Bishop William C. Martin Will Speak To Methodist Conference

Bishop Wm. C. Martin of Dallas will be the featured speaker at the opening sessions of the Cisco District Conference of the Methodist Church which meets in Ranger the night of November 3 and all day the 4th. He will first address the Methodist men of the district in their annual banquet program at 6:30 o'clock Monday evening in the Ranger church basement. Following this meeting he will preach the sermon for the opening worship service in the church sanctuary at 7:45 for all of the assembled delegates and visitors from over the district.

At eleven o'clock on Tuesday, November 4, Dr. A. Norman Evans pastor of the Austin Avenue Methodist church in Waco, will preach. During the day there will be various matters of connectional and local interest to be presented to the conference including reports from the pastors and churches of the district, promotion of schools and colleges, evangelism, missions, lay activities, temperance, Sunday School work and better methods of financing the church. The district conference will have a num-

Local Choirs To Present Songs For Conference

The special music under preparation for the Annual District Conference of the Methodist Church will include anthems and descants to be presented by the Chancel Choir and the Vesper Choir. The conference will be held in the First Methodist Church, Monday evening Nov. 3, at 7:30 o'clock. The Vesper Choir is directed by Mrs. David D. Pickrell.

Accompanist is Mrs. Lowell Rainwater. Assistant director is Mrs. Barbara Smith. Miss Mildred Balch, regular church organist, will be at the organ for the service.

At the request of district superintendent, Rev. Leslie Seymour, the choirs have prepared a brief Hymn-Service. Singing some of the good hymns of the church, the choirs will sing parts, unison, separately, and with the congregation, so that everyone has the opportunity to participate in the service. To heighten the enjoyment of singing these hymns, the choirs will sing Descant to several of the tunes, while the congregation maintains the melody. These hymns are included in the service: "Praise to the Lord," "I Want a Principle Within," "O Jesus, Thou Art Standing," "O God, Our Help in Ages Past," and "God of Grace." The Processional Hymn is "Jesus Shall Reign," sung to the tune "Duke Street" with Descant by the choirs.

The Vesper Choir, in addition to helping with the hymns and singing several descants, will also sing the Introit, "Light for Us a Candle," written by Mozart. A responsive reading based upon the hymn tune "Old 100th" (The Doxology), will be used, with participation by both choirs and the congregation.

The Chancel Choir will sing two anthems "Come, Come Ye Sinners" (by Cornwall) and the Offertory Anthem, "When Thou Comest" from "Staber Mater" by Rossini. Miss Neita Faye Colvin, a student at Ranger Junior College, will be the soloist.

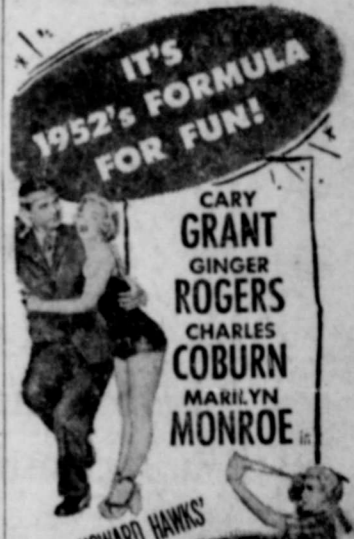
