County Plugs Second Test For Cheap Water

It looks as if Eastland County will have to continue buying water, a now-precious and expensive necessity, from the City of Eastland—and like it.

A second attempt to bring in a water well on the courthouse square in Eastland has been abandoned at a depth of 42 feet, it was reported Monday by county officials.

Formations in the second hole were very similar to those of the initial test put down a few yards away, except that the first well produced more water. However, both wells were exceptionally small producers—only 5 to 10 gallons daily.

RJC Nips Henderson Powerhouse, 12-6!

In a slow contest waged before a sparse crowd of less than 1,000 spectators, Coach Boone Yarborough's 1952 Ranger Junior College Rangers ground out a 12-6 victory over the Cardinals of Henderson County Junior College, Athens, at Bulldog Stadium in Ranger Saturday night.

The tilt was a non-conference affair and marked the final home appearance of the Purple & White RJC machine which is scheduled to wind up its current campaign against Schreiner Junior College Saturday night in a Pioneer Conference clash.

The Rangers seemed to lack their usual spark and fire during the game which drug through four quarters with activity fairly evenly balanced between both elevens. The RJCers, trailing 0-6 at the half, bounced back in the third canto to tie it up at 6-all, and then marked 68-yards to score midway in the final period and ice up the victory.

After an even-even first quarter, the opening of the second period found Ranger on their own 22-yard line. Halfback Charles Blanton pounded over left tackle to the 21, a pass, Quarterback Del Baker to Fullback Matthews, was good for 23 yards and a push down to the 44. There the Rangers fumbled and the oval was recovered on the Purple & Whites' 41-yard stripe by Robert Corley, one of the Cardinals' stand-out defenders.

CARDS SCORE FIRST
The Cardinals' hand-driving Don Hanks skirted right end to reach the 32 before he was tagged, but Willie Langston slashed over right tackle for five more and a first down, and then Langston hit Wendell Martin, 190-pound end, with a spid aerial and the wingman step-

After the mid-time break, the Rangers took Sims' second half kickoff boom, with Brazil doing the toting, back to their own 31. Freddy Sanders picked up two yards over right guard, Blanton cut around right end for two more, Quarterback Buddy Hamrick hit center for a first down. Blanton was dropped behind the line for a 2-yard loss and then Hamrick tossed a pass to Rusty Talbot who raced down to the Cardinals' 13-yard stripe. The aerial was good for 46 yards and a first down.

TALLY ON PASS
Blanton hammered through for eight, Hamrick knifed through center to the one, was pushed back to the two on the next play, made 1; back to the one on the third down, and on the chin-down fourth and goal-to-go, Hamrick hit Talbot with a pass in the end zone for the score.

Baker's kick for the point was nullified by a penalty and on the second attempt a pass-for-point—Baker to Jones—failed to connect.

All Men Except Those In Service Must Register

A reminder that all men with the exception of those now on active duty with the armed forces who were born after Sept. 1, 1922 and who have passed their 18th birthdays must be registered with the Selective Service Board, was issued recently.

The reminder was made due to the fact that some reservists are getting the erroneous idea that they need not register.

The Selective Service Act of 1948 makes it mandatory that all men in this age group, if they are not actually on active duty, must register.

Even those men who have had active service and who have been discharged with a reserve status are liable to everyday living.

New Car Dealer Gets Award For Safety Efforts

Presentation of a Highway Safety Award for contributing to traffic safety has been made to Anderson Chevrolet Co., Ranger, by the Texas Automotive Dealers Association, the state organization of new car dealers.

The award is in recognition of the local dealer's lending an automobile for high school driver training during the 1951-52 school year to Ranger high school.

C. B. Smith, Austin, State Safety Chairman for the dealers association, described this contribution to safe driving by the local dealers as a significant service to the community, the state and the nation.

The safety awards are signed jointly by officers of the Automotive Industry National Safety Committee, and State and National new car dealer associations.

In Texas alone last school year more than 250 members of the authorized dealers association loaned cars to schools in their community where "behind the wheel" instruction is given in high school training.

It was estimated by E. A. Kinzel, Beaumont, president of the state association, that this represents an investment of more than \$500,000 which Texas new car dealers have in a "revolving" fund devoted to safety education.

T. T. Gee, Cisco Negro Preacher, Given Jail Term

Rev. Teddy T. Gee, Cisco (colored) Baptist preacher, who was indicted by an Eastland County grand jury some time ago, and charged with assault with intent to murder, has been successful in having the charge reduced to aggravated assault. To this charge he entered a plea of guilty, and the court assessed his punishment at a fine of \$200, and costs and 60 days in the county jail.

