### Thugs At Large; Drinking Costly For Ranger Man

There's nothing further to report on the assailants who slugged Alfred Dupree, about 33, of Ranger, out on Highway 281 near Stephenville Wednesday afternoon, Police Chief W. G. Pounds reported this morning.

Dupree, who was hitch-hiking from Stephenville to Ranger, was found unconscious at the side of the highway by a 1952 model Ford automobile, believed stolen, which the trio assaulting the Rangerite had abandoned. However, his billfold and money were intact.

Local officers and enforcement agencies over this section of the state are on the lookout for the trio of thugs as described to Erath County deputies of Sheriff George of Stephenville and Chief Pounds and members of the Ranger Police Department.

### Bloody Fighting Rages As Reds Storm Mountain

SEOUL, Korea, Oct. 10 (UP)—Chinese Communists, using "human sea" tactics, overran the crest of White Horse Mountain at dusk Friday and forced its hard-fighting South Korean defenders down the southern slopes with bayonets and grenades.

Cursing and swiping their fists, some 700 Chinese stormed White Horse in waves four and one-half hours after Ninth division Republic of Korea soldiers had swept the Reds completely off the northern approaches.

An American officer said the Chinese were using "human sea" tactics in most of their battalion-sized attacks on the bloody hill.

The Chinese attack began at 5:30 p.m. 2:30 a.m. Oct. 9, as they poured mortar and fired 600 rounds into Korean positions in less than 20 minutes.

The South Koreans withdrew to the base of the hill at 6:50 p.m.

Then a Fight Back  
However, by 7:30 p.m., the South Koreans had fought their way back to within 100 yards of the crest and built a defense line across one of the approaches to the summit.

Rain began falling after the new positions were dug and visibility was poor.

The latest assault marked the 21st time in four days of fighting that the bloody ridgeline has changed hands.

The Chinese used bayonets, fists and dirty words, an officer reported.

An Apparently Fresh Division  
The attacking Chinese, apparently brought in from a fresh division, crawled over the bodies of their own men littering the slopes of the hill to reach the peak.

Only a few minutes before the attack, Maj. Gen. Kim Chong Oh, commander of the ROK ninth division, said, "The Chinese know and I know that whoever controls White Horse controls the Chorwon Valley."

The Chorwon Valley is used by both sides as a supply point. The vital Allied railway supply line runs through part of it. White Horse Mountain also guards the classic invasion route to Seoul.

"The Chinese have lost much face because we have beaten them back," Kim said after the South Koreans drove the Chinese off the crest in a wild bayonet charge.

"I think their general must be very angry. He will not stop trying until he has used up everything he has. But my division will continue to beat him back."

### 47,000 Men Due To Be Drafted During December

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (UP)—The Defense Department Thursday asked Selective Service to draft 47,000 men in December for the Army.

The draft call is the same as for October and November.

The Navy, Marine Corps, and Air Force do not intend to place draft calls for December.

### Editor, Leader New Ike Group, Veteran Demo

"We have all supported, loved and labored for the Democratic Party. We still love it and all it truly stands for. We don't want to leave it, and will not leave it, but we are disgusted and have lost confidence in its leadership of today."

Those few words, packed with emotion and sincerity — came this morning from the lips of deep-voiced, bespectacled Ray B. McCorkle, 64-year-old veteran newspaperman and editor of the Eastland Daily Telegram, who heads Eastland County's newly formed "Democrats for Eisenhower" group organized at Eastland Wednesday night.

The white-thatched newsmen, a life-long Democrat, charged that "the national Democratic party is not controlled by Democrats, but by a group which is trying to change to federalism or socialism — principles entirely unacceptable to those of us who cling to the ideals of the Democratic Party of Thomas Jefferson."

Demo "Swaps Horses"  
And so McCorkle, like a growing number of Texas party leaders, loyal administration backers who went down the line for two epoch-making decades with Franklin D. Roosevelt, his New Deal and his stormy third and fourth terms, White House conquests, and President Harry Truman's Fair Deal, has swapped horses.

His daily column, "Around the Square," a front page feature of the Telegram, has been strongly pro-Eisenhower for several months.

And so his election to the chairmanship of the new county "Democrats for Eisenhower" came as no surprise whatever.

McCorkle urges his fellow Democrats to vote a split ticket in

the coming Nov. 4 general election. "By law and by principle," he says, "we can vote this way and still be good Democrats."

Split Voting Is Legal  
"You are not signing your rights away when you support Eisenhower and Nixon," the newspaperman declared. "You have taken no party pledge to support any candidate for national office, rumors notwithstanding."

