

# State Campaign Heats As Big Political Guns Roar

The battle for Texas' 24 electoral votes grew in intensity Thursday, with a series of major speeches planned on both sides and the announcement that one more out-of-state campaigner, John A. Roosevelt, will visit Texas again before election day.

Roosevelt, who made four speeches on behalf of Dwight D. Eisenhower last Friday in East Texas, will deliver a state-wide radio talk from San Antonio Saturday.

Texas Democrats for Eisenhower headquarters said the youngest son of former President Franklin D. Roosevelt might speak in other Texas cities Saturday.

Gov. Allan Shivers, who made two speeches Wednesday, was scheduled to make a radio broadcast Thursday night and a speech at noon Friday, the latter in Bryan.

On the other side, House Speaker Sam Rayburn, who is chairman of the Texas Stevenson-Sparkman campaign committee, will broadcast from Dallas at 7 p.m. Thursday.

Vice President Alben Barkley, who aroused a new controversy Wednesday night with a charge that the Ford Motor Co. "is requiring" its dealers to contribute to Eisenhower's campaign, was originally slated to be the last national figure to invade the Lone Star state.

Barkley made three Texas speeches Wednesday, spent the night in Austin and was due to head for his home in Kentucky early Thursday.

Wednesday night Shivers told a Houston rally that Stevenson "talks out of both corners of his mouth" about party loyalty.

Rayburn said in Dallas that "the people of Texas remember what happened to them the last time the Republicans were in power."

Shivers replied to statements by "Loyalist Democrats" that the tideheads have little value by declaring the state had received \$9 million in leases for them. He also said a recent report by 18 independent geologists said the tideheads resources were worth at least \$80 million.

In his Dallas address October 17, at 8 p.m., Gov. Adlai Stevenson stated that he was a descendant of a Confederate Veteran, and that his Grandfather Robert Stevenson was a good friend of Sam Houston.

He also stated that his grandfather was a member of that little band of Texans which thrashed the Mexican Army of Gen. Santa Anna at San Jacinto in 1836.

The Heroes of San Jacinto, a volume edited by the late Sam Houston Dixon and Mr. Louis Wiltz Kemp now living in Houston, Texas, which was published in 1932 verifies the Governor's words.

Robert Stevenson was the Commanding Officer of First Regiment Texas Volunteers, Company "H."

"Born in Tennessee and emigrated to Texas in 1832 with his wife and family.

William W. Hill, who had been captain of company "H" since its formation March 1, 1836, was confined by illness at camp on April 21st and his company was commanded at San Jacinto by Robert Stevenson.

When Captain George M. Colingsworth was organizing a force to attack Goliad, Mr. Stevenson joined him and participated in the capture of that place, October 9, 1835. After receiving his discharge he re-enlisted. On April 24, 1838, he received Bounty Warrant No. 3019 for services from June 4 to September 4, 1836.

Soon after the battle of San Jacinto Mr. Stevenson returned to his home at Coles Settlement in Washington county, and was one of the group of men who founded the town of Independence, Texas. He was living at that place as late as 1840."

### FRANK TUCKER JAILER NAMED IN COURT SUIT

Frank Tucker, Eastland County sheriff, and Ealan Reeves, county jailer, and an insurance company have been named as defendants in a \$9,001.15 damage suit recently filed in the U. S. District Court at Eastland.

A petition filed by Oscar Gage, plaintiff, of Randlett, Okla., alleges mistreatment while held as a prisoner in the Eastland County jail for a traffic offense in May of 1951.

Gage's alleged "mistreatment" the petition alleges, came at the hands of other jail inmates who forced him to submit to a "kangaroo court."

Third defendant in the damage suit is the Maryland Casualty Co. and insurance firm.

The plaintiff says his petition that on May 1, 1951, he was issued a traffic summons by the Texas Highway Patrol for an alleged offense near Eastland.

He alleges that he appeared before Charles Robo, Justice of the Peace, and his fine was set at \$12.

However, Gage alleges there was no written complaint on file in the Justice Court charging him with any traffic violation or other violation of the law.

SENT TO JAIL Upon his refusal to pay the \$12 fine, the plaintiff was committed to Eastland County jail, he charges.

Gage alleged that the other prisoners in the jail forced him by threats to pay them all the money in his possession, which was \$1.15.

By threats of force and violence, the other prisoners forced the plaintiff to sign a note to the jailer, asking him to bring \$3 more to the plaintiff in his cell, Gage alleges.

The Oklahoma's petition alleges that he refused the \$3 when proffered by the jailer, and "at this time, the defendant Jailer knew that the plaintiff was being forced to buy his peace."

