CITY WIDE CLEAN UP CAMPAIGN TO GET UNDER WAY IN DIMMITT FRI.

Probably the best organized City-Wide Clean Up Campaign in the history of Dimmitt will get under way here Friday, when work will be started on the cutting of weeds and removal of all rubbish from the city limits, including junked car bodies and other unsightly objects.

The clean-up campaign will be conducted through the co-supervision of the Dimmitt Lions Club and the City Government. Preliminary arrangements for the campaign are being made by a Lions Club committee composed of Joe Benson, T. A. Singer, Dan Boothe and Elmer Jones. A petition circulated by the committee was signed by practically all of the business firms of the city in an agreement to close up during the last day of the campaign, Tuesday, August 20, in order that everyone may lend a hand in the beautification program.

Attention is called to the fact that the local campaign is in cooperation with a state-wide health movement to clean up cities and towns, in an effort to combat the spread of polio and other communicable diseases.

In announcing plans for the clean up campaign the Lions Club committee declared that the cooperation of other civic and service clubs and the Boy Scout troop was solicited.

Following the completion of the clean up campaign a rat killing drive will be conducted by State rodent control experts.

DR. COX WARNS PUBLIC DANGER OF RABID ANIMALS

With a sharp increase in the number of persons being bitten by rabid animals in East Texas, and other sections of the state, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, recently warned all Texans to be on the alert for symptoms of this disease when around domestic or wild animals.

The 2,166 animal heads received for examination by the State Health Department during the past year have shown 687 positives, including incidence among cats, dogs, horses, rabbits, rats, squirrels, guinea pigs, skunks, coyotes, gophers, raccoons, hogs, sheep, and prairie dogs.

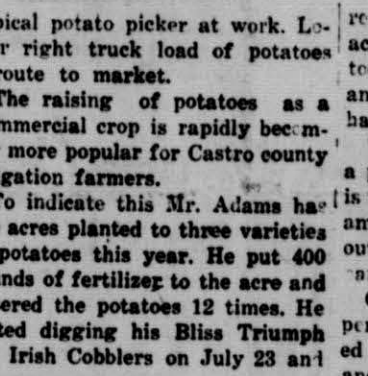
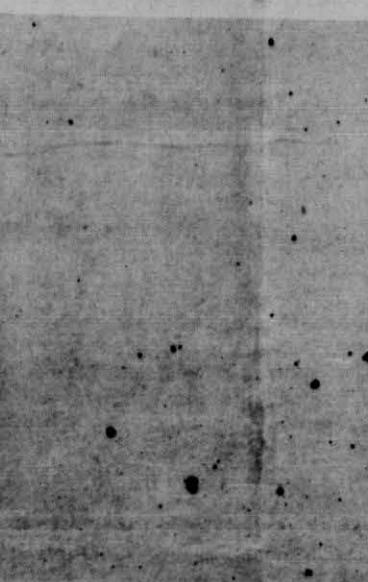
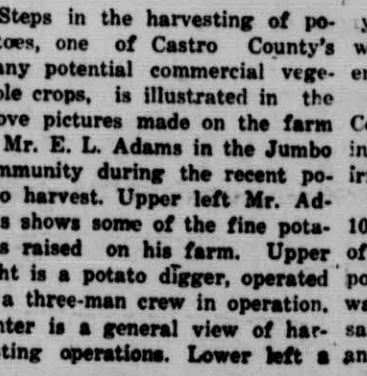
Rabies is transmitted to man through a bite or having a cut exposed to the saliva of a rabid animal. Bites through clothing are not as dangerous as bites on exposed surfaces, because the saliva is wiped off as the tooth passes through the cloth.

If a person is bitten the offending animal should be penned, if possible, for a period of ten days observation. If the animal is normal at the end of that time, the case can be dismissed. If it is necessary to kill the animal, this should be done in such a manner that the brain is not destroyed, otherwise, an examination to determine whether or not the animal had rabies will be impossible. If the head is sent to the State Health Department, care should be used in properly icing it to prevent decomposition.

RAT KILLING PROGRAM TO FOLLOW CLEAN UP CAMPAIGN

Washington News Letter

By Congressman Eugene Worley

Late in June Congress passed a Resolution providing for official representatives of that body to participate along with representatives of other nations of the world in ceremonies attending the independence of the Philippine Islands. Pursuant to that Resolution, an official Committee, including myself, was appointed to represent the Congress of the United States.

In the belief the more you and I can know as to what goes on in other parts of the world the more intelligent action we can take, I am preparing a series of weekly reports covering this trip which I hope you as a reader of this newspaper and as an American citizen who has a tremendous stake in our relations with foreign countries will find informative. If these reports appear in your newspaper, it is through the kindness and cooperation of your editor.