Gee is now serving his jail sentence.

Light Showers Pelt Eastland Area Monday

Light showers Monday afternoon and night preface the arrival of a new cool front which moved into the Eastland County area early Tuesday.

The skies outburst, reported rather general over the county, netted a negligible amount of water in most sections, however.

The morning forecast of the U. S. Weather Bureau gave no clue as to any future precipitation.

Continued cool and fair weather was predicted for Eastland County today and tonight with today's high mercury reading due in the mid-70s and tonight's low due to be recorded somewhere between 45 and 50 degrees.

For Wednesday, weather forecasters see slightly warmer weather for this area with the mercury due to range near the 80-degree mark.

Although Eastland County was pelted generally by only light showers in the post-weekend sky-letting, some other sections of Texas, particularly the North Central region, reported heavy rains.

Man Critically Stabbed During Saturday Brawl

Angel Renteria, a 37-year-old Ranger Latin American resident, remained in critical condition today in a local hospital as a result of stab wounds received in an altercation at a North Rusk Street residence in Ranger Sunday morning at 1:30 a.m.

Renteria was knifed in half a dozen places and was rushed to the hospital immediately after the attack.

Two other Ranger Latin Americans, 19 and 30 years of age, both believed to have been assailants of the wounded man, were arrested at the scene of the attack by City Officers Joe Faircloth and Ed Freeman.

Another 33-year-old man was picked up Sunday about noon by Officer Ralph Veale who wound up the investigation of the stabbing which occurred at a private party and dance at the Rusk Street residence. About 100 men and women, most of them Latin Americans, were attending the affair.

All three men arrested after the incident were turned over to Sheriff Frank Tucker who placed them in the Eastland County Jail.

Newman of Brownwood, president of the Alumni Association, at half-time ceremonies of the Texas Conference Game in which McMurray College defeated Howard Payne 38 to 26.

Pastor Melvin Rathel, of First Baptist Church, Eastland, was elected president of the alumni association to succeed Judge Newman, Gene W. Wagner of Brownwood, was elected vice-president and Mrs. Gabrielle Day, dean of Howard Payne women, was re-elected secretary.

Pep Rallies Set To Spur RHS On To '52 Title

Coaches Warn Squad Against Over-Confidence

Much credit for the sizzling success of Coach O. C. Stubby Warden's and Sam Aill's 1952 Ranger High School Bulldogs grid juggernaut goes to the cheering students and ardent fan followers whose enthusiasm, confidence and loyalty has bolstered the Maroon & White's determination and fighting spirit.

The Bulldogs' sensational 14-13 upset triumph over the highly-rated and heavily-favored Stephenville High Yellow Jackets at Stephenville last Friday night was prefaced by a stretch of daily pep rallies and fan-boosting meets which did much to heighten morale of the 1952 Ranger schoolboy pigskin aggregation which meets the Comanche High Indians Friday night at Comanche in a contest which will determine if the RHSers are to repeat as District 10AAA champions.

In order to aid their fighting team in its new bid for the championship, students and adult followers of the Maroon & White machine are staging daily pep rallies.

Downtown Rallies

The first cheer session was held at noon today in front of the Gholson Hotel, on Main Street in downtown Ranger. In addition to student cheering, Ranger business men are making pep talks which are expected to add fire and sizzle to the pre-championship battle pep sessions.

Thursday night, on the eve of the crucial Comanche clash, there'll be a gigantic pep rally expected to draw hundreds of supporters, at the Gholson Hotel.

Then, a few hours before kickoff time, there'll be a final send-off session, punctuated with rousing cheers and fiery pep talks, in the Ranger High auditorium Friday morning at 11:30 a.m. Everyone, including business men and adult fans in Ranger and the surrounding area, is cordially invited to be present for the big, final rally.

"This is the most important game of the year," Coaches Warden and Aills solemnly commented last Monday. "This is the big one—the game that really counts."

Easy Over-Confidence

Coach Warden, hoping his high-stepping lads will play the stellar Brand of football they exhibited against Stephenville last week, warned that "over-confidence" can turn Ranger's high championship hopes into a heap of stonning defeat.

"Don't let Comanche catch us like we caught Stephenville," he admonished his lads during their

initial stiff daily drill session out at Bulldog Stadium Monday afternoon.

The Maroon & White squad is rated to win the Friday night set for the 19AAA title, but the Ranger High mentors are taking no chances.

