

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

The Executive Secretary expressed pessimim over the likelihood of having Texas zoned for waterfowl, but he foresaw compensating allowances.

The Game and Fish Commissio making its annual recommeda ons, asked that Texas be goned for waterfowl and that if zoning were not allowed, that a state vide season open on October 31 The theory then was that a season longer than the 50-day 1951 shoot was in prospect.

The Executive Secretary said he obtained the impression Washington that any liberalizing in the waterfowl regulations would be n a longer season. He said this ould be the outgrowth of increasig influence which the Council of Flyways has been conceded by the sh and Wildlife Service.

The Executive Secretary, who represented the Central Flyway at the Council meeting, said the Council petitioned the Washington au thorities to assign a Federal cordinator to each flyway to work with the states' game administraors and technicians.

This would be a key part of all ntirely new approach to the rerulatory problems within the Flyvays. It would provide greater sensitivity to the needs of the waterfowl, to the problems of agricultural interests along the Flyways and in the winter feeding areas, and to the rights of the hunter. 

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
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
