## VFW Commander Urges Fight Against Reds

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 9 (UP)—The new commander in chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Saturday asked the group to "fight the Communists where ever they raise their heads."

James W. Cothran, 37, of Bishopville, S. C., was elected to office Friday as the organization would up its 52nd annual encampment amid a stormy condemnation of the Embassy hotel for permitting a fund-raising group for 14 convicted California Communists to hold a meeting in its auditorium.

"I refuse to accept my oath as your commander in chief in this auditorium," Cothran said as he took the rostrum in the same hall where the fund raising group had been permitted to hold its meeting the night before.

"I pledge you that we will fight the Communists wherever they raise their heads—both at home and abroad. We demand that this party be outlawed and the 55,000 known Communies be deported from the shores of America," he boomed to the delegates who cheered wildly for 10 minutes after the announcement.

Installation ceremonies then were switched to the auditorium of a downtown hotel. Cothran was opposed to succeed Frank C. Hilton as commander in chief.

Other officers were Wayne E. Richards, Arkansas City, Kans., senior vice-commander, and Meton B. Tice, 43, Mitchell, S. D., junior vice-commander. Robert D. Handy Jr., was elected to his 29th term as quartermaster general.

Mrs. George Holm of Chicago was installed as national president of the VFW's ladies auxiliary, stepping up from senior vice-president. Mrs. Thomas F. Holta, Philadelphia, was elected junior vice-president.

In one of the few contested elections, Dr. Percy Grover of Calabasas, Calif., was elected surgeon-general of the VFW. Other officers elected were Timothy J. Turner, Dorchester, Mass., judges advocated general, and the Rev. Johnstone Beech, Gainesville, Tex., chaplain-general.

## Jimmy Camacho Chosen To Play In East-West All-Star Game

Ranger's Jimmy Camacho has been chosen to play in the East-West All Star Game at Childrens this coming Friday. Word of his selection came through a telephone call from George Stewart, chairman of the all-star selection committee, to Coach O. C. "Stubby" Warden Saturday morning.

Camacho is slated to leave Sunday morning where he will go to training with his teammates on the West eleven for the Friday night's game. Dixie White, Midwestern University coach, will mentor the West team.

Camacho's selection as a member of the West team rounds out four years of high school ball playing for the little speedster. In that four years he has been named all-district four times, honorable mention all-state, all-state on the Associated Press high school eleven, and the second team of the Texas Sports Writers eleven, and has been one of the outstanding football products ever to graduate from Ranger High School.

In his four years at RHE Camacho handled a majority of the running and kicking chores, a portion of the passing, and rounded out this playing linebacker on defense for the maroon and white Bulldogs.

According to best recollections Camacho is the first Bulldog to be chosen to play in a post season game since 1934 when the entire Ranger team played in the first Sun Bowl. And Camacho may be the first individual to be chosen for this honor.

### Ira Grigsby Instantly Killed When 6000 Volt Charge Passes Through Body; Funeral In Groesbeck Sat.

Funeral services for Ira Joseph Grigsby, 42, Eastland electrician, who died yesterday at De Leon, after coming in contact with 6000 volts of electricity when a high-line fell to his shoulder. Death was almost instantaneous, though funeral directors worked for some time with a pulmotor in an effort to revive him.

Mr. Grigsby had been living in Eastland for several years, and formerly connected with the REA. However, at the time he was employed by Taylor Electric Co., of Eastland, electrical contractors, who were doing some special work for the Texas Electric Service Co., at De Leon.

His wife, Mrs. Stella Grigsby, is General Manager of the Hollywood-Maxwell garment plants in Eastland.

The accident occurred Friday morning, and the body was brought to Eastland in the afternoon. Later it was removed to Groesbeck, Texas, by the Hamner Funeral Home.

Funeral services were held in the Shelton Funeral Chapel in Groesbeck at 4 p.m. Saturday.

