GOP Nominee Wins Terrific Eastland Vote

Dwight D. Eisenhower carried Eastland County by a large majority in Tuesday's general election and became the first Republican presidential candidate in history to carry the normally solidly Democratic area.

Although the state of Texas went Republican for the GOP candidate Herbert Hoover back in 1928, Eastland County remained loyal to the Democratic party.

Cisco and Eastland gave Eisenhower heavy majorities over his opponent, Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois, but Ranger's two boxes went Democratic during the day's balloting which brought out a record number of voters in the county's 26 precincts.

The Eastland County trend appeared Texas-wide Wednesday morning.

At that time reports indicated that Eisenhower was carrying Texas by a majority of 100,000 votes to become the second Republican presidential candidate ever to carry the Democratic Lone Star state.

Ex-president Herbert Hoover carried Texas over his Democratic opponent, Gov. Alfred E. Smith of New York, in 1928.

Robert Johnson, manager of the Texas Election Bureau, reported at mid-morning today that it "was impossible for Stevenson to catch Eisenhower" as final returns continued to pour in at Dallas. Johnson is a veteran analyst of voting trends.

Returns from 242 of the state's 254 counties, including 48 complete, gave Eisenhower 829,369 votes to 723,129 for Stevenson.

About 400,000 Texas votes were still uncounted and the final vote would be about 2,008,000, far above the old record of 1,300,000.

Over the nation, Eisenhower's Tuesday triumph was scored as one of the greatest ballot victories since the late Franklin D. Roosevelt was landslide into office back in 1932.

Early Wednesday with returns yet far from complete, Eisenhower led in 35 states with 397 electoral votes.

These two Americans—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, left, and Sen. Richard Nixon—will lead the Nation as the next President and Vice President respectively when they take over the reins of United States government next January. The two Republicans won a smashing victory over Demo-crat nominee Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois and his running mate, Sen. John J. Sparkman of Alabama in Tuesday's election. Eisenhower and Nixon broke the traditionally Democratic solid South, carried Texas, and Eastland County voters, for the first time in history, went Republican in a presidential election Tuesday.

RANGER CHEST VOLUNTEERS HAVE COLLECTED \$3,995; GOAL OF \$6,800 IS \$2,905 AWAY

As the 14th day of effort began this morning, Ranger's Community Chest campaign stood at the \$3,995 mark, Miss Marjorie Maddocks secretary, reported at noon today. Quota in the current drive is \$6,800.

Strawn Bankers Draw Terms In Penitentiary

Joseph H. Stuart, 52, and Judd R. Stuart, 42, former president and vice president respectively of the First National Bank of Strawn, were sentenced to terms of 18 months each in prison by Federal Judge T. W. Davidson in U. S. District Court at Fort Worth Tuesday afternoon after pleading guilty to embezzlement.

The Stuart brothers, both prominent citizens and members of a pioneer Palo Pinto County family, admitted embezzlements totaling \$140,458.27 from the Strawn bank.

Following discovery of the embezzlements, the men were arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Milam in Fort Worth on April 7, charged with the violations, and were released under bonds of \$10,000 each.

Judd Stuart, mayor of Strawn from 1944 to 1950 and a key Palo Pinto County political leader, rose to impressive heights in state Democratic politics and was named secretary of the state party executive committee. He resigned immediately after the embezzlements were discovered.

Th former vice president of the bank allegedly entered the bank at night near the end of the month and substituted "fixed" Wummies for the usual bank statements which went to depositors as the brothers juggled the accounts of relatives.

Accounts involved were those of W. B. Stuart, S. J. Stuart, Mrs. W. B. Stuart and the W. B. Stuart Special Account.

Full restitution of the embezzled funds was made when the brothers deeded over their interests in the Stuart Ranch to the relatives whose accounts were involved. A transfer of a number of shares of stock in the First National Bank also was alleged to have been made in the restoration act.

Contracts For New Water Supply For Eastland And Ranger Due To Be Let By Board On Nov. 25

Plans for actual construction of the new \$1,500,000 dam and water supply for Ranger and Eastland neared the action stage today as the Eastland County Water Supply Board, headed by President C. B. Pruet of Ranger, announced that advertisements for bids had been issued.

Opening of the bids and probable letting of the contracts for construction of the Leon River Dam—for clearing the site of the big reservoir, and for laying of the supply lines to the Ranger and Eastland water plants—is due for Tuesday, November 25, at 3 p.m., Pruet said.

All preliminary construction details and plans, including acquisition of land needed for the big project are progressing at a rapid rate, the board members announced, and actual work may begin around December 1, a few days after the contract is let.

F. W. Free, of Fort Worth, representing Freese and Nichols, who have set up a schedule for the \$1,500,000 project, said.

PC SPOTLIGHT ON RJC TILT WITH REBELS

A roundup of Pioneer Conference statistics today put of emphasis on the comical contest in Arlington today night between the Junior College Rangers and powerful Arlington State Rebels.

