



Go Hawaiian with refreshments, too

As every hostess knows, there's nothing like the Hawaiian touch to put sparkle and fun into a luncheon or dinner party. Or into simple refreshments before or after a game of cards or an evening of tele-viewing! -

One easy but dramatic way to say Hawaii in refreshments is with pincapple-shaped cookies to go along with ice cream that's topped with minted pineapple. There's nothing difficult about cutting out cooky dough in the shape of a pineapple! All you need do is make a cardboard

pattern (about 4 inches long from hase to top of leaves) being eareful not to make the leaves too thin and spindly. Lay the pattern over rolledout dough and cut around it with the tip of a small knife. Once the cookies are on the cooky sheet, press the body of each "pineapple" lightly with the side of a fork to give an air of realism.

When it comes to a recipe for sugar cookies that are easy to handle and easy to cat whether cut in pineapple shapes or in regulation rounds, you'll like this one especially well.

Crisp Sugar Cookies 11/2 cups C and H Cane Granulated Sugar I cup mixed butter and

Using spoon or electric mixer at low speed, gradually add sugar to short-ening, heating until fluffy. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Add cream and flavorings. Stir in flour sitted with soda and salt; mix well. Cover and chill until stiff. Roll out a small chill until stiff. Roll out a small amount at a time very thin on lightly floured board or canvas. Cut with floured cooky cutter, or lay card-board pattern on the dough and cut around it with tip of knife. Bake on ungreased baking sheet at 400°E. (hot) 6 to 9 minutes, until golden. Remove at once to rack to cool. Makes, 4 to 6 dozen medium-size.

Pineapple Sundae Sauce

Cook together 1½ cups crushed pineapple (not drained) and ¾ cup Cand H Cane Granulated Sugar over moderate heat until thick. Chill. Serve as is, or, if your prefer, tint pale green with food coloring, and add 2 or 3 drops of mint flavoring. Makes 4 sundaes.