I might say in the beginning that while all of the trip was most interesting and informative, the highlights were the Bikini Atomic Bomb explosion, the ceremonies attending the granting of independence to the Philippines, conferences with General Marshall in China, General MacArthur in Japan and other military and State Department officials.

The Committee traveled between twenty and twenty five thousand miles in a period of two weeks. More time of course would have been desirable but the press of legislative duties in Washington demanded our early return. All of this travel was done by air.

The Congressional Delegation left Washington late on June 25 flying over night to the West Coast, a distance of approximately 2400 miles. After conferring with State Department and military officials in San Francisco, we left the Coast about ten o'clock the following night by a C-54 plane. From San Francisco to Hickam Field, Honolulu, is approximately 2400 miles, which was made in about twelve hours. Since there were only four bunks aboard the plane and since the House Members felt the Senators were entitled to consideration mainly on account of their age, most of us slept sitting up, on the floor, or anywhere we could.

We arrived at Hickam Field the next morning which is the same field the Japs virtually ripped apart on that black day of December 7, 1941, but today practically all evidence of their attack has disappeared. Again there were conferences with State Department and War and Navy officials and local citizens interested in statehood.

Quite a change had come over the Island since I was stationed there in 1942. At that time, a strict curfew was in order, military law reigned supreme, glass windows were taped with adhesive for fear of breakage from bomb concussion, all Japanese, which represents a considerable portion of the Hawaiian population, were off the streets before dark, no one was allowed on the streets after ten o'clock without a pass, and the black out was strictly enforced. All of these precautions were taken because an attack and invasion was expected to be launched by the enemy at any time. These expectations were confirmed when the Japanese sent the mightiest naval armada they had ever launched to take Midway, but were they were successfully turned back with heavy losses.

But now the Hawaiian Islands are back to normal and most people there are clamoring for admission as the 49th State of the Union, which proposition is now under consideration in Congress.

Pearl Harbor itself presents quite a different picture from the first time I saw it. At that time our ships were still sunk and desperate efforts were being made to raise them and get them back into operation because they were sorely needed. Just a short distance from the submarine base is a neat and well kept American cemetery where lie the bodies of nearly all men who were killed when the Japs attacked that fateful Sunday.

FREEZING DAIRY PRODUCTS PROVES SUCCESSFUL

Butter, cream and some kind of cheese may be preserved successfully in a home freezer unit if a few precautions are taken, says O. W. Jones, Specialist of food preservation for the A. and M. Extension Service.

Butter to be frozen should be made from pasteurized milk or cream. If the milk has not been pasteurized the butter gets rancid or acquires off flavor in three months. In pasteurizing milk, avoid containers and equipment which are made of copper or iron. Pasteurize the cream at 175 degrees F. for 30 minutes. Stir well.

Prepare and season butter as for eating. Although some authorities say unsalted butter keeps fresh longer than salted butter, Miss Jones says salt will not cause it to get old if the butter is of high quality and is kept only three or six months. Pack in half pound or one pound rectangular molds, wrap in cellophane paper, and package tightly in waxed cartons, clean, dry, plain tin cans. Avoid leaving air space or excess water in the package.

TASTY PEACH RECIPES
(By Leila Petty, County Home Demonstration Agent.)
Peach Crisps: Place sliced peaches in a buttered baking dish. Cover with 1/2 cup corn syrup. Mix one cup sifted flour, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup butter, and 1/2 cup corn syrup together and spread over second layer of peaches. Bake in moderate oven for 45 minutes.

Peach Preserves: 3 cups white corn syrup, 1/2 cup sugar, 6 cups sliced peaches. Boil syrup and sugar together for a few minutes, add sliced peaches slowly so as to keep syrup boiling rapidly. Cook rapidly until the fruit is tender and clear and syrup is thick. Fill hot sterilized jars, seal, and store in a cool dark place.

CANNING WITH WHITE CORN SYRUP

If a small amount of sugar and corn syrup is available, use one of these three preparations:

1. 1/2 cup sugar to 1 cup water or juice.
2. 1/4 to 3/4 cup corn syrup to 1 cup water or juice.
3. 1/2 cup sugar and 1 cup white corn syrup to 3 cups water. One cup of the syrup made usually covers one quart of well packed fruit.

INVENT SUGAR

Mix 2 cups sugar and 1 cup water. Add 1/4 teaspoon tartaric acid, obtained at any drug store. Cover this sugar, water, and tartaric acid mixture and simmer gently for 3 minutes. Allow it to cool. The invent sugar made this way is nearly twice as sweet as plain syrup of the same weight. For a thin syrup, use 1/2 cup of invent sugar to 1 cup water. This is also good for sweetening fruits, cereals like cream and beverages.
