## "SEASON'S OPENER SATURDAY NIGHT" "Rangers" Get In Fighting Trim For Decatur Baptist

The Ranger Junior College Rangers coach by Boone Yarborough and Dick Henderson open the season against Decatur Baptist College at Decatur Saturday night at 8:00 o'clock.  
The college Saturday night will officially begin its second year in the strong Pioneer Junior College Athletic Conference in which they compete against schools that have as high as 2000 enrollment compared to the less than 200 at RJC.  
The college squad this year is formed by 32 men, most of whom will don the purple and white for the first time this year. Most of the lettermen returning and the new candidates for the eleven can boast of past all-district honors before coming to the college.  
Practice opened this year on Sept. 1 in the college's conference, thus the team goes into the initial contest with less than twelve days work. Injuries in the opening days of training plagued the team but recoveries have been rapid and the squad is in good shape physically other than a few whose hurts linger on.  
Six members of the offensive and six members of the defensive starting eleven will be returning lettermen, the newcomers to the squad filling five positions on

### ALICE ATTORNEY HELD FOR JIM WELLS COUNTY MURDER

ALICE, Tex., Sept. 11 (UP)—The law partner of a candidate for district attorney was held on a murder charge Thursday as Texas Rangers investigated a political assassination plot that backfired and left an innocent youth dead.  
Nago Alanis, a handsome attorney, was charged with murder with malice in connection with the slaying of Jacob S. Buddy Floyd, Jr., the 22-year-old son of a powerful political machine that runs Duval and Jim Wells counties in South Texas.  
Texas Rangers and local authorities agreed that the man who shot down the Floyd youth Monday night was a paid killer who intended to murder the elder Jacob S. Floyd for political reasons.  
They were sure that the answer to the "mistake" slaying of the young law student lay in the turbulent political empire and feud of the two notorious Texas counties.  
Alanis was held without bond. He is the law partner of the Democratic nominee for district attorney, Rayburn Norris, a political protégé of George Parr, the "Duke of Duval county." Officers refused to disclose the information on which they based their murder charge.  
Two other men also were charged in the case—Mario El Turko Sapate, a 40-year-old San Antonio tavern operator and former Jim Wells county special deputy sheriff, and an unidentified man still being sought. District Attorney Homer E. Dean said Thursday, "we still want some more people."

### Gerald Lee Hit By Car; Treated For Fracture

Gerald Lee, 810 Third St., employee of the Phillips Transport Co., is in the West Texas hospital being treated for injuries received last night when he was struck by a car at the intersection of Hunt St. and Highway 80.  
The accident happened about 9:45 p. m. during a light rain. Driver of the car hitting Lee was Billy Townsend.  
Townsend slid the car forty feet on the wet, gravel covered pavement, before striking Lee, police man Ed Freeman said. At the time Lee was hit he was only four feet from the ramp of the Still Service Station and about the same distance off the highway.  
Lee is being treated for a compound fracture of the upper right leg and severe head lacerations. Dr. P. M. Kuykendall stated this morning.  
Officer Freeman said the incident was deemed accidental and no charges were filed in the case.

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### At Least One Known Dead From Drouth Breaking Rain Falling

