who died of wounds far from battle lines. The current total to date far exceeds that of Texas' battle for independence against - Mexico in 1836

War casualties however, are nothing new to the Lone Star domain. A total of 13,810 Texans, died for their country during recent World War II. And a total of 2,722 fighting men of the state made the supreme sacrifice during World War I.


