A SABBATH THOUGHT
More precious than silver and gold are the things that silver and gold cannot buy... the joy of contentment, the fellowship of understanding, the miracle of love. These, good readers, are the threads that gleam bright on the loom of life, that endure when time has destroyed the fabric of material achievement.

On the threshold of our forthcoming Ranger Community Chest drive, we thought most appropos the thoughts of a Dallas minister, Dr. John F. Anderson, Jr., addressing a church gathering in the Texas metropolis recently, in which he warned that civilization is doomed unless it strikes a balance between the extremes of individual selfishness and group totalitarianism.

The Dallas clergyman, who spoke in a philosophical vein, scored the material in which so many Americans live in dog-eat-dog competition, in the name of free enterprise and individual liberty.

Anderson declared the flaws in such a philosophy helped to bring on the other extremes which flourish in the world today—theisms which say the individual has no worth and that only the group—state, race or class—is important.

Both types of civilization are bound to fail because they are not natural, he declared.

Christ tried to help the world to a balance between these two extremes. The Golden Rule says that others are important—and adds that you are important, too.

A God-like balance is the only answer to the crisis of our age, where fear, frustration and insecurity are now more widespread than in all our history.

Continued 'Dry' And Mild' Says Area Forecast

Yanks In Korea 'Lack Faith,' Reds Charge

MOSCOW, Oct. 11 (UP)—Soviet War Minister Marshal A. M. Vasilevski has told the 19th Communist Party Congress the United States suffered a defeat unprecedented in its history in Korea because of their lack of faith in their cause.

"The most experienced generals and officers can be defeated if their soldiers think that the war imposed upon them is deeply unjust and if they execute their military and political knowledge, learning the experience of the last war and mastering contemporary combat techniques."

He said that in the post-World War II period the Soviet army has been "in a constant state of readiness, with its men, officers and generals tirelessly perfecting their military and political knowledge, learning the experience of the last war and mastering contemporary combat techniques."

He said that morale was high in the Red army and that 86.4 per cent of the officers and general officers are members of the Communist party or the Communist youth league.

Volunteer Fire Group Is Big Asset To City

One of Ranger's outstanding and most highly valuable civic organizations is the Ranger Volunteer Fire Department, headed by Chief V. E. (Virge) Johnson, and L. T. Rushing, Secretary.

The local volunteer fire-fighting organization, organized with permission of the Ranger City Commission in June, 1950, is composed of men who unselfishly dedicate their time and effort to battling conflagrations, aiding the three paid members of the Ranger Fire Department—Chief Charley Isbell, and Firemen Truett Price and Donald Shook.

Members of the volunteer group in addition to Chief Johnson and Secretary Rushing are J. G. Wright, D. A. Fawcett, Max Orr, R. C. Shockey, Jack Mace, Bill Ewing, George Brightley, and Ed Freeman.

Those Ranger men serve their city and their fellow citizens without pay, answering fire alarms at "round-the-clock hours in every kind of weather. Only benefits they receive are special city parking privileges and a very small annual bonus given each at Christmas time by the Ranger City Commission.

With dry weather continuing in this area, Fire Chief Charley Isbell, veteran head of the Ranger Fire Department, today warned Rangerites to exercise extra caution against fire as Fire Prevention Week drew to an end.

Big danger is from grass fires, Chief Isbell pointed out, and citizens are urged to be extremely careful in burning their rubbish and trash.

The fire chief said that Ranger's fire loss for the past 10 months has reached the appalling total of \$116,148.93—one of the most disastrous damage tolls in the three decades of local history.

With the exception of four years spent in defense work during World War II, Chief Isbell has been with the Ranger Fire Department since Nov. 1, 1926.

Only other heavy loss of comparative value was the Paramount Hotel holocaust here in 1944 when flames ate up \$60,000 worth of property.

The department's 667th death list included the names of Pvt. George P. Keeney, Fort Worth, and Pfc. Jessie D. McClure, Morton. Both were soldiers.

Four soldiers were wounded. They were Pfc. Harold E. Austin, McCaskey; Pfc. Joseph W. Brown, Forney; Sgt. Joe A. Davis, Franklin; and 2nd Lt. William C. Greenwell, Ft. Worth.