McCorkle, assisted by vice-chairman Virgil Seaberry, is planning to launch an intensive drive to reach into every Eastland County precinct to "get out the vote" for GOP presidential candidate Dwight D. Eisenhower and his running mate, U. S. Senator Richard Nixon, vice presidential aspirant.

Precinct units of the county "Democrats for Eisenhower" group are due to be set up within the next few days, Chairman McCorkle said.

"The issues are simple," the Telegram editor pointed out. "The Eisenhower-Nixon platform meets with the approval of Texas Democrats while that of Gov. Stevenson and Speakerman does not."

Assails Tidelanders' Grab  
"Eisenhower is for Texas ownership of the Tidelanders while Stevenson declares he'll follow Truman and carry out the Federal government's grab of Texas' oil-rich coastal areas."

McCorkle lashed the "socialistic doctrine" of the present Democratic administration, rapped extravagance, waste and corruption in Washington.

"Democrats cannot support a candidate who professes to be in accord with the flagrant Federal steal of our Texas schools' submerged oil lands," the Eastland County pro-Eisenhower Democrat declared. "Neither can they sup-

port a candidate (referring to Gov. Adlai Stevenson) who bears the stamp of Trumanism, with all that the stamp implies—a foreign policy that brings on, but cannot win, a terrible undeclared war in Korea."

### Pemberton Gets Two Years For Graham Slaying

GRAHAM, Tex., Oct. 10 (UP)—A 90th district court jury Friday found John Pemberton, 59, guilty of murdering Carl Matchen, 60-year-old Young county farmer last May 13 and recommended he be sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.

The defense counsel, attorneys Tom M. Miller of Graham and A. E. Zellers of Weatherford, announced they would appeal the case and filed a motion for a new trial.

The case went to the jury Thursday. At 10:40 p.m. the jury reported it had not reached a verdict and it was locked up for the night.

The jury reconvened at 9 a.m. Friday.

Pemberton testified he shot Carl Matchen "picked on me" and dared him to fight on five different occasions.

Matchen died the day after he was shot.

Testimony by prosecution witnesses was that Pemberton entered Frankie and Johnny's Cafe and began shooting wildly, with three bullets hitting a wall, one grazing a waitress' hand and two others hitting Matchen in the stomach.

The defense maintained Pemberton and Matchen grappled after Matchen drew a knife and threatened to cut Pemberton's throat "from ear to ear."

### Ruse As Dec Fails For Girl

NETZ, Rance, Oct. 10 (UP)—Fretty Marie Travers, 24, was brought here from Germany Friday to stand trial for impersonating an Army doctor while visiting her boy friend in a French Army hospital near Baden Baden.

Authorities said Marie entered an Army billet, donned a lieutenant's shirt, a sergeant's trousers, a major's coat and took a stethoscope.

She then "expertly examined" a group of stripped soldiers before she was apprehended.

### Texas Governor Will Introduce General Tuesday

AUSTIN, Oct. 10 (UP)—Democratic Gov. Allan Shivers announced Thursday he will introduce Dwight D. Eisenhower when Eisenhower speaks in front of the Alamo at San Antonio next Tuesday.

The Alamo is Texas' most historic shrine.

A spokesman said the governor was acting at Eisenhower's invitation.

"He had a telegram from Eisenhower," the spokesman said, "asking him to meet with him at San Antonio on his (Eisenhower's) birthday."

Eisenhower is scheduled to arrive in San Antonio at 5:15 p.m. and leave by train at 11:59 that night.

The governor cancelled a scheduled speech at a chamber of commerce banquet in Fort Arthur to arrange his meeting with the GOP nominee.

He will attend a reception prior to the dinner, a spokesman said, and then fly to San Antonio where he will introduce Eisenhower in Alamo Plaza.

At a press conference a few minutes earlier, Shivers had expressed "hope" he might meet with Eisenhower.

### MEET WITH DEMOCRATIC NOMINEE 'STRICTLY UP TO ADLAI, SAYS SHIVERS'

However, the Democratic governor of Texas said that if he sees Adlai Stevenson, it will be strictly up to the Democratic presidential candidate.

Eisenhower is scheduled to arrive in Texas for two days of speaking on Oct. 14. Stevenson begins a two day tour of the state three days later on Oct. 17.

He said any meeting with the Democratic nominee would be "up to Stevenson or some of his people."

"I think it would be a little presumptuous" to initiate the action himself, the governor said.

In the Gain in Texas  
Shivers broke with Stevenson, bolted the national Democratic ticket and announced he would vote for Eisenhower after the Illinois governor announced his opposition to state ownership of the tidelands.

