Cisco Boy Wins With Sheep And Goat Projects

Donald Boyd, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Homer Boyd of Cisco, has been named as the County 4-H Club winner with his sheep and goat projects and is to receive the prize awarded by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association according to information at the County Agent's office in Eastland. The award will be presented to Donald at the annual 4-H Club Rally Day next April it was explained.

Boyd entered in 4-H Club work in Morton Valley, later was a member of the Olden 4-H Club and for the past year was a member of the Cisco Junior High Club. He is now enrolled in FFA work, it was said.

The award in the form of a silver four leaf clover tie clasp with the head of a sheep and goat on two of the leaflets also shows the donors name. The emblem, made in San Angelo, was received from the Secretary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association for presentation to young Boyd.

He has had Angora goats as his projects along with lambs for the past several years. His first exhibit at a show was in 1949. In 1950 he had a first place winner in both, the County Livestock Show at Cisco and the Tri-County Livestock Show at Ranger. In 1951 he had two first place and a grand champion winner in the Tri-County Show.

In 1952 at the County Show at Eastland he had both a first and a second place winners as well as two first place winners at the Tri-County Show.

His brother Danny Boyd has also shown winners with both goats and lambs. Both are the sons of Homer Boyd, prominent sheep and goat rancher, north of Cisco in Eastland County.

Season tickets for all five sessions of play, including Saturday night's final two consolation and championship heats, are on sale at the low rates of \$2 for adults and \$1 for students.

SPRING FOOTBALL TRAINING, SCOUTING ARE APPROVED DURING PIONEER LOOP MEET

The Pioneer Junior College Conference decided during a recent meeting to continue spring football practice and football scouting despite the fact that Schreiner Institute hinted it might be forced to withdraw from the five-member collegiate loop.

Schreiner, one of the oldest names in Texas junior college football circles, has been forced to reduce its athletic budget, W. C. Weir, dean of the school, said.

"We are in hopes these reductions can be made," he declared. "If not, we may not be able to continue to compete against other members of the conference in fairness to our coaches and our athletes."

Weir then called upon the four other members of the conference, holding its winter meeting at Dallas to abolish spring training and scouting. Those members are Arlington State, Tarleton State, San Angelo and Ranger.

Residents of Ranger, Gorman and most all surrounding environs will pay final tribute Friday morning to an Eastland County fighting man who sacrificed his life for his country.

Corporal Jimmie Max Crawley, 23-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Crawley of Ranger, will be laid to rest in peaceful Evergreen Cemetery, Ranger, following civilian and military funeral rites to be solemnized tomorrow morning.

Rev. Garland Lavenier, pastor of the First Methodist Church, Ranger, will officiate during funeral services for Cpl. Crawley, which will be held at the church Friday morning at 10:30 o'clock.

The Ranger unit of the National Guard will be in charge of special military funeral rites to be held at the graveside at Evergreen Cemetery.

Cpl. Crawley, who died on Triangle Hill in Korea on Oct. 15, 1952, was born and reared in Eastland County. Born at Gorman on Oct. 3, 1929, the soldier graduated from Gorman High School in 1947, attended Ranger Junior College for two years, and spent a year and a half as a student at Midwestern University, Wichita Falls, prior to his induction into the U. S. Army on Oct. 8, 1951.

Following his induction into the service at Eastland he received training at Ft. Sill, Okla., and at Ft. Ord, Calif., prior to being shipped overseas with other U. S. combat troops on April 7 of this year.

Cpl. Crawley was a popular student and an outstanding athlete. His career as a high school and college football star was very outstanding.

Funeralbearers at Friday's funeral will be Buddy Hamrick, R. C. Smith, and Meredith-Sides, all of Ranger; Roy Dale Jones, Breckenridge; Lewis Bowington, Quanah; Charles Sullivan, Weatherford; Pen Blitz, For. Worth; and Rudy Randall of Cisco.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Crawley of Ranger; three sisters, Misses Beverly and Dena Crawley, both of the Ranger home address, and Mrs. Bilye Jo Craddock of Sundown; and a maternal grandparent, Mrs. Ben Wood, also of Ranger.

Cpl. Crawley's body arrived in Ranger this afternoon via rail from Oakland, Calif. He remains will be at Killingsworth Funeral Home, until funeral service time tomorrow.

When these people leave the courthouse at noon next Wednesday they are free to head to the tall timber, for they will not have to report back until Monday morning of the following week.

There are a few people who will not be able to enjoy all this happy holiday. For instance, the sheriff and his force, as well as the jail keeper, will remain on duty each day. Peace Justice Boggs will either keep his office open, leave information where he may be found. If we have a quiet, sober Christmas, he may have very little to do, but normally he will be busy accepting pleas of guilty or preparing appearance bonds for those who wish to contest their case.

Eastland Group Visits Husband, Father Overseas

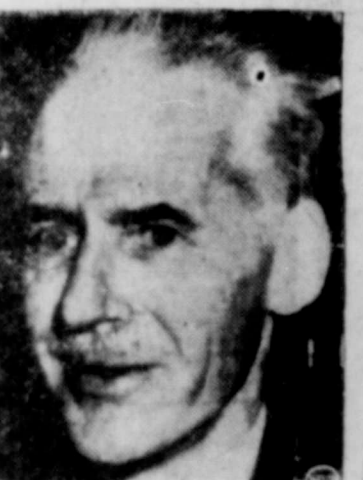

Quail Wings and Research

The Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission in Austin said an increasing degree of hunter cooperation in gathering quail wings is anticipated this fall.

He said this optimism is based on the "good showing" last year when 304 Texas hunters responded to the director's plea and forwarded 11,553 bobwhite wings.

"This idea of getting knee deep in quail wings is not just for fun,"

said the director. "To a wildlife technician with an allergy, that many quail feathers mean a painful lot of sniffles and sneezes."

"The objectives are facts and figures, clues that may lead to better quail hunting. More appropriate seasons and bag limits, in keeping with maximum harvest of surplus birds along with possible emergency adjustments in regulatory regions, are definite possibilities from data so compiled."

Guiding game management practices, the wing study report last season showed that hunters, excepting in South and West Texas, bagged more cock quail than hens, and that young quail comprised 67.2 to 81.1 per cent of the quail

harvested.

Typical intelligence from the wing study concerned the fact that the average of young birds per adult hen in the Panhandle dropped from 14.2 in 1950 to 9.6 in 1951. The figures thus indicated that the Panhandle, with the state's best known quail population last year, would have a smaller number this year. And that is precisely what happened.

The trends disclosed by the wing survey help scientists determine quail seasons in regulatory areas so that at least some of the adult quail would die off may be harvested beforehand.



Choose Turkey With Great Care

When selecting a turkey the following points should be kept in mind: The skin of turkey should be white. Breast must be well developed and firm and the end of breast bone must be flexible, which indicates a young bird. A rigid breast bone is a sure sign of an older bird.

Roasting time of a stuffed turkey, weighing between twelve and sixteen pounds, should be figured at eighteen minutes per pound at

350 degrees F. In other words a fifteen pound turkey should be roasted at above temperature for four and one half hours. It is important that turkey is basted frequently during process of cooking.
