## CHAMBER COMMERCE EXPIRING DIRECTORS POSITIONS FILLED

The Ranger Chamber of Commerce has three new members of its board of directors and two men who were returned for another term on that body.

New directors are Morris Newnam, James Ratliff, and Buck Wallace. These three men replaced W. F. Creiger, J. A. Bates, and H. P. Earnest, A. N. Larson and David Pickrell were re-appointed Chamber of Commerce directors.

The Ranger City Commission appoints the directors of the chamber by virtue of powers invested in them by the charter of the city and the financial assistance given the Chamber of Commerce under the city charter.

When the terms of one or more of the directors expires the names of three prospective directors for that position on the board are submitted to the City Commission by the Chamber of Commerce for the commissioners to select from that list one man they desire as a director.

Each year the terms of five of the fifteen directors of the organization expire and five more are appointed to fill the vacant terms. The newly appointed members of the board will take office October 1 of this year.

From this body of 15 men who govern the actions of the chamber are elected the officers of the organization. The election of officers for the terms beginning on October 1 will be held Tuesday night, Sept. 2, at the Chamber of Commerce.

R. V. Galloway is the manager of the organization.

A former Morton Valley school teacher, Mrs. W. R. Dunlap, 43, passed away Monday, August 18 at Temple, following an operation August 1.

Funeral was Wednesday afternoon at Ralls.

## City-Wide Trash Pick-up Started

### Truck To Cover Each Alley Over Short Period Time

City Manager Lester Crossley announced Monday that effective immediately the city sanitation department would begin a systematic trash removal program for the entire town.

Heretofore the city trash removal had been a contract-let basis and residents who did not pay could not have their refuse hauled off by the city agent. This city function has been returned to city control and will be made available on an equal basis to all residents.

A charge of twenty-five cents per month will be assessed against each resident to be added on his water bill for financial support of the sanitation program newly instituted.

This method of keeping the city trash-free was undertaken after various civic organizations, the city health officer, and the state department of health had requested that it be done.

The pickup operation will be a continuous process with the truck following a prepared schedule that will cover every alley in town. Residents are urged to discontinue calling the City Manager for trash removal as this will be an automatic function of the city in the future.

In those alleys which have been obstructed and bar the entrance of the truck steps will be taken to have them opened where at all possible. Impassable alleys are slated to be made passable by the city maintainer as quickly as time allows to expedite the pickup process.

The city urged that containers be used by each resident that will make loading of the trash possible by the men. A container must be used and the refuse not thrown loosely on the ground. In which case it will not be picked up by the truck.

The City Manager said he had written several letters to concerns using products from containers or barrels that might be purchased economically by the city and sold at cost to residents for trash barrels at cost. This would aid the pickup program by making the pickup faster and more thorough. These containers would be for those persons not already having acceptable depositories.

Crossley also mentioned that persons not on the city water rolls would be charged as well as those who are on the rolls under this plan.

Ranger's adopting this method of cleanliness and sanitation will bring it in line with almost all other towns who use this method.

## Water Pump Failure Overcome; Users Can Use Water Normally

The trouble concerning the lift pump at the City Water Works has been overcome and users may return once again to normal usage City Manager Lester Crossley said Monday morning. The pump at the filter station had been "sucking" air through a faulty packing around the shaft and filling the line with air which built up pressure and prohibited normal use of the lift pump.

With the pump out of commission the water in the city stand-pipe got as low as one ring, but has since risen to over the six ring mark. Crossley said they expected to be caught up fully by today.

Sunday was a peak usage day for Ranger when 948,600 gallons of water was used by city residents in keeping themselves cool, clean, and their lawns and shrubbery alive.

Present water supply left in Hagaman Lake was estimated to run us at top usage until February or March by the city manager.

Ranger finds itself in the present position of little water worry by virtue of a small cloudburst May 17 that dumped as high as six inches of rain on the lake's watershed and filled the reservoir to capacity. Ranger is one of few West Texas towns boasting water.

## Commission Will Act As Board Of Tax Equalization

The City Commission has appointed itself the board of equalization for the approaching tax year and will start work on equalizing the city tax rolls tonight.

Little or no raise is expected to result from the scrutiny of the tax rolls by the commission equalizers, other than those found to high or low which will be brought in line with proper rates in like cases.

The commission took upon itself the task of acting as a board of equalization to prevent appointing an outside board from the locality who would have to bear the criticism emerging from such a procedure, although they are employed by the city laws to do so.

After each commission meeting notices will be mailed to persons whose taxes are equalized from this past year telling them when to appear before the board on behalf of their case. In the event the tax payer receives no notice there will be no change and his rendition for the past year will be accepted as good for the coming year.

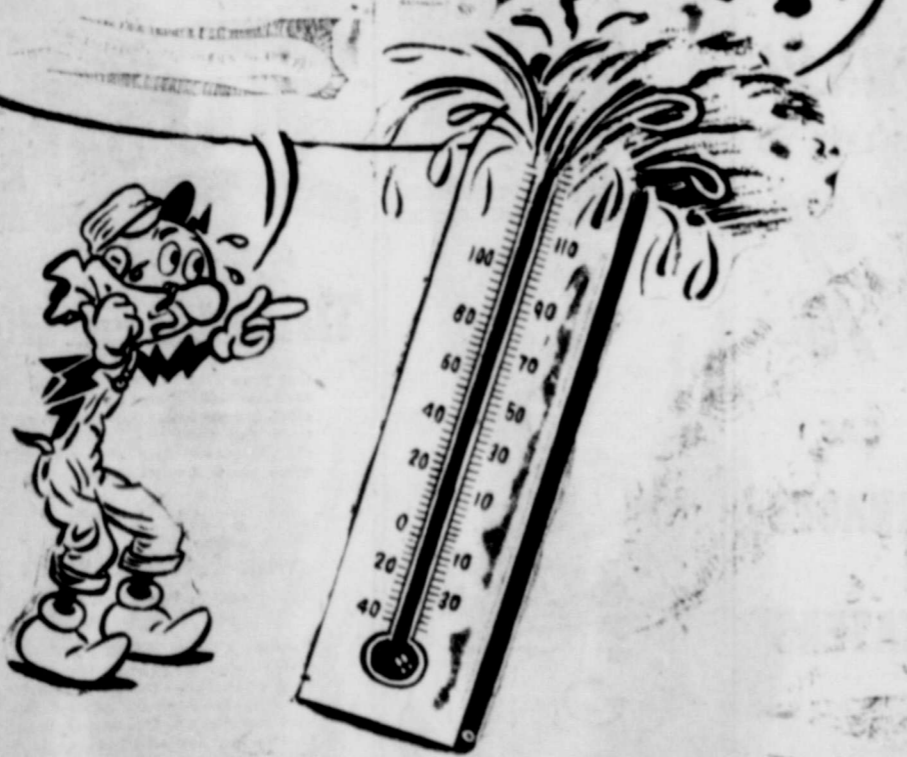
