With presidential balloting due to begin in Eastland County, in Texas and over the nation in little more than 46 hours from now, interest of citizens-men and women, rich and poor, urban and rural dwellers, in all walks of lifeis mounting by the hour.

And in Eastland County officials today predicted that 7,000 or more qualified voters may cast votes during Tuesday's general election in the area's 25 voting precincts.



Major Bid Of Ike To Woo **Demo South**

Dwight D. Eisenhower has made the most ambitious campaign ever undertaken by a Republican presidential nominee to woo the

usualyl Democratic South .

The 11 states of the old Confederacy have 128 electoral votes. Normally going to the Democratic candidate, they provide almost half of the 266 electoral votes needed to win the presidency.

With rare exceptions, these states have been voting for the Democratic nominee since the end of the reconstruction years after the Civil War.

In 1920, Tennessee gave its majority to Warren G. Harding. In 1928, Herbert Hoover made the only major breach in the "solid South." In that fear, the Catholic issue was raised against Alfred E. Smith, the Democratic nominee,

in the heavily Protestant South.

Mr. Hoever won 62 southern electoral votes in 1928 by carrying five states—Florida, North Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and Virginia Since them, no southern state has cast a Republican majority.

However, conservative southerners have been growing restless in the Democratic Party since the second term of President Roose-


A revolt in 1948 led to the formation of the State's Rights Demeratic party, which won 39 southern electral votes. They were the votes of Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and South Carolina, plus one of the Tennessee electors.

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


