's Next Stop Is Columbus, Ohio

SAN DIEGO, Calif., July 31 (UP)—Republican vice-presidential nominee Sen. Richard Nixon's tap-dance schedule took him to Columbus, Ohio, Thursday after a fact round of speechmaking to his California constituents.

Nixon boarded a plane for Columbus Wednesday night, after telling a GOP rally in his honor that he and his presidential running mate, Dwight D. Eisenhower, will take nothing for granted in the forthcoming campaign.

The California junior senator is scheduled to address a Republican meeting in Columbus Thursday night.

Then affable, smiling Nixon spoke briefly to about 2,000 persons here and said he and Eisenhower intended to "fight from now on" to secure the two highest offices in the land.

"This is one campaign where no one is going to take anything for granted," he said. "We are going to work vigorously right until election day."

Nixon addressed a luncheon at Fresno, Calif., Wednesday and described Eisenhower as a man who "shoots straight from the shoulder."

In an interview, he said the GOP would make "inroads" in such states as Texas, North Carolina, Virginia and Oklahoma despite the traditional Democratic strength in the South.

He said Democratic vice-presidential candidate Sen. John Sparkman of Alabama was not a true Southerner.

Cal Tech Says Worst Of Quakes Over For Area

PASADENA, Calif., July 31 (UP)—California Institute of Technology scientists believed Thursday the worst was over for the earth fault that caused a "killer" earthquake July 21 and a week-long series of aftershocks.

But they cautioned that settling in the Bear Mountain fault, cause of the quakes, may have awakened the larger Garlock and San Andrea faults nearby.

Seismologists pointed out that the original shock, which killed 13 persons and virtually leveled the business district of Tehachapi, Calif., apparently originated 10 miles down in the fault, or crack, near Arvin, which also suffered heavy damages.

The release of pressure in the fault caused the quake but the tremor itself created new, lesser pressures along the fault which, in turn, caused the long series of aftershocks that have frayed the nerves of Kern county residents.

Dr. John P. Buzwala of Caltech said his on the spot investigation indicated that the most recent heavy aftershock on Tuesday emanated from a point 40 miles northeast of the epicenter of the original shock.

This would mean that the center of the aftershocks has been moved away from the Los Angeles area toward Bakersfield, Calif., which experienced the most damage from Tuesday's tremor.

Dr. Hugo Benioff of Caltech reported that there was a strong vertical movement in the Bear Mountain fault Wednesday, but it had little effect because buildings are constructed to resist up and down strains better than side-to-side motion.

European Pact, German Peace Treaty Be Ruined If Defeated

LONDON, July 31 (UP)—Britain's 12-year-old bipartisan foreign policy was shattered Thursday.

The Labor party entered a two-day debate in the House of Commons with the announced intention of voting against ratification of the West German peace treaty and Britain's pledge to fight if any of the European Army Pact countries is attacked.

The vote will be taken Friday night at the end of the debate, and Prime Minister Winston Churchill's Conservative government is expected to win it as handily as it won a similar confidence vote Wednesday night on its economic policies.

But it will be the first time since Churchill formed his wartime coalition cabinet in 1940 that the main opposition party has voted against the government. In power on a major foreign policy issue.

Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden will open the debate about 4 p.m. (9 a.m. CST) and move approval of the separate German peace treaty and the guarantee of support to give France and other members of the European Army last May.

Labour will seek to amend the motion by refusing ratification on grounds it is "inopportune" to act at a time when the West and Russia still may get together on unifying Germany.

The labor decision to vote against the government represented a victory for ambitious left-winger Aneurin Bevan over the more moderate nominal leader of the party, former Prime Minister Clement R. Attlee.

The House voted its confidence in Churchill's economic program, 295 to 277.

Churchill outlined his program earlier in the day. It called for further import cuts, a slowdown in the nation's \$4,094,160,000 rearmament program to spend it over five instead of three years, increased arms sales to the U. S. and Canada to bring in needed dollars, and a switch of some industry from arms production to production for export.