"Last week's pre-game ratings and advance dope of the press in general proved that these ball games don't always turn out the way they're figured by newspapermen and football experts," Assistant Coach Aills commented soberly.

Coaches Warden and Aills, after lashing their RHS stalwarts through a long and rugged drill session yesterday afternoon, have prescribed more of that treatment

for the squad today and tomorrow. There'll be plenty of hard labor on offensive and defensive maneuvers. And plenty of emphasis will be placed on improved blocking and more vicious tackling during the rugged drill bouts. The blocking and tackling exhibits of the Bulldogs in the Stephenville fracas were stellar and proved major factors in the club's amazing upset triumph.

Hargrave Is Out
The squad will be tapered off with a light drill Thursday afternoon. At that time they'll probably be in for a little skull data and will lightly review some new plays in limbering up drills, the coaches said.

SOCIAL SECURITY WORKER TO VISIT CITY WEDNESDAY; LAW CHANGES POINTED OUT

A representative of the Ablene office of the Social Security Administration will be at the Ranger Retail Merchants Assn. office in Ranger Wednesday at 3:30 p.m., announces Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Ablene office of the agency.

At that time, he said, persons who need assistance in regard to retirement or death claims under the Social Security Act are invited to visit and confer with the SSA representative.

Fisher called attention to a recent change in the law that will make it possible for certain persons over the age of 75 to have their retirement payments refigured.

Any worker who is 75 years of age or older and who has continued to work in 1951 and 1952, should recheck with the social security office. Some of these workers have previously been told that refiguring of their amounts was possible, but there is a special provision in the 1952 amendments that changes this.

Persons who are 75 years of age or over may now receive their old-age and survivors insurance payments whether or not they have retired. Any person who has not checked on their rights should do so as soon as possible. Even if the worker is still on his regular full-time job, he can still draw his regular monthly social security benefits.

Final Chest Push Is On This Week

The big, final push to put Ranger's Community Chest campaign over the top began Monday as the local fund-raising effort went into its fourth week.

Early Tuesday, according to a report from Miss Marjorie McDocks, chest secretary, the drive was \$1,424 short of the \$6,900 quota.

Her report, issued this morning at 10 a.m., showed cash collections totaling \$4,498 and pledges of \$877 for a combined total of \$5,375.

A meeting of team captains, under direction of Ted St. Clair, chairman of the solicitations committee, was scheduled to be called this week. That session, during which all contact schedules and cards will be checked, will be a

final phase of the drive.

"We are very pleased with the progress of the drive thus far," W. C. Whittle, president of the chest organization, said Monday afternoon. "And we hope to make every effort to bring the campaign to a successful end within a few days—by the end of the week if possible."

The drive has been carried on by a group of volunteer workers who have unselfishly offered their time and effort in raising funds with which to finance activities of eight highly important civic and charity organizations for the coming year—1953.

Purpose of the annual campaign is to combine all solicitation appeals into one fund-collecting drive. This obviates the necessity

of families being called on several times during the year to contribute to the organizations.

"Give once for all," is the slogan of the Ranger drive.

The simple, easy way to give to the chest and to thus aid the worthy organizations which constitute its membership, says Whittle, is to pledge a day's pay. Pledges, he pointed out, may be paid in convenient installments arranged to fit any family's budget.

Sharing in the proceeds raised during the current Ranger Community Chest drive will be the American Red Cross, the Salvation Army, the United Service Organization, the Ranger Child Welfare Club, Boy and Girl Scouts, the Community Public Library and the Teen Canteen.

Loan Sharks In For Criticism

AUSTIN, Tex. — Thousands of small borrowers in Texas are paying 140 per cent 200, per cent, and even 250 per cent to loan sharks but there is yet more to the evil than this, declares Senator George Nokes of Corsicana, chairman of the antisyndicate committee of the State Junior Bar Association.

Even worse than the loss of money to the borrower through unconscionable usury is the effect on his health and happiness, the committee has found. A borrower becomes so burdened with the high interest payments that, in most instances, he gets behind and then he is subjected to harassment which grows more and more severe.

At first, he receives dunning letters which threaten his credit rating. Then he is called over the phone at his place of employment several times a day and at his home so frequently that he may quit answering the phone entirely. Then he will receive special delivery letters and telegrams late at night in order to break into his rest.

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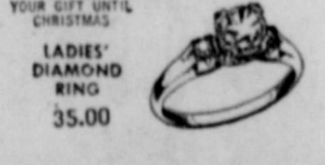
