Good Start for a Good Day



The average American family shown above is illustrating how to avoid tangled nerves, lowered efficiency, lack of energy and dull wits.

They are doing it simply enough by eating a good breakfast. For, according to nutrition experts, all these symptoms can result if you skip or skimp breakfast.

Speaking to his board of governors, Curtis H. Scott, of Louisville, Ky., chairman of the American Bakers Association, recently related numerous findings on what happens when you start omitting the first meal of the day, or cutting it down to a minimum.

Studies have shown that people who omit breakfast lose efficiency around mid-morning. They make more mistakes in their work, slow up generally. Children show less response in school than do those who eat a complete breakfast.

Scott figured that a loss of ten minutes per day per person as a result of poor breakfast habits can account for 43,000 lost man hours per year in a company employing 1,000 persons, as one ex-

ample of what can happen if breakfast habits are bad.

He quoted from a number of eminent authorities who emphasize that the human body cannot stay efficient if it does not receive food between the evening meal and lunch the next day.

He related a report from Dr. E. V. McCollum of John Hopkins University who notes that bodily stores are reduced during the night and if they are not replenished by adequate breakfast, weakness, irritability and reduced stamina result.

And what is a good breakfast? Nutritionists list fruit or juice, cereal, eggs and breakfast meat, toast and your usual morning beverage with milk preferred.

That kind of a breakfast provides a suitable proportion of the body's requirements for the day ahead in protein, calories, calcium, vitamins and minerals and other elements.

It makes a good start for a good day and can be a strong factor in building a healthier people for a healthier nation, the baking industry leader comments.

Gay Dooryard Gardens From Seed of Low Annuals



Differing from parterre planting of the nineties, modern dooryard gardens emphasize beauty of the flowers, and not a pattern.

Low growing flowers which produce sheets of color can be used effectively in dooryard gardens, especially in the front yards of modern one-story homes. The simple lines and absence of ornamentation in the house design find a pleasing echo in simple floral plantings which depend for their effect on color masses rather than intricate designs.

When front yard flowers were formerly in fashion, in the nineties, flowers were used to work out elaborate designs of geometric shapes. This was an ancient fashion, dating back to the middle ages, known as parterre work. The beauty of the parterre was in its pattern, with the flowers used only to supply the color which developed it. Few examples of this method are now seen in this country.

Modern dooryard gardens are as simple as possible in design, in order to center attention upon the beauty of the flowers. These are grouped in masses of one color, so arranged that each mass harmonizes with and sets off the others. Annual flowers of low, compact growth will flower

without ceasing until freezing weather, even in the northern states, and are easily grown from seed, when started early under protection, or in the garden itself as soon as the weather permits. The garden illustrated is a simple arrangement of border plantings for a small house where the walk leads from the private driveway to the front door. Both house and lot will be made to seem larger by this arrangement. Bright red, or pink salvias, and clear, vivid red, pink, blue and buff verbenas will provide a brilliant decoration for the house.

Both salvia and verbenas are slow growing, and seed should be started early in a hot-bed or greenhouse, so that plants of good size can be set out as soon as danger of frost is over. If seed is sown directly in the garden, flowers may be delayed two or three weeks. Sweet alyssum, however, will grow quickly from seed and either a dwarf white variety, or the dark purple Violet Queen Alyssum may be used. If the plants are sheared when they grow too tall, flowers will be increased, and a low growing border constantly maintained.

Planting Quality Seed is Cheap Crop Insurance

Certified seed may cost slightly more than other seed but the added expense gives assurance of purity, higher germination and better yields at harvest time. Seed of questionable purity and germination may not be cheap at any price, says L. C. Coffey, associate agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

He points out that certified seed is usually the best seed of a particular variety available. These seeds come from fields that have been inspected during the growing season, have been properly handled at harvest time, cleaned, tested for purity and germination and properly stored. is insurance for the farmer. The blue tags attached to each sack of certified seed carry information that should be of interest to the buyer. The State Department of Agriculture issues the tags for use on seed that have met certain high standards of purity and germination.

Coffey suggests that farmers purchase now the seed they will use for planting this year's crops. Supplies generally are adequate, but last minute shoppers may find local stocks depleted and thus forced to plant whatever seed are available.

Finally, says Coffey, if the planting seed have not been chemically treated for controlling seed-borne and seedling diseases, farmers will find this practice profitable and more cheap insurance against poor stands and plant losses during the very early plant growth period. Local county agents can supply information on seed treating and variety recommendations.

Washington Is Settling Down, Says Bureson

The excitement of the President's inauguration has subsided, and it is hoped that the Congress can now get down to business. Committees are organized and all committee assignments of members of Congress have been completed.

Fortunately for me, I have retained membership on two committees on which I've been serving. It

would have been entirely reasonable that I would have been dropped from one or the other of the committees when the Republicans took over.