Crops are beginning to be affected by the long-run of hot weather in the Southwest. Soil experts say, rain is needed soon, in order to avoid extensive crop damage and loss of pasturage over the area.

Weathermen said Thursday, while generally a little cooler, still would be warm, and no real break is expected in the Southwest run of hot weather.

Stevenson Charts Own Campaign Course

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., July 31 (UP)—Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson charted his own course for the 1952 presidential campaign Thursday without promising unwavering allegiance to the White House programs of the last 20 years.

The Illinois governor was relying on the polished professionalism of the Democratic national committee to prepare his campaign itineraries, after consulting with him and vice-presidential nominee Sen. John J. Sparkman of Alabama.

But he planned to base the tone and nature of his campaign on his own ideas.

"I propose to run my campaign, as far as the ideas and content of the speeches are concerned, entirely myself," he said.

Assumes Control Over Truman

Stevenson, who was "drafted" for the Democratic presidential nomination last week, even assumed that he would have "some control" over the campaign plans of President Truman, who has promised to stump the country for the governor.

Stevenson has not yet prepared a blueprint for a campaign organization—a job he hopes to finish in the next two weeks. He did, however, give some indication of his views during a news conference under an ash tree on the lawn of the state executive mansion Wednesday.

The governor was asked if he felt he would have any control over other Democrats engaged in the campaign and if he might be able to control how much Mr. Truman campaigns in his behalf.

"The President has offered every co-operation, and I would assume I might have some control over that," Stevenson said. "I think there are a good many of us involved—there will be, I believe, a great deal of co-ordination required for this effort and I'm sure it can and will be satisfactorily achieved."

Wants Truman's Help
"I would certainly want his help in every way I could get it."

Asked if he would conduct a "give 'em hell" campaign, a label applied to President Truman's 1948 campaign tactics, Stevenson replied "I don't believe that I'm gifted in talents of that sort."

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Mystery Mass Cool Air Breaks Heat

A mystery mass of cool air sliced across Texas Thursday, bringing slight—though welcome—relief from the heat, but the rest of the Southwest continued to blister under high temperatures.

Missouri and Kansas got temporary relief from the heat Wednesday. The mercury only climbed to 94 degrees at Joplin, Mo., and Dodge City, Hutchinson and Topeka, Kans. Several showers were given credit for shaking the thermometer down in those areas.

The cool air that skimmed over Texas Thursday, was caused by either several thundershowers or by a high altitude cold air mass said weather bureau forecasters. It skidded temperatures down a few degrees from the 100-marks registered over the state.

In Colorado, New Mexico and Wyoming, scattered storms and generally cloudy skies took the edge off the heat, but meteorologists said the let-up was temporary. Colorado and Wyoming had temperatures generally in the 80's, while New Mexico had several places resorting in the 90's.

Oklahoma and Texas had the usual high number of hot spots. Presidio, Tex., walked away with honors, posting a 105-degree mark to turn the trick.

Light showers predicted for Thursday in all parts of the Southwest were not expected to give much aid in breaking the heat permanently.

