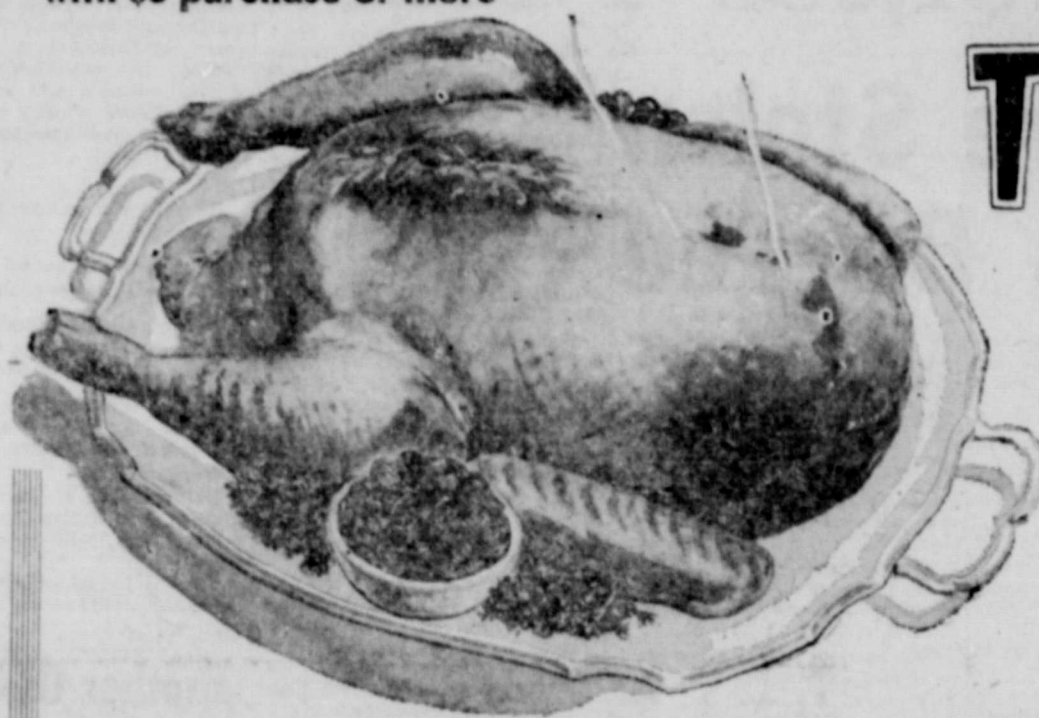

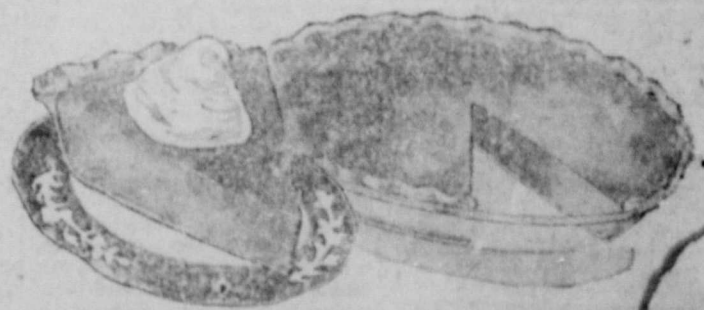

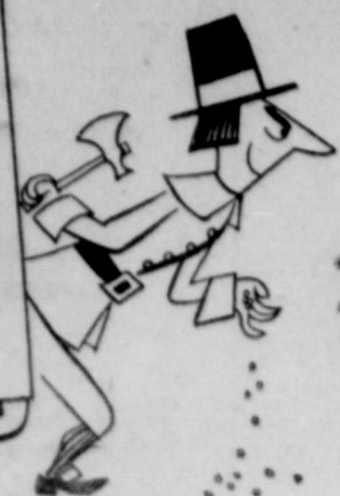

Corn Bread and Pork Score Easy "Ringer"



Left-over pork is sweet meat when combined in its own gravy with the full-bodied flavor of corn meal. And there is an easy way to do it so that corn bread, meat and gravy can be served together as the main dish of a tasty meal.
The framework of this nourishing dinner is the corn bread, baked in a ring mold. While the bread is baking, heat the meat in its gravy, and you have a quick meal for a washday Monday or any other particularly busy day of the week.
Corn bread goes well with gravy, too, for it does not quickly become soggy. In addition, it tends to hold the heat in the meat and gravy, keeping each serving piping hot until it reaches the dinner plate.
Pork and gravy in a corn bread ring is a simple way to use left-over meat. Try it soon and score a "ringer" at the table. Your family will be pleasantly surprised at this tasty combination of corn and the economical, left-over pork.