The Foreign Affairs Committee of the House of Representatives, of which I am a member, is composed of 29 members—16 Republicans and 13 Democrats. The committee on House Administration, on which I've served since 1947, is composed of 25 members, and I'm in my fortune to stand at the top in seniority on the Democratic side. This is made possible by the resignation from Congress of Thomas B. Stanley, of Virginia, who is a candidate for Governor of that state. Virginia elects their govern-

Seeds Need Help in Their Struggle to Reach Surface

Experiments with soil conditions accent the importance of the top one-inch of garden soils. They are proving that for crops grown from seed, the soil texture on the surface is more important than any other section. The seed is dropped in this top layer, and before your garden begins to grow, it must overcome the hazards that beset garden seeds: to send a sprout through the soil covering to reach the fresh air and sunshine above.

This is called "emergence" and may involve a serious struggle by the seed against numerous threats to its development. Tender seeds may be frozen, if planted too early in the spring. Even hardy seeds, when planted in cold damp soil, may lie so long without germinating that fungous diseases or moulds attack and destroy them. Any seed or sprout may drown, if water covers the surface too long, depriving it of air.

The greatest hazard of all results from soil crusting on the surface or compacting too solidly around the seed, so that when germination does occur the infant plant cannot break through to the life giving sunshine above.

Veteran gardeners as well as beginners may sow seed and fail, as they say, to "get a catch." Or in a row which shows a fair stand of seedlings there may be spaces where nothing came up, thanks to one of the perils to which seed succumb.

The remedy to compaction, or crusting of the surface, is easy for the amateur to handle. He can mix a special porous soil to use in covering his seed. This may not be necessary if the garden soil is sandy, and rich in organic matter, so that water and air can easily penetrate and the surface does not crust. Gardeners who have such soil rarely fail "to get a catch" when they sow; and if they do fail, it is likely to be from careless or incorrect technique, such as sowing too deeply, firming too hard, or neglecting to water the garden when rains fail in the critical germination period.

For those with heavy soil a seed covering mixture should contain at least one-half sand, with an equal amount of organic matter such as peat moss, compost, well decayed manure, sewage sludge, or black peat from local sources. Most potting soils sold in packages are chiefly black peat. Avoid using poultry manures or others rich in nitrogen, as too much of this chemical affects the germination of many seeds.

Use of a chemical soil conditioner to make the surface soil porous and prevent crusting has been proved effective in experiments. For larger areas, where a special covering soil is impractical, it should improve emergence. It lacks the water holding quality of a good sand and organic mixture, however, and the latter is superior where it can be provided.

A good start usually means a vigorous plant, and failure to "get a catch" requires resowing, with loss of seed and what may be worse, delay. You never know what weather conditions may develop to hinder seed "emergence," so it pays well to take all needed precautions to help your seed through the soil.

China is having some internal difficulties. The present purges are proof that all is not well. If Stalin's position becomes insecure, it will probably mean he will be more reasonable in his dealings with the United States. The purges reveal the basic weaknesses of a nation held together by fear. Equally important in the world picture is the questioning of Moscow's authority outside Russia. All this is encouraging from our standpoint.



On the home scene, Mr. Truman's attempt to dedicate Tidelands oil to the Navy by executive order has drawn the most interest. It was one of his last official acts.

There are mixed opinions as to the effect of Mr. Truman's action. It was an attempt to bolster the federal government's position and my belief is that it was intended to prejudice the issue by calling it an act in behalf of national defense. Personally, I think his order will have little effect, and in fact it could conceivably be an advantage in one respect. It could hasten Congressional action on Tidelands legislation, which several of us have introduced in Congress. We hope of course this will be the case. We feel we have an excellent opportunity to pass the measure passed in the last Congress and that it will not be vetoed by President Eisenhower.

Senator Johnson Interested in Flood Control

Senator Lyndon B. Johnson has introduced a bill which would authorize direct local-Federal cooperation on flood prevention programs in small, upstream watershed areas.

The measure is sponsored in the House of Representatives by Representative W. R. Poage. An identical bill passed the House during the last Congress but failed of passage in the Senate.

Under the terms of the bill, the Agriculture Department would be authorized to assist local agencies in land treatment and flood prevention programs in watershed areas. The local agencies must take not exceeding 250,000 acres in the initiative in proposing programs.

Once the Secretary of Agriculture has approved a program, it will be submitted to appropriate Committees of Congress. If they do not disapprove within 60 days

—or if they grant affirmative approval—actual work can get underway as soon as funds are available.

The text of Senator Johnson's statement in the Senate:

Among the most pressing of the problems that face our people is that of controlling the water resources of our country.

In Texas—as in so many other states—water is all too frequently a feast or famine proposition. In times of flood, water falls upon our land by the ton, washing away precious topsoil and smashing property and equipment. In times of drought, we turn to our reservoirs only to find that they are