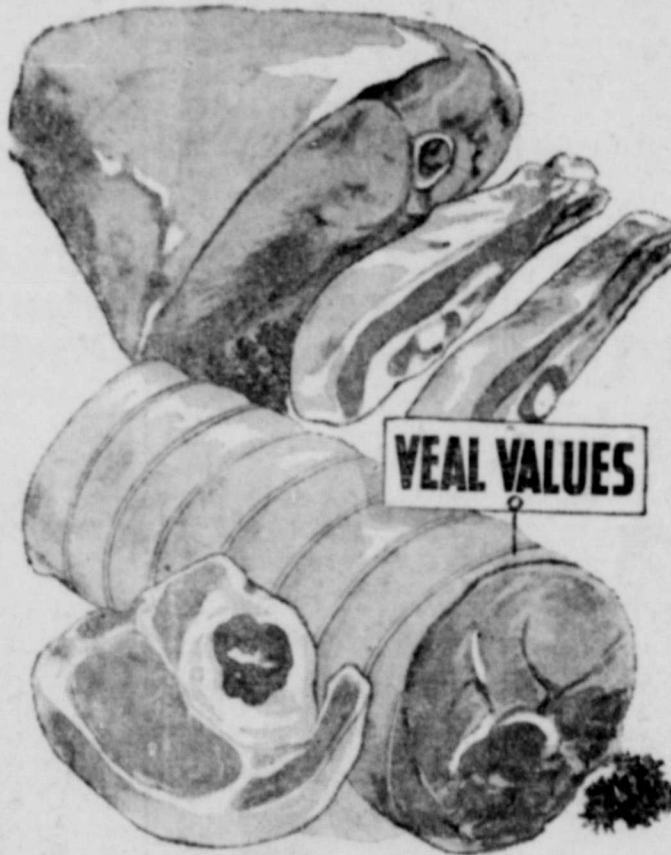

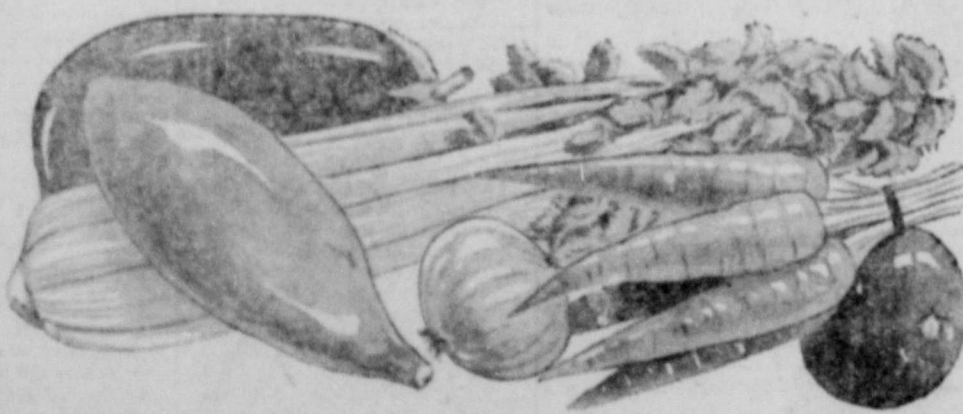

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

Home Purchase contract no casual matter.

The signing of a contract of sale is an extremely important step in the purchase of a home. Once buyer and seller have signed, they are bound by the provisions of the contract. Their respective legal rights in the transaction are thereby set and determined. If the contract is poorly and haphazardly drawn, a harvest of regret may be reaped at a later date.

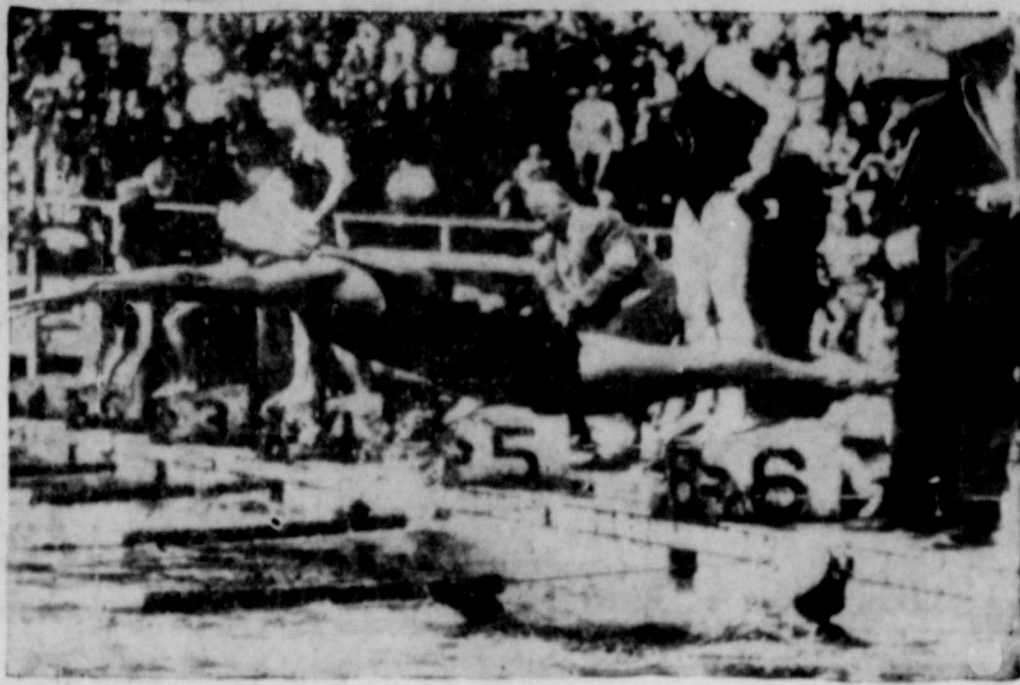
Sales contracts are often called by other names, such as earnest money contracts, binders, receipts, etc. All of them are for the same purpose and almost without exception involve the deposit of money by the buyer. Some require the seller to put up a good faith deposit. The fact that such deposited sums are usually to be forfeited in event the depositor later fails to go through with his specified contractual obligations lends additional weight to the often stated admonition that no contract should be signed without complete understandings as to its terms.

