County youths in the 19-year age bracket may be called up for induction into the growing U. S. arned forces loomed this week as Selective Service Pirector Lewis B. Hershey announced in Washington that he will authorize the drafting of 19-year-olds whenever state draft boards run into man-

So far, officials said, no state selective service chief had reported difficulty in filling his monthly quotas with men 20 and over. But draft officials are uncertain, how much longer they can meet de-mands without dipping into the 19-year-old bracket.

Local boards now are barred by Hershey's order from drafting anyone below 20. The edict was issued last January to prevent some boards from calling 19-year-old registrants while others still had plentiful surplies of older

. Hershey and his aides were uncertain at the time the order was issued last January how long it would stand, and they are still unable to make an official esti-mate on just when 19-year-olds will start getting calls.

Privately, some draft officials think it will be possible to go on filling calls without the 19-year-, olds until sometime next spring.