SAN SABA, Tex., Sept. 11 (UP)—The multi-million dollar Texas drouth was shattered Thursday by torrential rainfall unofficially measured as high as 23 inches and state disaster crews mobilized to fight the threat of a major flood throughout Central and West Texas claimed at least one life, a 66-year-old Fredericksburg farmer, who drowned Wednesday when the embankment of a drainage ditch on which he was standing collapsed.  
The highway patrol said Boerne, Johnson City, San Saba, Comfort, Fredericksburg and Kerrville were isolated by high waters. The Guadalupe river was near flood stage at Gonzales and the 100 residents of Welfare, along the Comal river, were being evacuated from their homes.  
William L. McGill, state civil defense and disaster relief director said the San Saba river, fed by Swollen Brady creek, was just four feet below the "disastrous 1938 flood" level and that the city of San Saba "looks like it will be the trouble spot."  
The Lower Colorado River Authority said at last report the San Saba river was 39 feet and rising. The Llano river measured 35 feet at Llano and also was rising. The highway patrol said Palo Alto creek bridge on the Llano highway near Fredericksburg was washed out.  
Body Lodged In Tree  
Two dams north of Boerne, including the Big Joshua dam, broke Wednesday afternoon. Five feet of water from Cibolo creek rushed over Highway 87, subsided and then was supplemented by continuing rain.  
The Blanco bridge south of Blanco and the Pedernales river bridge on Highway 281 north of Johnson City also washed out, the highway patrol said.  
G. L. Tatom, who owns a ranch at Blanco, reported to radio station WOAI in San Antonio that he measured 22.9 inches of rain at his place.  
The body of F. O. McKinney was found lodged in a tree in the drainage ditch two miles northeast of Fredericksburg.  
Dr. and Mrs. Joe Davis of Welfare were rescued from seven feet of water which flooded their home near Welfare when the Big Joshua river dam broke.  
Guard Units Moved  
McGill said "forced evacuation" of San Saba "was in prospect" if the river's water rose much higher.  
Thunderstorms created by a weak cyclonic circulation, which moved in from the Gulf of Mexico, dumped 10 inches of rain on Eden, Texas, upstream on Brady creek, Wednesday. The ordinarily tame stream rose to within five inches of the top of the Brady floodwall and crested at 24 feet seven inches, before receding and rushing toward San Saba.  
McGill said Capt. E. K. Brownling and three units of Texas highway patrolmen were sent to San Saba from Austin and 17 patrolmen and Texas National Guard units mobilized Wednesday by Capt. Ray Butler of San Angelo moved from Brady to San Saba as the flood threat centered here.

### Soviets Still Block American Patrol Crossing

BERLIN, Sept. 11 (UP)—Western authorities reported a wave of arrests by Communist police as Soviets Thursday blocked Allied patrols again from moving directly to checkpoints on the Berlin end of the superhighway to West Germany.  
West Berlin police said the Communist peoples police arrested two teen-aged German girls Wednesday night on the border of the French and Soviet sectors.  
A third West Berliner was arrested as he crossed the boundary from the British sector of the city into East Germany, the police said.  
Two British officers arrested in East Berlin Wednesday by armed Communist police were released by the Soviets Thursday. British authorities announced. The two officers were turned over to the British at the Soviet headquarters in the Karlshorst district of East Berlin.  
Three British soldiers missing in East Germany still were unaccounted for and were believed to be in Communist hands.

### Assault Case Is Set For Trial

The case styled State of Texas vs. Harold Dean Nicholas who is charged with assault with intent to rape, has been set for trial on Sept. 24.  
Nicholas was indicted by a recent grand jury.

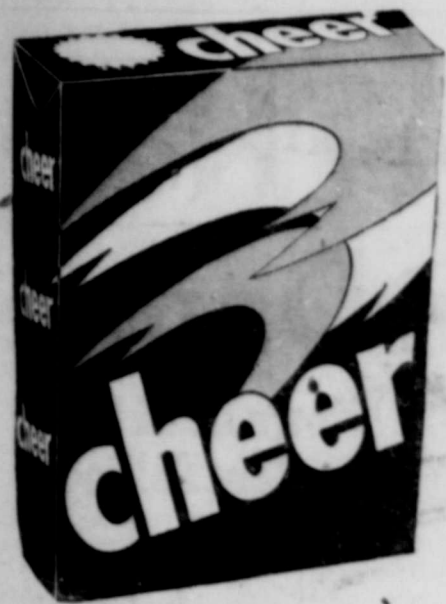
## Bulldogs Open Season Friday Night At Eight At Jacksboro
