Question—"How much coffee do you keep in reserve—one pound, three pounds or 45 pounds?"

Mrs. Housewife, according to the poll, thinks one pound in reserve is enough. The Defense Department, on the other hand, has stored up 144,000,000 pounds, or about 50 pounds for each person in the armed forces!

Question—"How much black pepper does each member of your family consume in a year?"

Mrs. Housewife said she bought about an ounce and a half for each member. In nine months the government bought nearly two pounds for each member of the army—or about 20 times as much as Mrs. Housewife bought.

Question—"How much do you pay, on the average, for a white slip?"

Mrs. Housewife: "\$3.50". The government pays \$16.50.

Question—"How many light globes do you keep on hand for replacement?"

Seven or eight, said Mrs. Housewife. One government agency has a 93-year supply on hand.

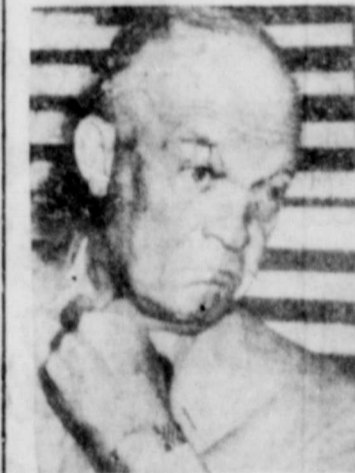

BANQUET WILL OPEN TWO-DAY EXES' AFFAIR

Hundreds of visitors are expected to swarm into Ranger today and tonight for the annual Homecoming of the Ex-Students' Association, sponsors of the gala 1952 event, predicted this morning.

By parade time tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock, through (telling as many as 5,000 persons may be jammed on downtown streets) to witness the big 1952 Homecoming parade which promises to be the longest and most colorful in local history.

Officers of the Ex-Students' Association of Ranger Junior College headed by Pete Brasher, president, announced early today that everything was in readiness for what was planned as "the greatest and most enjoyable homecoming event in Ranger's history."

Banquet Tonight First on the two-day homecoming calendar of activities is a banquet to be held at the Gholson Hotel tonight at 7:30 o'clock.

Price is \$1.00 a plate and a huge attendance is expected. An impromptu program will be featured during the banquet, President Brasher said.

Following the banquet, exes and their guests along with Ranger Junior College students will stage a dance and party out at the Student Union building on the college campus.

And thus will end the first phases of RJC's two-day homecoming.

Ex-students and visitors will spend most of Saturday visiting and reminiscing over past days and then at 4 p.m. activity will be lived again with the big downtown parade.

Scores of colorful floats, many groups representing various Ranger civic organizations and business and industrial firms, several bands, the Texas National Guard unit, and the Ranger Civilian Air Patrol are among those to be represented in the procession.

3 High School Grid Stadiums Dark Tonight

It's very quiet on the Eastland County football front today. And there'll be no glowing arcs and razzing in any of the area's three large pigskin centers.

All three major high school stadiums, enclosing clear-scarred turfs at Cisco, Ranger and Eastland will be dark during the early nocturnal hours of a usually active football Friday.

Eastland's Mavericks trek over to Santa Anna eleven in a crucial conference skirmish scheduled to blast open at 8 p.m. A large number of Eastland Red & Black fan followers are expected to trail along with Coach Ed Hooker and his spirited Maverick gridmen who'll be gunning for their third straight triumph.

At Ranger and at Cisco the Bulldogs and Lobos are idle for the week, enjoying a welcome respite from their hectic 1952 grid-iron wars.

Coach Stubby Warden's Maroon & White Bulldogs are relaxing and taking it easy today while their RHS mentor and his able assistant, Sam Aills, plan to be in Ballinger tonight to scout the Ballinger-Comanche contest there.

Next foe on the grid calendar of the Rangermen is Diamond Hill of Fort Worth, one of the toughest schoolboy grid aggregations in this section of the state.

