Turkey Profits Spur Plans County Raisers

There is money in raising turkeys even in a dry year when you have to buy all, or nearly all, of your feed, according to more than a dozen Eastland County farmers.

"That's the highly optimistic note around the Rising Star area—a reporter of the Abilene Reporter-News recently learned that turkey growers in that vicinity "are now totaling up their year's profits and getting ready for another cash crop."

The growers have sold their 1952 flocks, averaging 21 cents for the toms and 35 cents for the hens.

After 28 weeks of feeding the birds averaged from 22 to 23.5 pounds for toms and 12-15 pounds for hens and netted the growers \$1.30 to \$2 a bird.

"You can't sit on the back porch and rock and watch your turkeys grow into money," according to J. Elmo Smith, who raised 4,000 birds this year.

"Turkey growing takes work. This is my fourth year in the turkey business and the first time I haven't tried to do some row cropping farming at the same time. Partly because of dry weather and partly because the flock took so much attention I didn't have much time for anything else," he said.

MONEY IN TURKEYS
But there's money in the turkey business, he said.

Next year he plans to increase his production from 4,000 to 8,000 birds. But he's taking his father-in-law, E. E. Bryan, into the undertaking.

Turkey growing is fast becoming an important phase of the Eastland County farm program, according to County Agent J. M. Cooper.

Eastland Wins In Citizenship Contest In Area

The Eastland Chamber of Commerce recently entered the Citizenship contest sponsored by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. The gist of it all was to learn just what per cent of people are interested in Government, and governmental affairs.

So far as we know Eastland was a high winner among many other contesting counties. Out in Garden City in Glasscock county they turned in wonderful reports. The county has 463 qualified voters, and 454 of these voters voted in the election. That is a record of 98 per cent and they are looking for challengers.

Well, here in Eastland county with a population of 23,942, there were 6618 poll taxes issued, while 8268 votes were cast. This shows a total of 124.9 per cent corresponding to poll taxes issued.

However, both counties had many "unders and overs" who voted, but there was no way to learn just how many of the group "didn't" vote. Until we learn the complete figure, Eastland county is winner.

Field festivities, however, get underway at 8 o'clock with the coronation of the Rangers' 1952 Football Queen. The colorful rites will honor a Ranger Junior College co-ed who was elected as grid sweetheart during balloting of members of the RJC 1952 squad Wednesday. Her identity will remain secret until the coronation.

Although his club is "just in fair shape" due to injuries, Coach Boone Yarbrough, RJC mentor, Friday said the Purple & White will "give the invading Cardinals all we've got."

The Henderson Countians boast a very powerful squad and are one of the state's most potent junior collegiate grid outfits.

Although defeated by the Arlington State Rebels earlier in the season, the Cardinals later whammed Tarleton State College, Stephenville, 20-14. The Rangers lost a close out to the TSCers recently and tied Arlington last Saturday night. In other comparative contests the Cardinals swamped Allen Academy 41-0 while the latter was topped, 21-6, by the Rangers.

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Hundreds Fans To Follow Squad For Jacket Tilt

"Now or never time" is only about five short hours away. Today's sun soon will slowly set, the shades of night will be drawn over the twilight of this winter night, and over at Stephenville under a battering of bright, gleaming arcs the clock will tick away the breath-taking seconds until 8 o'clock—and a rendezvous with destiny, perhaps, for Ranger High School's 1952 Bulldogs.

TITLE AT STAKE
Then, with the coveted District 16-AA championship for 1952 as the prize at stake, the heavily favored Stephenville Yellow Jackets and their underdog foes, the Ranger High Bulldogs, will clash for 48 action-packed minutes.

Never before, perhaps has pregame psychology been so strong, so pronounced.

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More Contributions Asked—Chest Needs \$2,147 To Fill \$6,800 Quota

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Texans Set New Vote Record In Nov. 4 Election

Texas voters set a new balloting record in the general election on Tuesday, Nov. 4, a final report from Dallas said late Thursday.

A total of 2,972,641 persons voted in the presidential referendum, according to tabulations of complete unofficial returns from all 254 of the state's counties.

Texas gave Republican President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower 1,103,807 votes and defeated Democrat Adlai Stevenson polled 965,328.

he cautioned against storing the fat for more than 30 days, since it has a tendency to become stale if not used within a short time. Beansblossom also demonstrated the proper method of killing and dressing the birds either for the home freezer or the commercial market. He showed how the dressed carcass should be prepared and wrapped for freezer locker storage.

The many ways of preparing turkey for table use may be supplied by the county home demonstration agent, Beansblossom said, in a bulletin prepared by the Extension Service's home economist, Mrs. Tidwell, treasurer; and Miss Beaum Van Winkle, Gorman, secretary.

Object of the association is to encourage the production of more turkeys, to assist in creating a greater and a year-around demand for turkeys, and to assist members in growing problems. As part of the program to create a wider market for the birds, the association last week sponsored a demonstration in the shop at the Rising Star High School in which F. Z. Beansblossom, poultry marketing specialist of Texas A & M College Extension Service, showed a large group of growers and others how to prepare birds for different kinds of markets.

WAYS TO SERVE

There are more ways to serve a turkey than by baking and stuffing the carcass with dressing, Beansblossom said.

Working with the carcass of a large tom, he cut the bird up and explained the various cuts and how they might be prepared. At the same time he demonstrated the preparation and wrapping of the pieces for freezer lockers. Approximately 55 per cent of a dressed turkey may be converted into boneless meat, and of this 42 per cent may be converted into steaks, Turkey steak, he said, commands a price of \$1.46 a pound on the current market.

In some places, cafes and coffee shops are specializing in turkey steak, "and," Beansblossom said, "it is becoming a choice item on the menus." He used a tenderizing machine in preparing the steaks, giving them uniformity in thickness and size.

Practically all of the bone, skin and fat removed from the bird may be used for meat stock, but