Missing Woman Found

Mrs. Jenny K. Hinds, 75-year-old Eastland County woman missing from her home for about 30 hours to greatly alarm relatives and neighbors, was in the Ranger Clinic Saturday morning being treated for exposure.

Dr. Watkins, her attending physician, reported her condition as satisfactory Saturday morning at Ranger.

The aged woman, who lives alone near the Staff community about 7 miles southeast of Eastland, was reported missing yesterday by her daughter who lives nearby. The woman had been reported last seen late Thursday.

Following the report an intensive search through the underbrush-covered, rocky terrain in that area was launched, and the countryside was scoured by deputies of the sheriff's department at Eastland, joined by officers and volunteer searchers from Ranger, Eastland and Cisco.

Mrs. Hinds, reported to be feeble-minded, was found Saturday morning at 1:25 a.m., sitting on a rock in a pasture area about three-fourths of a mile from her home. She "was tired," she told officers, and "sat down to rest."

2,000 Watch As Ranger Blasts Hamilton, 27-6

Coach Stubby Warden's 1952 Ranger High Bulldogs, who caught fire on their home turf out at Bulldog Stadium three weeks ago, were still blazing brightly here Friday night as they enveloped the Hamilton High Bulldogs in a 27-6 inferno—the proud Maroon & White's third straight schoolboy pigskin triumph.

The non-clearance tilt, played under a clear sky in the goose-pimpling cool of October's nippy night air, was witnessed by a crowd of approximately 2,000 fans including a sparse delegation of about 200 Hamiltonians who saw the Rangerites display consistently-improving offensive and defensive power.

Score in Every Stanza
The Maroon & White Bulldogs collected points in every stanza. Charlie Massegee, flaky 155-pound Ranger halfback, scored all four Ranger TDs, and Halfback Bill Browning successfully booted three points after touchdown to pile up the Bulldogs' decisive 27-6 point total.

The T-powered protégés of Coach Warden, engineered by Quarterback Gerald Bagwell, went to work midway in the first period and the RHS juggernaut unleashed a ground-gaining offensive on their own 41 and rolled 53 yards—punctuated with one okay serial, a 9-yarder from Quarterback Bagwell to Chico Mendoza, right end—down to the Hamiltonians' 1-yard stripe. From there Massegee took Bagwell's handoff and flashed over left tackle to score. Halfback Bill Browning's try for the point missed.

Interceded Pass Plays
Midway in the second quarter, Massegee fumbled after the Rangermen had cashed in on a pass interception by Charlie and were down on the Hamilton 13, ready to hammer on the door. So the visiting Bulldogs took over. Big George Stinson, 165-pound power-house fullback, was stopped cold at center for no gain—then he faded to pass. But Massegee leaped high, intercepted the oval and sped over into pay dirt. Browning's kick for the point was perfect, and at the halftime intermission the Rangerites were out front, 13-0.

Late in the third stanza, the Bulldogs launched another pay-off drive from their own 20, highlighted after two fazed aerial tries by a thrilling 30-yard right end streak by Bagwell down to the mid-field 50, and pushed down to the 1. Massegee spun over left guard to tally again. Browning's kick was good.

Stinson Sparks Drive
Four completed passes—all Stinson to Halfback Cecil Couch connections—a 5-yard penalty against Ranger and Stinson's smashing high, intercepted the oval down to the 3-yard line. For the visiting Red & Black crew, and then Fullback Stinson drove over to score Hamilton's lone counter of the night. Kick for the point was wide.

FEDERAL AND STATE OFFICERS HUNT MISSING \$248,000 LOOT

FORT WORTH, Oct. 11 (UP)—Federal and state authorities pushed their search Saturday for \$248,000 taken from two Cubans, while two men faced trial on charges connected with the robbery.

A Tarrant county grand jury Friday indicted Gene Paul Norris, charging him with robbery with firearms, and Sam Brown Cresap, charged as an accomplice.