The governor told reporters in his opinion "Eisenhower is gaining in Texas... that's my view."

### STATE CHIEF DECLARES 'HELL PROBABLY MAKE SPEECHES FOR IKE'

Shivers said Thursday he will "probably make one or two other speeches" for Dwight D. Eisenhower before the Nov. 4 presidential election.

### RJC Crew Hopes For Ram Upset Saturday Night

Coach Boone Yarbrough and his Purple & White warriors of Ranger Junior College, still stunned from their unpredicted 12-0 loss to Navarro here last Saturday night, were bolstering their hopes today as they awaited crucial Pioneer Conference battle time—little more than 24 hours away.

Tomorrow night at 8 o'clock out at San Angelo, Coach Yarbrough and his Rangers tangle with the highly touted San Angelo Rams in the spotlighted Pioneer Conference title scramble opener of what promises to be a spectacular, thrill-packed junior college '52 pigskin campaign.

The Rams, of course, are favorites to win the important encounter.

But Coach Yarbrough is hoping—even hoping desperately — for an upset.

No. 1 In Nation  
The RJC mentor says the San Angelo junior collegians are the nation's No. 1-rated junior college machine. He's hoping that rating may make the Rams over-confident.

And he's also hoping—quietly naturally—that his Purple & White charges, although badly hit by the old injury flux, will somehow turn the trick, play an evening of flawless football, and wind up with an after-the-ran triumph.

Scores of Ranger backers of the local college grid machine are planning to make the journey to San Angelo tomorrow to witness the Ram-Rangers clash.

As play in the Pioneer Conference turns into the fifth week, the

Arlington State College Rebels who share with San Angelo the distinction among league clubs of being undefeated and untied this season lead in total offense with a net gain of 1494 yards in four games, reports the Pioneer Conference publicity department at Arlington.

The Ranger Junior College Rangers lead in running with a net gain of 968 yards in four contests, but the San Angelo Rams with a running gain of 868 yards in three contests have the best running average—289-yards per game.

Arlington State is on top in the passing department with 491 yds. Tarleton State is second with 372 yards in three games.

Gene Henderson, San Angelo's fine quarterback, has replaced Freddie Sanders of Ranger as the league's leading runner. Henderson in three games has carried 24 times for a total of 280 yards, an average of 11.75 per carry. He is closely trailed by Sanders and Bud Hamrick of Ranger each of whom has gained more than 260 yards.

Loop's best passer so far is Sam Howard, Arlington State's towering quarterback who has completed 24 of 57 tosses for 459 yards, an average of 19.1 per completion.

Leading receiver is Kenneth Vavra, Arlington State halfback who has caught 6 for 179 yards, an average of 29.8 per catch.

Bud Hamrick of Ranger is the leading punter with 19 booms for 658 yards, an average of 34.1.

Jabney Cotant, speedy Arlington State halfback, continues to lead in punt returns, 8 for 221 yards. Leading kick-off returner is Tarleton State's Frank Kearney, 2 for 69 yards.

Vavra of ASC is the loop's leading scorer with four touchdowns and 15 conversions for 39 points.

### Bulldogs Battle Tonight

#### PLEASANT WEEKEND IS SEEN FOR COUNTY, BUT NO RAIN

The weatherman checked his records, noted instrument readings, and took a gander skyward this morning, but—  
No rain.

No Eastland County weather was fair and mild Friday and the warming rays of the sun appeared to have chased the last remnants of the week's "chill wave" out of the region.

The weatherman said that Eastland County, Texas and the seven state area from Wyoming to the Rio Grande would remain clear over the week end with little change in temperature.

Today's mercury readings in the Eastland County area are scheduled to be several notches above yesterday's levels.

Ideal Football Weather  
Conditions were expected to be ideal for the fall schedule of football games slated for the weekend.

The giant State Fair of Texas also looked forward to big crowds because the mild weather encourages visitors to stroll leisurely over the fair grounds. Fair officials reported that attendance was running slightly above that last year as the gates opened Friday.

Bad News for Hunters  
Hunters got some bad news connected with the weather, however, when the Texas Game and Fish Commission warned that the prolonged drought might increase the botulism death toll among the state's geese and ducks.

The commission said the disease resulted from the birds drinking water poisoned by decaying vegetation and said botulism was usually more prevalent during a drought because "the decaying vegetation poisons shallow waters which recede to subnormal depths."