The Rebels are cited circuit's best offensive and the Rangers hold as the league's best defense.

What will be the result of the meeting remains a question. But the answer will come during the final gun of the Conference thriller over Arlington. The opening kickoff set for Saturday at 8 p.m. will see a large number of Rangers on the field, many of them aboard the train which has been chartered for the game, will be on to cheer the Purple & Whites of RJC's Coach Booth.

With two more games remaining on the schedule for most Pioneer Conference teams, the Rebels, league leaders through the season's play, have a commanding lead in total offense from scrimmage.

ASC's explosive backfielders have run up net gains of 2,773 yards in 8 games, for an average of 354 yards per contest. The Rebels have a total of 1,785 yards rushing and 988 yards passing.

Ranger is the loop's outstanding defensive team allowing seven opponents a total of 39 points and holding the opposition to a net average of 143 yards rushing per game.

Durwood Watkins, fleet Schreiner halfback, is now the league's leading runner with 77 carries for 404 yards, an average of 5.3 per run. He is trailed by Bud Hamrick of Ranger with 57 runs for 360 yards.

The individual passing championship has been virtually clinched by Sam Howard, the ASC Rebel chunker. Howard has completed 55 of 131 pitches for 967 yards, an average of 17.5 per completion. His nearest rival is Bobby Bowmer of Schreiner who has completed 32 of 64 passes for 433 yards.

James Brazell, Schreiner's classy end, is the league's leading pass receiver with 25 receptions for 311 yards, and average of 12.5 yards per catch. Brazell's (Continued On Page 4)



standing committees representing the county are being organized for the coming year by President Charlie Joe Owen, new chamber leader.

During the coming months the committee will work with the Eastland County Water Supply Board, headed by C. B. Pruet of Ranger, president, in furthering plans and construction of the new \$1,500,000 dam and water supply to serve Ranger and Eastland when completed.

The move for the new lake was initiated some time ago by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, according to R. V. Galloway, secretary-manager of the local organization, and therefore the activity of the chamber's water resources group, headed by Chairman David D. Pickrell, is "of outstanding importance."

Other members of the special committee include L. R. Pearson, Wilson Guest, Pete Brashier, Addie Williams and J. J. Kelly.

Jim Ed Willman from Eastland is a member of the Southern Methodist University Mustang band this fall. A freshman student, Willman plans to get a B. S. degree in physics.

In the meantime, H. C. Henderson announced this morning that tickets are still available, and fans in this area may purchase round-trip tickets for the rail junket at the office of Ranger Junior College, or at the Ranger Chamber of Commerce. The tickets are priced at \$3.16.

The grid special, loaded with fans, members of the Ranger High and Ranger Junior College bands and the Rangers grid squad, is scheduled to depart from Ranger at 12:45 noon Saturday. It'll arrive in Arlington at 3:50 p.m. following a 30-minute stopover in Fort Worth.

Reverses in business enterprises in which the brothers were engaged was blamed by the Stuarts as the cause for filing the funds from the bank.

A parade of prominent witnesses testified at Tuesday afternoon's trial asking leniency for the embezzlers. Included were Clyde Scott, a director of the rival Strawn National Bank and general manager of the Strawn Merchandise Company; the Rev. Chester A. Wilkerson, pastor of the First Methodist Church, Strawn; and Judge Ernest E. Belcher of the 29th District Court at Stephenville.

After hearing the pleas of the witnesses, the Federal magistrate prefaced his sentence with the statement that "a judge's first duty is justice, then mercy."

Following pronouncement of the 18-months penitentiary terms, the Stuart brothers were immediately fingerprinted in the U. S. Marshall's office and taken to the Tarrant County jail.

The case was one of the most widely discussed in the annals of Strawn.

Repercussions of the citizenry were first felt during the Democratic primary election last summer when Strawn citizens slapped Gov. Allan Shivers at the polls, giving his weaker opponent, Ralph Yarborough, a majority in that precinct. Gov. Shivers had been close to Judd Stuart and had visited in Strawn on several occasions as the latter's guest.

Later also Stuart's follows encountered trouble in holding control of the Democratic party in the Strawn area. Strawn municipal politics also became enmeshed in a turmoil. Although no formal action was ever taken, a group of citizens had circulated a petition calling for an audit of city's books. The books had been audited since 1940, the payments declared, and the proceeds covered the administrations of late Mayor E. L. Clifton, Mayor Judd Stuart, and Mayor Paul Stephen.

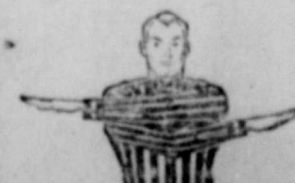

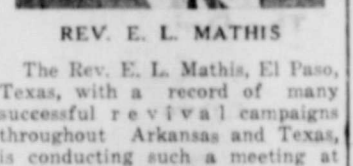

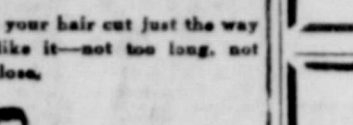