The Diamond Hillers are undefeated this season, but were tied by Garland, The Diamond Hill battle, to be waged in Ranger at Bulldog Stadium a week hence, will be a non-conference duel, followed then by the Maroon & White's three conference encounters with Cisco, Stephenville and Comanche.

"Our scouts," says J. W. (Jerry) Sitton Cisco Daily-Press editor and publisher and Lobodom's Granny Rice, "report that the Cisco Lobos are growing whiskers and don't plan to shave until they win another football game. Hundreds of boosters of RJC's high-riding Ranger football team are expected to attend the event on the eve of tomorrow night's homecoming grid battle.

Chest Reports \$2,301 Today

Only little more than \$300 has trickled into the coffers of the Ranger Community Chest during the past 24 hours, President W. C. Whittle, head of the local fund-raising organization, reported at mid-morning Friday.

At that time, pledges totaling \$1096 and cash collections of \$1205 were in the hands of Miss Marjorie Maddocks, chest secretary, as volunteer workers launched the fourth day of the 1952 effort to raise \$6,800 to finance the activities of eight important civic and charitable agencies in the Ranger area.

Yesterday at approximately the same time the total pledges and cash contributions were \$1,971.25. Today's combined total, as of 10 a.m., \$2,301.00.

Slogan of the campaign being carried on by 60 volunteer workers, who are making a city-wide solicitation without pay, is "GIVE ONCE FOR ALL."

Citizens are being asked to contribute a day's pay to the campaign. Those who prefer, President Whittle said, may pay off their pledges on an installment plan to fit their budgets.

Leaders hope the drive may be completed before the end of next week, but there's a long way to go—\$4,500 dollars to be collected—before the city's \$6,800 quota is reached.

A daily chart of progress of the drive is being recorded on a big thermometer erected in the center of the intersection of Main and Commerce Streets near the T&P Railway crossing, former location of the old derrick, long a Ranger landmark and symbol of indelification to passing tourists and travelers.

The thermometer was made possible through the efforts of Granville Jones of the Lone Star Gas Co. Jones is one of the leaders in the current chest campaign. The painting and lettering on the thermometer which is plainly visible to traffic on Main Street was done by Jack Williams, Ranger painter and artist.

Shivers Scorches Stevenson

Seven "Loyal Democrats" Friday prepared for a series of speeches throughout Texas Saturday. The barrage of talks was scheduled to reply to the latest attack on the Truman administration from Gov. Allan Shivers.

Shivers told a state-wide radio audience Thursday night that if

Adlai Stevenson, the Democratic presidential nominee, succeeds Mr. Truman "probably the only change would be the Harvard accent—with wisecracks instead of cuss words."

"Adlai Stevenson is not going to disagree with Harry Truman on the tidelands, or on the Taft-

Hartley act, or John L. Lewis coal strike, or the FEPC, or Dean Acheson's foreign policy, or even the market quotations on mink coats and red herring," the governor said.

"It looks to me as if Mr. Truman has already taken Brother Stevenson to the woodshed a couple of times, and Brother Steven-

son apparently has learned his lesson well," he declared.

Shivers said, "The real danger is that another four years of this administration would so weaken the free institutions of this country that the only alternatives would be state socialism or totalitarianism."

He said he was "more than ever

convinced that Stevensonism would be a continuation of Trumanism."

For sleeping sickness—Placing a board on the horse's head and pounding it with a hammer.

For mange in dogs—A copper wire around the dog's neck.

For calf scours—The leg bone of a chicken tied to the calf's neck.

For indigestion in cattle—An old sock, smeared with grease and forced down the cow's throat.

For tetanus in horses—Chewing tobacco and kerosene.

A few animal owners still seem to believe in medieval "diseases" which never existed, the report states. Among these are "hollow tail" and "hollow horn" in cattle. Another old superstition held that surgery on animals would be a failure unless the signs of the Zodiac were favorable.

"Luckily, these old beliefs have almost disappeared in America," the Foundation said. "Otherwise,
