

Pontiac Price Range Remains At Low Level

Pontiac, first General Motors Division to unveil its 1953 cars, today announced price reductions up to \$100.00 on certain models with no price increases on any models in the line, in spite of an entirely new and larger body, longer wheelbase, completely new interior, and a long list of new mechanical and engineering features.

This announcement was made by R. M. Critchfield, General Manager of Pontiac Motor Division.

The new 1953 models will go on display Saturday. Pontiac list prices for 1953 start at \$1788.56 for the Chieftain Special Six, two-door sedan. Pontiac's DeLuxe Chieftain Eight, four-door sedan, which is expected to account for about 50 per cent of next year's volume, carries a list price of \$2009.51. Price reductions on Station Wagons run from \$28.00 to slightly in excess of \$100.00.

All 1953 Pontiacs will be offered with either a six or eight-cylinder engine with G.M. Hydraulic Drive and Power Steering optional.

LOW DEATH RATE ATTESTS TO NATION'S GOOD HEALTH

America's health was excellent during the first nine months of 1952, experience among the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company's industrial policyholders shows. The death rate during the nine-month period was 6.6 per 1,000 policyholders, which is the same as in the prime health year of 1951.

Only once before, in 1950, was a lower rate—6.4 per 1,000—recorded for the period.

This year's record was achieved, the company's statisticians point out, despite Korean war losses and an unusually high toll of life due to the protracted heat spell last summer. There were almost ten times as many deaths attributed to excessive heat last July and August, as in the entire year of 1951.

One outstandingly favorable aspect of 1952 health has been the decline in tuberculosis mortality. For the nine-month period the

death rate from tuberculosis was 14.6 per 100,000 policyholders, which is a drop of one fifth since last year and of nearly a third in the past two years.

"The continued rapid downward trend of tuberculosis mortality brings into clearer view the day when this disease will be a relatively minor cause of death," the statisticians comment.

The diseases of the heart and circulatory system and cancer, which together account for 70 percent of all deaths, registered approximately the same death rate as in 1951. Diabetes shows a small decrease in mortality.

The death rate from accidents is "moderately" higher this year than last, according to the statisticians, with the increase reflecting a rise in motor vehicle mishaps and in the residual group of "other accidents" to which the majority of accidental deaths of men in military service are as-

The death rate from enemy action in Korea was 2.6 per 100,000 policyholders, substantially lower than the 5.8 per 100,000 rate for the same nine-month period of 1951.