Pork and Gravy in Corn Bread Ring
1 1/2 cups corn meal
1/2 cup sifted flour
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
3 teaspoons baking powder
2 eggs, beaten slightly
1 1/4 cups sweet milk
1/4 cup melted butter or margarine
3 cups diced left-over roast pork
1 1/2 cups gravy
(If self-rising corn meal and flour are used, omit salt and baking powder.)
Mix and sift together the dry ingredients. Combine beaten eggs and melted butter or margarine, which has been cooled. Pour liquid over dry ingredients, mixing only until moistened. Pour into a well-greased 9-inch ring mold and bake in a 400° F. oven until it shrinks from the sides of the mold (about 25 minutes). Unmold and fill with pork and gravy which have been thoroughly heated together. Yield: 8 servings.

Christopher TV Programs Gain In Popularity

More than 7,000,000 persons each week view the new 15-minute television program presented weekly by the Christopher on 63 stations from coast to coast.

On TV since mid-September, the Christopher presentations are filmed and made available with out cost to the stations. The program, entitled "What One Person Can Do", feature anecdotes which show what an individual can do with God's help to change the world for the better.

These real-life stories are related by Father James Keller, M. M., founder and director of the Christopher. He also conducts discussions with leading personalities and celebrities, who contribute their time and talent to the program.

Christopher films are made in New York and in Hollywood and then are shipped out to the TV stations each week from the Christopher headquarters at 18 East 48th Street, in New York City. At the present time, 59 out

of a total of 65 areas in the country where TV coverage now extends present the Christopher quarter-hour weekly series. In Baltimore, Cleveland, Detroit and Omaha two stations feature the Christopher program.

Average cost of producing one Christopher movie a week for television is \$3,500. A unique feature of this Christopher television project is that no collections, appeals or fund-raising drives are conducted to cover the expense of producing the weekly films. All contributions are completely voluntary and unselected. The \$53,000 to cover the cost of the first 16 films was spontaneously provided, mainly in small amounts, by Christopher friends throughout the country. It is hoped to make 52 films a year under this same policy.

Air time is donated by the individual stations as a public service. It is estimated that cost of the time for the 63-station network would exceed \$750,000 a year.

Prior to launching the TV series this fall, the Christophers had made four 30-minute films which have been shown to groups throughout the country as well as in motion picture theaters and on

TV. Founded in 1945, the Christophers seek to show the power of each individual under God, to bring "Christ into the marketplace and restore peace to the world." Over 700,000 persons participate in the Christopher movement, which has no meetings, no memberships and no dues.

Cancer Killer Many Children Under 15 Years

Cancer kills five times as many children under age 15 each year as does diphtheria, nearly three times as many as meningitis, and twice as many as either tuberculosis, polio, influenza, or whooping cough. Nearly half the deaths in the under-15 group are among children below five years of age, says a warning from Northwestern National Life Insurance Co.

Though far fewer cases of cancer in children are encountered than of any of the other diseases mentioned, the fatality rate is extremely high, in part because parents usually do not suspect its existence in children, and in all too many cases the condition is not discovered until too late.

Approximately 3,000 children under 15 die each year from cancer in all its forms including leukemia. This compares with an average annual death toll in the same age group of a little over 1,500 from all forms of tuberculosis, approximately 1,250 from whooping cough, 1,350 from influenza, 1,185 from meningitis, approximately 1,000 from polio and under 600 from diphtheria, on the basis of a three-year average of government vital statistics, says the report.

In the child, body cells multiply faster than in an adult. This holds true of malignant growths, as well as of normal, healthy tissues. Therefore cancer, when it occurs in children, usually progresses much more rapidly than it does in adults.

Cancerous conditions are more often caught in their early stages among infants, because of the frequent medical checkups given children in their first year of life, says the warning report.

Malignancies such as brain, kidney and bone tumors are more often found in children under ten years of age. Tumors of the adrenal glands and of the lymphatics, leukemia, and retinal tumors are more likely to be found in children under five.

Any symptoms such as the following call for prompt medical examination: Puff of one eye which, gray or green instead of the normal black; obstructed breathing, especially if child is over two years of age and usual causes—colds, bronchitis, etc.—do not exist. Persistent lumps or masses in glands, abdomen and soft parts of body. Vague or localized aches and swellings along the long bones of the body, particularly in the upper leg; pain in the joints; "drooping" (rheumatic fever is often suspected in cases of bone tumors). Mysterious but persistent low fever; tendency to bruise easily.

Many types of cancer in children can be halted or cured by surgery and or X-ray treatments, if detected early enough. Encouraging progress is being made by medical science, both in diagnosis and treatment. A major handicap to early detection of malignancies

in children is the popular idea that cancer is strictly an adult's disease. Alertness on the part of parents can in many cases make all the difference between diagnosis in time, and diagnosis that comes too late.
