Cool weather calls for hearty desserts—such as this tender, juicy Apple Pie—served warm.

Serve the all-time favorite, Apple Pie, for dessert tonight when hungry children trip in from school. It doesn't take long to make—and how pleased your family will be.

The recipe for the crust makes golden color and tenderness as easy as well as pie. The pretty design is no trick at all. Make one like it or draw upon your imagination plus a cookie cutter for your own version. Be sure, though, that there are openings in the top of the crust to let out flavor-laden steam from the baking apples. Press the top and bottom layers of pastry together and there'll be no spilling over of savory juices.

If you are hurried, order a baker's pie and pop it in a low-heat oven just before dinner is called.

Everyone is convinced that Apple Pie is good eating. Ever consider, though, that it has important nutrient contributions? The enriched flour in the crust contributes extra B-vitamins, food iron and protein. The apples add more vitamins and minerals.

Feature Apple Pie at your next dessert party. Trim the pie with wedges of sharp Cheddar cheese and serve along with a bowl of grapes and a dish of salted mixed nuts.

APPLE PIE

2 cups sifted enriched flour
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup shortening
3/4 cup cold water
Roll out other half of pastry to circle to cover pie pan. Place on top of Apple Filling. Trim and flute edges. Cut design in top pastry. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) 15 minutes. Reduce to a moderate oven (350° F.) and continue baking 30 minutes, or until apples are tender.

Apple Filling

1 1/2 cups sliced apples
1/2 cup sugar (brown or white)
1/2 cup water
1/2 teaspoon lemon juice
1/2 cup sugar (brown or white)
2 tablespoons enriched flour
1 teaspoon cinnamon
Peel and slice apples. Mix lightly with butter or margarine and lemon juice. Combine sugar, flour and cinnamon and mix well with apples. Arrange evenly in pie shell.
Makes 1 9-inch apple pie.

Airman Linked To Oklahoma Waitress Death

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 5 (UP)—State Crime Bureau officers Friday said they are investigating a 21-year-old Air Force man concerning the butler slaying of Jackie Stevens, 21-year-old Dallas waitress, whose headless body was found near Yukon, Okla., July 30. FBI agents arrested the service-

man in Long Beach, Calif., Thursday as a deserter.

State Crime Bureau Chief O. K. Bivins said the soldier left Oklahoma City shortly after the dismembered body was found.

"We know the soldier was in Oklahoma City at the time the waitress was slain," Bivins said. "We can't divulge what information we have. We just want to question him about the slaying."

Body Was Cut Up

Miss Stevens' head and hands were found in a pool of water south of Yukon several days after her body was discovered. The letters "Rat" had been carved on the soldier's abdomen, leading officers to believe she might have been the victim of an underworld gang.

D. A. Dryce, FBI agent in charge of the Oklahoma area, said the soldier was held as a deserter and on suspicion of fraud and issuing bogus checks.

"We will turn him over to the nearest air base at the point of his arrest," Dryce said. "I understand Oklahoma authorities want to question the suspect. Unless charges are filed here, the officers will have to go to California to do the questioning."

Bivins said the airman's mother lives near Oklahoma City. He said the soldier is suspected of purchasing a new Oldsmobile from the Coffeen Motor Co. here, trading in an automobile he rented in Rapid City, S. D., where he was once stationed.

Oklahoma City police records indicated the soldier is also wanted in Rapid City for using bogus checks.

Believe Murders Connected

Investigation in the slaying until Friday had been at a stalemate since early last month. Officers traced Miss Stevens' movements from Odessa, Tex. to Henrietta, Decatur and Alford, Tex., where she was reported seen only a few hours before her death.

Officers believe two other unsolved murders may be connected with the case. The body of an unidentified man who had been shot 10 times was found near Decatur the same day Miss Stevens was seen there.

Miss Stevens' body was found in Oklahoma only a few miles from where the dismembered body of another waitress, Mrs. Lois Dewey, Oklahoma City, was found in March.

At one point in the investigation, a former Cleveland, Ohio police detective said he believed the slayer might be the "mad butcher of Kingsbury Run."

The former officer, Peter Merzlo, referred to the early 1930s when 13 persons were found with their heads cut off or otherwise

Talks On Oatis Release From Prison Ended

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5 (UP)—Ambassador Ellis O. Briggs Friday wound up secret strategy talks on American efforts to free newsmen William N. Oatis from a Czech prison cell.

Briggs, who headed for a long-delayed Maine vacation before taking over as new U. S. ambassador to Korea, declined to disclose what he and Secretary of State Dean Acheson discussed.

It was understood, however, that Briggs was unable to report any break in his fruitless negotiations with the Russian satellite nation.

Oatis, frail, mild-mannered Associated Press correspondent in Prague, was jailed 18 months ago on trumped-up spy charges. Every diplomatic maneuver has failed to win his release. The most the Reds have done was to allow Briggs to see Oatis in his cell once last April.

Briggs, who has just returned from Prague, made a detailed, personal report on the case late Thursday to Acheson and other top State Department officials.

Although 4,575,000 persons were of voting age in Texas in 1948, only 1,147,245 cast their ballots for presidential electors. This was only 25.1 per cent of the civilian population of voting age. On a national scale, it is estimated that 98,377,000 persons will be of voting age by election day in November, an increase of 2,462,900 voters since 1948, when the number of civilians of voting age was 94,916,000. The vote cast was 48,833,680 or 51.4 per cent of those twenty-one and over.