#### FAIR ATTENDANCE UP

DALLAS, Oct. 10 (UP)—Attendance at the 1952 State Fair of Texas totaled 685,001 as the gates opened Friday morning. Fair officials said the figure was 6,215 above the total for the first six days last year. Thursday's attendance was 62,265.

Opening kickoff for the non-conference schoolboy grid contest is scheduled for 8 p.m. and a capacity throng is expected to be on hand. A crowd of several hundred Hamilton followers of the HHS Bulldog eleven also is anticipated by Ranger school officials.

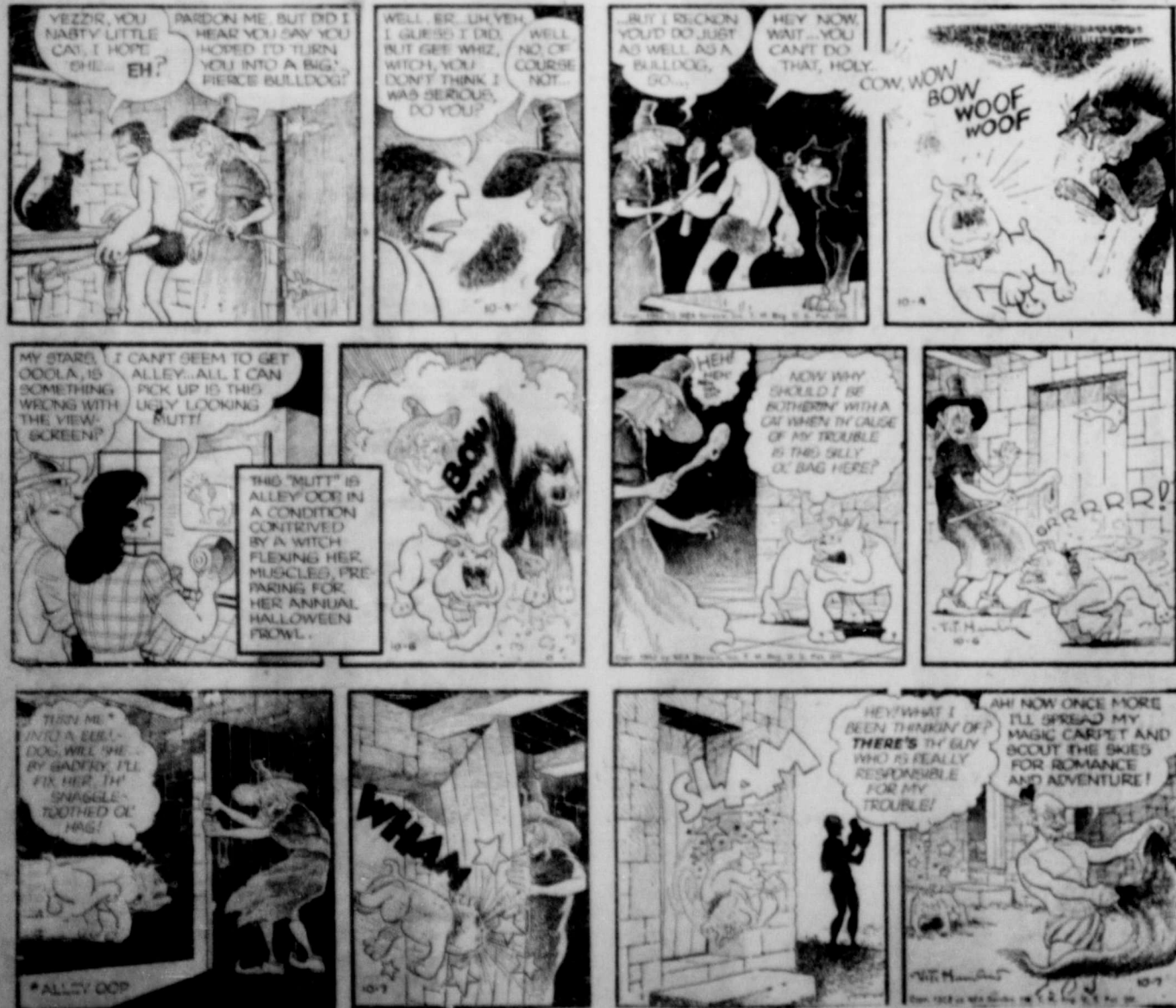

**IT'S THE LAW in Texas**  
 A public service feature of the Ranger Times

What about your civilian affairs if you are called into military service? You may save yourself and your family a great deal of difficulty and worry by considering right now some of the problems that may arise.

All during World War II and in the present Korean conflict, a special committee of the State Bar has handled literally thousands of disconcerting legal entanglements for servicemen. Members of the group say that many of these difficulties could have been avoided if the soldiers involved had taken a few simple precautions before leaving civilian life.