But many home purchasers (and sellers) rush to sign a hastily prepared contract with very little knowledge of its contents. The pressure of time, the informality of the occasion, the casual appearance of the contract, and perhaps the fact that a partially printed form is used may contribute in causing the true importance of the act to be overlooked. At any rate, many are lulled into a lapse of good business judgment.

Every significant detail of the bargain should be crystallized in unmistakable terms in the contract of sale. Land and fixtures being sold should be clearly described. A complete legal description of this property by lot and block, or by metes and bounds, is a must, the street number being inadequate by itself.

Articles and fixtures included in the sale but not always sold with houses generally should be specifically listed. Included in this category are such items as venetian blinds, removal floor coverings, draperies, air conditioning units

and others. In purchasing property under construction, complete plans and specifications form an essential part of the agreement.

The price to be paid must, of course, be specified, along with method and terms of payment. If a certain sized loan is a prerequisite to the buyer's ability to complete the purchase, this fact should be noted. Sad indeed is the prospective purchaser who loses his earnest money when a contemplated loan transaction falls through, his contract requiring payment of the entire consideration in cash.

The sales contract should also state the quality of the title to be conveyed to the buyer and the type of title evidence to be furnished. These matters will be further explained in a later column.

The buyer's individual circumstances and desires may require that various matters not mentioned above be provided for in the contract. A partially printed form may or may not provide sufficient blank space for the addition of all essential details in your case. There is a consistent tendency to try to squeeze every sales contract to fit the type of printed form on hand, omitting or leaving to easily misconstrued or forgotten oral agreement many vital provisions. Do not fall into the "pitfall of the printed form." Too many unfortunate entanglements have been announced by clients to lawyers with the words, "I have just signed a receipt for a

O'Dwyer Says His Argument With UP Chief Is Dead

MEXICO CITY, July 31 (UP)—Ambassador William O'Dwyer said Wednesday his controversy with United Press bureau manager Robert Prescott over whether he intends to become a Mexican citizen was a "closed" case.

The former New York Mayor cursed Prescott in the presence of other American newsmen and U.S. officials Tuesday for reporting that O'Dwyer had hinted to friends he might give up his U. S. citizenship to practice law in Mexico, his "adopted" country.

O'Dwyer, at that time, said he considered his U. S. citizenship sacred and called Prescott a "liar," among other words, for filing the dispatch.

O'Dwyer said he now "considers the case closed," but the ambassador's vitriolic outburst against Prescott was still a live topic for conversation on streets of the na-

tion's capital. The tabloid newspaper La Prensa said "in capital circles the reaction of the diplomat was considered clear demonstration of his animosity against the Mexican."