The Cubans, Manuel Madariaga and Candido de la Torres, were robbed of the \$248,000 last week in their Fort Worth hotel room. They said they had brought the cash to Texas to buy guns and ammunition for a counter-revolution in Cuba against the Batista regime.

Cresap was described by police as a "contact man" who lured the Cubans to Texas with a promise to sell them guns. He and Norris were charged earlier by the FBI with transporting stolen property across a state line from Texas into Oklahoma.

The grand jury failed to indict a third man charged by the FBI with transporting stolen property. He was Orville Lindsey Chambless, an Oklahoma ex-convict who has maintained he was "framed."

White Horse Is Taken By Chinks In Savage Push

The Communists recaptured the important hill guarding the invasion gateway to Seoul only six hours after Republic of Korea Ninth division troops had knocked Chinese troops off it in a lightning "neck attack."

Ike To Report Income Before Election Day

WITH EISENHOWER, Oct. 11 (UP)—Dwight D. Eisenhower said Friday that "of course" he would make public his recent income tax returns or a statement containing substantially the same information before election day.

Eisenhower, just before leaving Phoenix, was asked by reporters, "may we please have an answer from you whether you intend to make public before election time your income tax returns, or a financial statement giving substantially the same information."

He sent this reply to the newsmen through his press secretary, James Haggerty: "Of course, if anyone is interested, they can have the report as soon as it is completed. It is virtually a matter of public record anyway."

of the month for the UN and raised the October bag of MIGs to 14 destroyed and 29 damaged. ROKs of the Ninth division won complete control of sprawling White Horse except for two small groups of Reds huddled on the peak's southwest and northwest slopes. They were being killed off systematically.

The ROKs won White Horse in a daring, pre-dawn "sneak" attack and dug in amid crashing enemy shells to wait for an expected Communist counterattack.

United Press correspondent Wendell Merick reported from the front that the five-day fight had cost the Communists nearly 10,000 men. Some 2,000 of the Reds were killed between 6 p.m. Friday and 6 a.m. Saturday.

"But they can afford it," American Maj. Gen. Wayne C. Smith told Merick.

Smith said the Communists, who already have used up one infantry division, apparently were under orders to keep the hill "at all costs" because it could be used for any big drive southward they might have planned.

NEW FIRE-FIGHTING JEEP IS DUE TO CUT NAVY DAMAGE

By Harman W. Nichols
WASHINGTON (UP) — The Navy is experimenting with a device that one day may save many lives and millions of dollars in equipment.

I witnessed the first demonstration of a new foam fire-fighting jeep. It is designed for use on the decks of our larger aircraft carriers.

The performance took place on a lot outside the Navy's research laboratory. A beat-up old torpedo bomber was set afire. Then the foam fire-fighter went to work. In 10 seconds flames were cut to a point where both the pilot and co-pilot could be rescued. In another two minutes, the fire was out altogether.

Mounted on Jeep Chassis
Richard L. Tuve, head of the engineering research branch, chemical division, at the lab explained a fire-extinguishing system, mounted on a standard jeep chassis, is capable of shooting out 1300 gallons of foam per minute.

"This new equipment," Tuve said, "requires no power supply other than the 40 horsepower jeep engine. It spreads a protective foam in diameter over the trapped pilots. Or it will reach a crashed

and burning plane up to 90 feet away with its consolidated stream of foam.

The foam came out in flakes and when it settled on the nose, tail, and props of the old bomber it looked like whipped cream.

A Pump Makes Foam
Tuve explained that the foam is formed in one foam-making pump which proportions the necessary raw material—air, water, and foam concentrate. The pump whips these together like an egg beater would. The micro-bubbled foam is forced through the adjustable distributing nozzle.

It takes two men to operate the jeep fire-fighter. A driver and a hose man. In this case, they were Joe Porter and Raymond Neill, who wore fire-proof clothing and eye shields to protect themselves.

The model I saw is the only one in existence as yet, but there will be more when this one has earned its spurs at sea. Tuve said the Navy plans to put the model aboard a big carrier soon, and if it works as everyone thinks it will, production will begin.

In use aboard a carrier, the jeep will be kept on a standby in the carrier island or near the landing barriers.