A son, Harvey Glen Grigsby, who is stationed at an Air Base in San Antonio, was notified of the accident, and he was flown to Abilene, where Eastland friends had gone to meet him. However, because of a severe rain, wind and

### Russia Claims More Firsts In Shipbuilding

LONDON, Aug. 9 (UP)—Russia let it be known Saturday that she is a "great sea-going country" because she built the first steamboat, motor vessel, submarine, ice-breaker and oil tanker.

Radio Moscow made the claim and also credited Soviet shipbuilders with inventing the longitudinal system of shipbuilding as well as "the theory of the insinkability of ships."

The first steamship was built by Russian inventor Igor Petrovich Kuligin in 1804, following an idea expressed by the Russian scientist Rernull in the early 18th Century, Radio Moscow said.

Accepted records credit Jouffroy of France with the first experimental steamboat in 1783 while Robert Fulton got his first steamboat operating in 1803 but didn't produce a practical model until 1807.

Radio Moscow said the first submarine was built in 1724 by Efik Nikonov, a Russian peasant. That would have been 170 years before U. S. inventor Lake produced the first western sub.

Peiping radio led off the latest blast by claiming that American warplanes flew across the Yalu river into Manchuria 7 times during the first week of August. It charged a total of 398 sorties during the week and said one American plane dropped 21 bombs on a Manchurian town, seriously injuring two persons.

### Ex-Communist Grateful Over Judge's Order

WENDELL, N. H., Aug. 9—Karl Asari Latva choked up with gratitude Saturday after the Justice Department assured him that—unless the FBI turns up new evidence against him—he will not be deported for unwittingly joining the Communist party 18 years ago.

The 49 year old loom-fixer was described by his war veteran sons as "overwhelmed" by U. S. Attorney General James P. McGranery's promise to use his discretionary powers to prevent Latva from being deported to his native Finland.

Latva was ordered to leave the country after admitting to a naturalization investigator that he joined the Communist party for four months in 1934 and paid 90 cents in dues. He said he thought he was joining a union that would help win a textile strike then in progress.

"I don't think, in good conscience, the American people would except me to prosecute if those facts are borne out," McGranery said in Washington Friday night.

Latva's two sons, Carl, 28, and Paul, 26, said McGranery's assurance "certainly is good news. It's wonderful to get such quick action."

Latva also received cheerful tidings from Rep. Francis E. Walter D-Penn., co-author of the new Walter-McCarran Immigration Act. Walter said that under a provision of the act effective next Dec. 24 a Communist will not be deported if his record and character have been satisfactory for 10 years after quitting the party.

The new law, Walter said, is "very liberal and generous" toward anyone who "may have joined a subversive organization without knowing its true aims."

### Heiress Met At Border By Lover

LAREDO, Aug. 9 (UP)—Miss Nancy Oakes, whose first husband was tried and acquitted of the murder of her father, was on her way to Mexico City Saturday, accompanied by her fiancé, Baron Ernest Lysard.

Engagement of the couple was announced earlier in the week, by Lady Eunice Oakes, mother of Nancy.

Miss Oakes said she and the baron would probably take the noon plane for Mexico City. The baron surprised Miss Oakes by showing up in Laredo Friday. He originally planned to meet her in Mexico City.

### McGranery Aided By "New Team" Is Set For Cleanups

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (UP)—Attorney General James P. McGranery, backed by a new Justice Department "team," called signals Saturday for important federal prosecutions across the nation.

President Truman added several new top names to the department roster Friday. McGranery himself reshuffled the lineup a little and said "very fine progress" has been made towards a departmental reorganization.

The Attorney General said the department, which came under heavy congressional fire during the regime of McGranery's predecessor J. Howard McGrath, has given the nation "the certain knowledge that wrong will be exposed and punished."

Late Friday the Attorney General announced three new cases which the department is preparing for court action.

1. A "flock" of indictments are to be expected from the department's investigation of job-selling at the big Chicago post office. McGranery said the question now is simply "how many" will be indicted as a result of irregularities in which post office employees seeking promotions to better jobs are said to have paid as much as \$500 to superiors.