He alleges that he was later forced to submit to a "kangaroo court," and was forced to strip from the waist down, and was severely beaten by the prisoners.

The Oklahoma alleges that he was "beaten and abused."

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## Here's How Candidates Stand 'TIME FOR CHANGE!' PLEA OF GOP'S IKE EISENHOWER

Dwight D. Eisenhower has made "it's time for a change" the keynote of his "crusade" for the presidency.

Whenever he has spoken, the Republican presidential candidate has emphasized his belief that it will take a complete change of administration — not just a "refreshing" — to clean up what he calls the "top-to-bottom-mess" in Washington.

"You can't take an organization that has been in power for too long and merely by doing a little face-lifting job, doing a little repaint job, get by with it," Eisenhower recently told an audience in Tacoma, Wash.

"Actually, I believe the administration candidate said all it needed was a little refreshing. But as far as I am concerned, how do you refresh a bad egg?"

Charges Reiterated — The fact that Eisenhower, as a five-star general, held high military posts in President Truman's administration has had no apparent effect on his criticism of the government's major policies.

In speech after speech, the former general has charged the Truman administration with fostering waste and corruption and winking at scandal.

Mr. Truman, in his whistle-stop touring, has replied that Eisenhower knows nothing of civilian government and is miscast as a presidential candidate.

Republicans have been elated by the large crowds that have turned out to hear Eisenhower make his attacks on the administration.

Eisenhower has accused the administration of "bungling" in the handling of foreign affairs, farm and labor policy, civil rights questions, inflation, resource development, defense policy and other major issues.

Some of His Views — Following are typical of the views Eisenhower has expressed on major issues:

Bipartisan foreign policy—"It is not possible to have continuing cooperation on the administration basis of heads they win and tails the Republicans lose. That is the way bipartisanship works today. The Democrats claim all the credit for its good fruits and blame the Republicans for its bad fruits.

Korea—"I proudly salute the gallant American fight in Korea. It has been in the same heroic spirit, fought with the same bravery and skill, shown by American airmen who—on the other side of the globe—four years ago saved our position in Berlin. Moreover, I believe that the decision to fight to hold Korea... was an inescapable decision. What I deplore in these cases of Berlin and Korea is this: the incompetence of political leaders which made military action necessary. Our service men were summoned to snatch military victory from political defeat."

Blames Prices, Taxes — Inflation—"The income of the average factory worker's family today is \$500 more than it was in 1950. That is family \$500 better off now. That raise has been squeezed and crushed between higher prices and higher taxes until there is nothing left of it—until there is less than nothing left of it. This (is) treadmill prosperity... tread as hard as you will, you can't even stay up to where you were."

Spending—"Of course some of this huge spending is necessary. But doesn't that very fact make frugality in government more essential than ever? Isn't it time we had in Washington an administration which knows how to keep spending down; which believes that an unbalanced budget is dangerous to every one of us—and moves to bring that budget into balance?"

Considerable oil activity has been noted in Eastland county during the past ten days. Three new locations have been made, one is plugging, while still others are in the process of drilling.

Greenbrier Oil Co., Fort Worth, No. 1 J. E. Stansell was spotted as a wildcat two miles southeast of Cisco on a 167 acre lease.

Drill site is 250 feet from the north and east line of Section 3, Block 1, H&T Survey, No. 1 Stansell is contracted for 4,200 feet with rotary.

Spotted as a well site two miles southwest of Eastland was McElroy Ranch Co., Fort Worth, No. 1 P. F. D. Wright, slated for 4,000 feet with rotary.

Site is on a 351 acre lease 400 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the west line of Section 3, Block 2, H&T Survey. It is on a 100 acre lease.

The other wildcat location was staked five miles northeast of Cisco as Bell Petroleum Co. of Los Angeles No. 1 B. D. Feldman.

Location for No. 1 Feldman, contracted for 3,800 feet with rotary, is 1,254 feet from the north and 1,771 feet from the west line of section 27, Block 4, H&T Survey. It is on a 100 acre lease.

## ABLAI STEVENSON DEFENDS POLICIES AND DEMO PROGRESS

Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson has campaigned for the presidency on a theme that the Republican Party is under the thumb of its "Old Guard." That segment of the GOP he has said has fought the "progressive" programs launched during 20 years of Democratic administration and cannot be trusted to carry them on now.

He has described his Republican opponent, Dwight D. Eisenhower, as a captive of the wing of the Republican party.

In the first week after he was "drafted" by the Democrats for the presidential nomination, the Illinois governor seemed to be stressing his independence from and differences with the Truman administration. But more recently, his declarations have indicated that his views on many major issues are close to those of President Truman.

