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**Shivers Issues Orders To Curb Disease Threat**

AUSTIN, Oct. 1 (UP)—Gov. Allan Shivers Wednesday issued orders modifying regulations aimed at curbing the spread of vesicular exanthema, a hog disease which has broken out in several states.

The new proclamation, issued on recommendation of the livestock sanitary commission, replaces a previous one issued in August and provides:

Imported swine may be transported from one central stockyard to another, or from stockyards to slaughtering establishments within Texas by truck as well as by rail. Under the previous regulation shipments could be made only by rail.

### Oil Is Vital In Economic Gains Of Ranger Area

The continued development of the oil industry in this section of the state is an important factor in the economic growth and gain of Ranger and Eastland county, David D. Pickrell, superintendent of the Premier Oil & Refining Co. plant here and local chairman for Oil Progress Week—Oct. 6-12, said today.

Role of the oil industry as taxpayer at the State level is illustrated by the following interesting statistical information being released by Chairman Pickrell and other Oil Progress Week leaders over the state and nation:

The Texas petroleum industry is paying 67.3 per cent of all the business and property taxes collected by the State.

Some of those benefited—and how well—are shown in these figures:

The petroleum industry pays 37.8 per cent of all the money that goes into the Available School Fund. The per capita allotment of \$62 per student which each local school receives comes from this fund.

The petroleum industry pays 54.9 per cent of all the money that goes into the Foundation School Fund.  
It pays 41.1 per cent of all the money that goes into the General Revenue Fund.  
It pays 57.3 per cent of all the state money that goes into the Old Age Assistance Fund.  
It pays 42.3 per cent of all the money that goes into the Farm-to-Market Road Fund.  
And the petroleum industry pays 58.5 per cent of all state money that goes into the Teachers' Retirement Fund.

### Expose Sale of Babies

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 4 (UP)—

A San Antonio official charged Saturday that a "black market in babies" was operating on a large scale here and might be working on a state-wide basis throughout Texas.

A joint conference of city, county and state welfare authorities was called for next Thursday by Calvin Dodds, executive secretary of the San Antonio Children's Service Bureau.

Dodds said the air of the conference would be to find ways to fight an adoption racket through-

out the state. He blamed weak adoption laws for the black market.

Two San Antonio newspapers have disclosed they arranged to "buy" a baby for \$435, including an \$85 fee for a "special attorney." Reporters had posed as man and wife.

The reporters said in the San Antonio News that they had talked with a woman "doctor" who offered to sell them the infant for \$435. The "special attorney" would "fix it up," the woman told them. The reporters said another wom-

an, a midwife, told them she "knew a woman about to have a child which would be wonderful for us."

They quoted the Rev. Robert L. Armour, superintendent of the Texas Mission Training Home as saying: "Black market babies is one of the biggest businesses in San Antonio."

Dodds said an official of the Texas Department of public Welfare had told him, "I knew this had been going on in several communities."

## Russia May End Korean War

LONDON, Oct. 3 (UP)—Premier Josef Stalin's latest pronouncement on Soviet foreign policy may mean a lessening of worldwide tension, Russian experts here said Friday.

They said that Stalin's article in the magazine Bolshhevik, the Communist handbook of current political thought, sets the course of Soviet development for a long time to come.  
It may indicate a switch in Russian foreign policy toward a Com-

munist hands-off "co-existence" with the West, as the Red world stands by waiting for the Capitalists to destroy themselves economically.

Stalin's article plus the formidable Soviet delegation which will go to New York for the United Nations general assembly were tied together by the experts as an indication of a new Soviet policy. They said the Russians probably will make new proposals in the UN for an overall settle-

ment of Far Eastern problems.  
Stalin's article sets the ideological platform for both the Peiping "peace Congress" which opened Thursday and the national convention of the Soviet Communist party which opens Sunday in Moscow.

Many experts felt that Stalin's article was a message to the Congress—making it clear that although George M. Malenkov will make the main report to the meeting—Stalin himself still is setting the party and government policy.

Kenneth sayman and E. T. Robertson, Rangerites who head the song group, urge local residents to turn out and help make the Sunday afternoon session an impressive event.

### Newnham Is First To Pay

The City of Ranger's No. 1 "early bird" taxpayer for 1952 is Morris Newnham, manager of the Ranger Frozen Food Locker plant and one of the community's leading civic leaders, who jumped the gun and paid his tax bill 19 days before it officially became due.

State, county, and city taxes became due and payable on Wednesday, Oct. 1.

But Newnham was several days early, having paid his municipal fees on Sept. 22. Lester Crossley, city manager, reported Friday.

A total of 1,845 tax statements were mailed this year, and the total bill for 1952, City Manager Crossley reports, is \$55,000. Final deadline date for payment of currently due taxes, he reminds, is January 31, 1953.

### Member Drive To Buy Instruments

**Urges Planting Of Supplemental Pastures Now**

There are a lot of mighty good reasons why farmers and livestock producers should plant now supplemental pastures. E. M. Trew, associate agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station, lists some of them.

Because of the drought, he says, perennial pastures have taken a terrific beating and livestock should not be permitted to graze them until the pastures have had a chance to come back. The plants that come back, after rains do fall, will be in very poor condition and if grazed off immediately, the desirable pasture plants may be lost. Then too, livestock no doubt will go into the winter in poor condition and the cost of wintering will be much greater per animal if supplemental grazing is not provided.

A recent study made by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station shows that in Central Texas as the cost for supplemental feed for wintering an ewe was \$10 more and for a cow \$24 more when no pasture was available.

Stockmen, points out Trew, who use supplemental pastures for late fall, winter and spring grazing know their value not only from the standpoint of what is done for the cattle but also, for soil improvement. He recommends the planting of at least one acre of supplemental pasture for each cow or animal units.

Another mighty important reason for planting pastures now is to supply the need for green feed. A lack of green feed or a good substitute over an extended period of time can result in vitamin A deficiency and other troubles.

Right now most areas of the state do not have moisture available for germinating seed but Trew suggests, if the seed has been prepared, that seeding be done even if the seed must be dusted in. The time gained by this operation, prior to a rain, will mean two weeks to a month earlier grazing. He says put down the fertilizer because it will not be lost even if no rain falls.