2. A grand jury will investigate reports of bribes and other irregularities in the 1946 sale of the St. Johns River shipyard at Jacksonville, Fla., as surplus government property. In what seemed to be a dig at former Attorney General Tom C. Clark, now a supreme court justice, McGranery said the case has "been around here for six years... should have been investigated more thoroughly... should have been presented to a grand jury then."

3. Deportation cases will be pressed against about 100 Canadians who obtained immigration visas fraudulently by misrepresenting their financial status to the U. S. consulate in Windsor, Ont.

### Greco-Bulgarian Isle Dispute Is Major UN Issue

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Aug. 9 (UP)—Greco-Bulgarian frontier dispute over tiny Gamma Island threatened Saturday to become a major United Nations issue after Bulgaria charged formally that Greece had displayed an "openly aggressive and bellicose policy."

11th allies now have filed protests with the UN secretary. UN peace observation commission members on the scene have warned that a "very dangerous situation" might result from the incident.

Greece ignored Bulgaria's protest. Officials in Athens termed the Bulgarian message "more Communist in tone."

Bulgarian Foreign Minister Minko Neychev told the UN secretary that the Greeks "provocatively" sent aircraft to the frontier area and opened a bombardment of Gamma Island after "all sorts of warnings and menaces to the Bulgarian frontier patrol."

The Bulgarian note did not mention whether Bulgarian forces had occupied Gamma Island. The Bulgarians withdrew Friday, according to an Athens communique, after the Greek bombardment.

Gamma Island is one of three sand bars on the Evros river which forms 10 miles of the Greco-Bulgarian border in Thrace.

Food Prices In Line, Is Claim

Charges by some city dwellers that farmers are responsible for high food prices are unjust, according to Representative Harold D. Cooley of North Carolina, (D.) chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture.

Prices of food and other agriculture commodities are not out of line with national and individual income and prices of all other things, including labor and services, Congressman Cooley says in August "Farm and Ranch Southern Agriculturist."

"Compared to the average city family's income, food actually is cheaper today than it was in the 1930's-1939, he observes. "In the years 1935-1939, the average consumer spent 22 per cent of his total income for food. At the end of 1951, that same food would have cost him only 17 per cent of his income."

"We Americans are eating more and better food today than ever before and the United States is one of the three nations in the world where agriculture production is keeping pace with increasing population," Congressman Cooley points out. "This is possible only because American farmers are realizing sufficient income to pay for the costly improvements required by increased productivity."

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**Deep Plowing Is No Cure For Wind Erosion, Claim**

Deep plowing in itself is not a cure—all for wind erosion, W. M. Nixon advises farmers in August Farm and Ranch-Southern Agri-culturist.

"In fact," warns Nixon, "it eventually will do more harm than good, unless it is combined with an agricultural program which will put organic matter in the soil."

Nixon recalls that some Oklahoma farmers deep plowed their fields in 1950 and again in 1951 to stop erosion.

"They failed to include any vegetative measures, however, and the soil blew so badly last spring that big mounds of sand piled up along the edges of their fields," Nixon says.

He points out that other sandy-land farmers in the same area who practiced deep plowing since 1939 have controlled wind erosion and increased crop yields. Along with deep plowing, they carried on a program of cover cropping and stubble mulching, Nixon says.

**Iranian Senate Denies Dictator Powers To Leader**

TEHRAN, Iran, Aug. 9 (UPI)—The Iranian Senate refused Saturday to vote dictatorial powers for Premier Mohammed Mossadegh.

Instead the senate decided in closed session to send a delegation of nine to see Mossadegh Saturday night and ask him the reasons for his demands for full powers in executive and legislative matters.

Among the rebellious senators who argued that Mossadegh's request was unconstitutional was his own son-in-law, Martin Daftari.

Another senator, Abolfazl Lesani, conceded he "might be committing suicide" by opposing the dictatorial powers bill, but added: "Suicide is a far smaller evil than the destruction and murder of Iran's constitution. We must be prepared to sacrifice even our lives in defense of the constitution."

The bill empowering Mossadegh to govern by decree was approved almost unanimously by the Majlis, lower house of parliament, and had been expected to get similar treatment in the upper house.