With Stevenson's blessing, Mr. Truman freed-up his presidential train in late September to take it across the country and back to speak for Stevenson in a "give 'em hell" whistle-stop tour.

From the first, Stevenson advocated foreign policy as the major "problem" of the 1952 campaign. He believed, however, that his and Eisenhower's views coincided to a degree that it would not be an "issue" between them.

Stung when Eisenhower began shooting at the Democratic record on foreign policy, Stevenson began firing back and charged that the general was "not talking sense."

Stevenson's campaign speeches were punctuated with scolding phrases and wit, which deflected Democratic polemicists when they did not scurry about whether their candidate was talking over the heads of his audience.

From the beginning, the governor felt that he was facing two major handicaps: (1) that he was relatively unknown to the mass of American voters while his opponent was a war hero who had been a national figure for a decade; (2) that many voters were hungry for a change of administration in Washington.

To put himself before as many voters as possible, he abandoned the traditional campaign train swings across the nation. Traveling mostly by chartered plane, he placed more emphasis on large cities and television and less on whistle-stopping talks to small audiences.

Resists to GOP — To the GOP cry for a change, he replied that the country wanted a "refreshing" of the Democratic program of a sweeping shift to new policies.

Stevenson methodically placed himself on record on the national issues and complained that Eisenhower was not doing the same.

Would Limit Debate — Filibusters—If elected, Stevenson would limit debate on the platform plank calling for repeal of the Taft-Hartley Act, but said the method of "speed" or "amendment" was less important than the objective of getting a new law. Turning the present law "to the right" of legal barbed wire, he asked for legislation rejecting the use of injunctions and providing new methods of dealing with national emergency labor disputes. He said, however, that union as well as employers should be barred from "unfair labor practices."

Agriculture—Stevenson endorsed the platform plank calling for farm price supports at 80 per cent of parity on basic crops, but he ignored the "Brannan Plan," which expressing hope that ways could be found to protect perishable crops against unreasonably low prices.

Civil Rights—He said the state should protect the rights of racial and other minority groups but that the federal government must not if the state failed. He opposed a fair employment practices commission (FEPC) bill proposing federal action against discrimination in employment in states failing to pass their own laws.

The Friday battle, to be waged under the area of Bulldog stadium in Ranger beginning at 8 p.m. sharp, is a non-conference affair, but its outcome will be important in determining the potential strength of the Ranger High gridmen in their coming conference title campaign—Cisco, Stephenville and Comanche—which blasts open a week hence.

With stellar end Tommy Hinds completely mended from a shoulder injury and back in the lineup to bolster the R.H.S.'s aerial hopes, the outlook was bright this afternoon.

End Hinds is an ace pass receiver and his return to the Bulldog lineup may add terrific impetus to the highmen's striking power through the air.

In addition, Coaches Warden and Aills have put new polish on their ground tactics and are confident that their fast T-powered offense, engineered by Quarterback Gerald Bagwell, will make a credible showing against their Fort Worth rivals who are rated "top-heavy favorites to win."

The invading Hillers, who lost their first game of the year last Friday night to the Arlington Colts, 19-0 state champs, by a close 6-0 verdict, have a powerful offense, clicking off the single wing and TCU spread, and a rock-bound defense.

Their starting lineup, announced this morning, shows a definite weight advantage over the underdog Blue Devils. Going at the kickoff for the Hillers is quarterback Tommy Hinds, 175, and Chico Mendez, 170, at ends; Jim Wheeler, 170, and Eddie James, 190, at tackles; Wayne Hargrave, 165, and Bobby Justice, 160, at guards; John Rush, 166, at center; Gerald Bagwell, 150, at quarter; Bill Beavins, 130, and Charles Massey, 125, at the halves; and Herbert Williams, 160, at full.

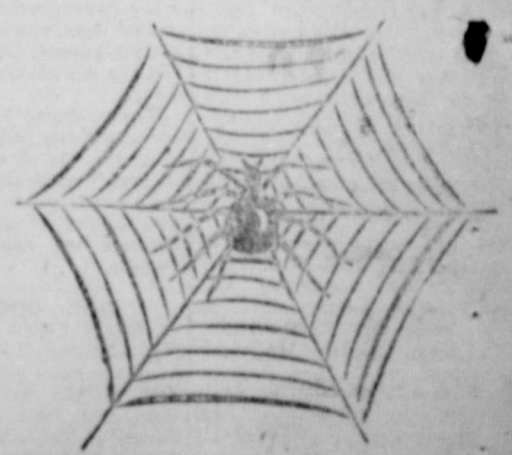

So by now we've gotten a tummy-full. Maybe you have, too. Nevertheless—

Today we came across something a bit different. About the two candidates—Ike and Adlai, of course. But different, anyhow.

