One morning he noticed that when his he felt better the next morning. and seemed to have more energy He got to looking around and noti-ced also that the other men who slept in the north-south direction ced also that the other men who slept in the north-south direction seemed to move faster than the time Weatherford in 1939.

This brought to West's mind an experiment which he witnessed one day back in college physics class before the war. In that experiment, the physics professor held a curtain rod in a north-south direction and tilted it to-ward the ground. By litting a few blows on the raised end of the

wagnetized the rod. West wondered if persons also didn't acquire a certain amount of this magnetism when they slept with the magnetic currents that flow north to south. And he won-dered if that didn't affect their




















Blind Man Shows Woodwork Skill