After you enter the service, keep in mind that this group, the State Bar committee on Legal Assistance to the Armed Forces, stands ready to help when necessary. Every county in the state has a legal Assistance Chairman whose responsibility is to look into local matters when requested by a serviceman. The committee and the county chairmen may be contacted through State Bar of Texas, Austin 15, Texas.

But before going into service, here is a partial list of things to do to protect yourself and your family.

Execute a power of attorney in recordable form if you want someone to be able to act for you in your absence.

Rent a safety deposit box, collect your important documents and store them in it.

Have a will prepared, or revised to suit any changed conditions.

Arrange for payment of outstanding bills or loans. The Soldiers and Sailors Civil Relief Act protects you against entry of judgment while in service.

Check your life insurance. Be sure the beneficiaries are correct—if the beneficiary is to be paid in monthly installments, is the amount now adequate in the light of the present deflated dollar? Arrange for premium payments.

If you have a lease on your business or residence arrange to cancel or sublet; provide for getting premises back when you return. If you give proper notice the Soldiers and Sailors Civil Relief Act may save you from further liability under leases after your departure.

Check your fire and personal property insurance policies for expiration dates, proper coverage and amount. Get a rebate if you cancel.

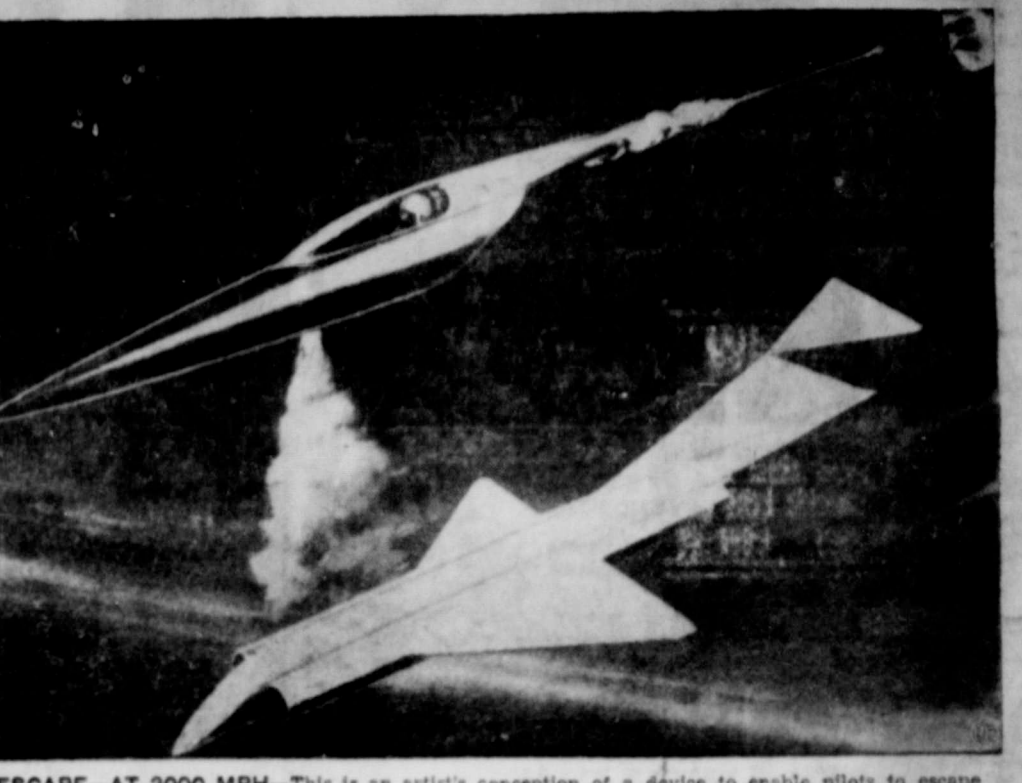
Be sure your automobile license and insurance are available and in the name of the proper person. If your car won't be used for business purposes you may be entitled to a reduced premium.

Leave with some person, other than your wife, complete data as to yourself, where you are, how you are to be reached. Keep that person informed of changes while you are away, so he can reach you in an emergency.

Consolidate your bank accounts and open a joint account. Arrange for statements, allotments, etc. Check your credit resources and arrange for your family to obtain credit or loans in emergencies.

If you are under 26 and called in the reserves, notify your draft board. File a change of address card with the post office and have your mail forwarded to some responsible person.

If you have a mortgage or land contract arrange with the lender
