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
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Population Of U. S. May Climb 160,000,000

The population of the United States will pass the 160,000,000 mark before the close of 1953, Metropolitan Life Insurance Com-

pany statisticians predict. Last year's increase was about 2,675,000, bringing the population total by year's end to more than 158,400,000. This gain, a result of the sustained high level of births. low death rate, and a sizable imnigration, establishes a new high mark, exceeding the 1951 increase by a small margin.