A new comparison of the two presidential foes—what their handwriting reveals. Psychologists, you know, claim that handwriting is a projection of an individual's personality, reveals his behavior patterns and drives. Dr. Rosamond Webster, distinguished psychologist and noted college psychologist, analyzed the scrawls of the GOP and Demo nominees and here's what she reports—

What's in Ike's Signature: Dwight D. Eisenhower's signature reveals a rather complex personality. He is the writing of a shrewd tactician, a man who prefers to execute his plans anonymously. He does not come into the open until

he is sure of the results. His signature shows mental reservations, and he isn't always willing to complete a task. He is primarily an extrovert, likes the company of others, is intelligent, spontaneous, vivacious.

He sticks to essentials, shows realism, clear judgment, maturity. Markedly goal-minded, he has a sense of calculation and strategy. While his writing shows considerable impatience, it also shows self assurance and initiative.

Eisenhower has a dominance of social feelings. He has social ease, curiosity and optimism; he can be very communicative. His writing also indicates a preference for material values.

What's in Adlai's Signature: Adlai Stevenson's signature is characteristic of a highly sincere person. It shows deep humility, realism and self discipline. Not only is he without illusions but he has a clear picture of his capabilities and limitations—and he knows how best to utilize his abilities. Judicious, objective and matter-of-fact, he has a great capacity for getting to the essential of a situation or problem.

Somewhat of a pedant, he is also an idealist with a predominance of spiritual values. In spite of an innate love of leisure, he demonstrates a great capacity for purposeful work. His writing shows refinement, sensitivity and discrimination. He is highly articulate, with a sense of shades of meaning as a dominance of the intellectual over, his writing indicates poise, reserve and self-command, as well as a dominance of the intellectual over the emotional and instinctual.

P.S. Their financial status will have a great deal to do with the extent of the "brush."

(2) Millionaire Gov. Allan Shivers' name will be mud. His political career will be ended.

Remember, those are simply opinions. But the usual reliability of their source, we think, makes them especially worthy of mention.

This gentleman, of course, certainly could be wrong. He makes no guarantee. Merely expressed his honest opinions as a personal favor to a long-time newspaper friend.

We'll find out in a few days.

Civil rights—"We will move forward rapidly to make equality of opportunity a living fact for every American. Wherever I have pledged the people of our country that, if elected, I will support the Constitution of the United States—the whole of it. And that means that I will support and seek to strengthen and extend to every American every right that that Constitution guarantees. . . . Segregation in the nation's capital must be abolished. Likewise there must be an end to such segregation as still remains in the armed forces."

Would Amend T-H Taft-Hartley labor law—"I am not in favor of repealing, but of amending, that law. I will not support any amendments which weaken the rights of working men and women. . . . I know the law might be used to break unions. That must be changed. America wants no law licensing union-busting. Neither do I. . . . My pledge to you (labor union) is simply this: to limit my judgement can discern, you will always get both justice and fairness from me."

Defense policy—"We need . . . a new administration that will not demobilize and then hurriedly remobilize; an administration that will not swing from optimistic panic; and an administration that will plan for the future on some

Corruption—He described corruption in government as "treason" and said he had learned as governor "how to use an axe for misconduct."

Communism—Stevenson said Communists have been driven from any places of responsibility they have gained and would not be permitted to return. Asserting that he placed his faith in the FBI and Central Intelligence Agency, he repeatedly assailed the methods used by Sen. Joseph R.

**On Public Power**

Public Power—He said the government should invest in public power projects when private industry will not or cannot, but should stick to a "tight-fisted" policy in such spending.

Tidelands—Stevenson declared for federal ownership of the oil-rich submerged coastal lands but expressed hope for compromise legislation to protect the interests of both the states and federal government in the current dispute. This stand cost him the support of Gov. Allan Shivers of Texas and some other Texas Democratic leaders.

At the age of 52, Stevenson was nominated for the presidency last July after he had served three and one-half years as governor of Illinois. Many Democrats began looking at him hopefully when President Truman announced his retirement, but the governor said he only wanted to run for governor again. He gave no overt encouragement to the "draft" movement which gave him the nomination on the third ballot at the Democratic National Convention.

A financial statement made public during the campaign showed Stevenson reporting an income of \$50,046 for the past 10 years, leaving him \$238,068 after taxes. His one-fourth share in the Bloomington newspaper was his largest single source of income.