A photograph illustrating the story showed O'Dwyer, sweating profusely, mopping his brow with a handkerchief.

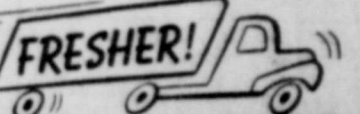

PLUG 'N TRIGGER

By J. FRED ELDER

Conversation of renewable natural resources covers a vast field and many diverse problems which require united efforts for success.

Probably the most serious deficiency in the American conservation program is the complete lack of a unified and coherent rough fish and pollution policy.

These two factors are directly responsible for summing up the American fishing picture in one sentence. Angling pressure is increasing constantly; as a result, the average catch per trip has decreased.

It is true that a greater number of anglers have decreased the individual share but the fact remains that an ever increasing rough fish and pollution problem are the main contributing factors for the steady decline in the angler's take.

Perhaps the greater threat is that of rough fish taking over in a body of water, feeding on insects, marine vegetation, fish eggs, etc.

Carp and other species of rough fish soon create an uninhabitable condition for game fish, being very prolific, their numbers increase by leaps and bounds with serious consequences.

We fish mainly for relaxation but our objective is still to catch fish. If the average catch declines further, many of the nation's 20 million anglers can be expected to turn to other sports for relaxation. That in itself is a serious threat for if a decline in conservation and its problems, relative to the sport of angling, should become predominate among anglers, that lack of interest will eventual-

ly result in ruin. Can our waters support the nation's anglers and their steady increase in numbers? With the proper conservation programs and the control of rough fish elements the answer is definitely yes.

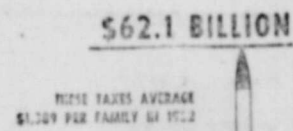
There is growing reason to believe that conditions are improving even though angling pressure continues on a normal increase.

However, at the same time those who are inclined toward pessimism can find plenty of reasons for taking a gloomy look. Pollution has made open sewers of many of our fishing systems.

Siltation has greatly lowered the carrying capacity of our lakes by reducing the food supply and making the environment less suitable for game fish. Rough fish have become overabundant in our new lakes.

Lake Texoma is a prime example of the havoc rough fish can play on game fish populations. The bottom feeding activities of carp and other species of rough fish have roiled the water and destroyed food and vegetation so necessary for the more desirable species.

The selective harvesting of game fish by the angler has resulted in

an over population of pan fish as well as many other species of sun fish. Over-population results in stunting and the stunted sun fish keep the game fish reduced in numbers. Kona interest in the problem manifested by groups of

sportsmen are healthy signs. North Texas and Southern Oklahoma groups of sportsmen are working diligently to solve the problems. Their co-operation with their game departments and field biologists can and will overcome these problems.

Glenn McCarthy In Financial Hot Water Again

HOUSTON, July 31 (UP)—Glenn H. McCarthy, in financial hot water again after a Dallas firm sued him for \$1 million, Thursday prepared a counter-suit for more than \$11 million against Dresser Industries, Inc., of Dallas.

Dresser Industries sued McCarthy in federal district court Wednesday charging default on 12 promissory notes he executed in 1949, when Dresser constructed the Winnie, Texas, plant of the former McCarthy Chemical Co.

McCarthy, who owes two New York insurance companies \$54 million and has lost control of his chemical company, the McCarthy Oil & Gas Co., and his New Ulm oil field to them, said he didn't sue Dresser Industries any money because the Winnie chemical plant was improperly built.

In a handwritten memorandum handed to newsmen Wednesday night, McCarthy said, "a real and substantial controversy has existed from the time the engineering company failed to perform the work they had agreed to do in a

McCarthy said he executed the 12 promissory notes Aug. 19, 1949, to the State-Dresser Engineering Co., which assigned the notes to Dresser Industries, Inc.

At Dallas, Dresser Industries said it now limited its activities to manufacture and supply of oil and gas held equipment and was no longer in the construction business.

McCarthy claimed that if anybody owes any money, the Texas Gas Corp., not him, owes it.
