He expressed great confidence in President Dwight Eisenhower and said that he believed that the U. S. leader had a "workable glan" to end the conflict- and that the plan was in effect and was "working."

The war, he said, will be brougto to a close by the Russians. 'Russia has grabbed more territory and more people in its Communist expansion than any nation in all the history of the world ce the days of the mighty Genghis Khan," the foreign correspon-dent said. "Experts feel certain that the Russians were confident that the Korean campaign, started in the summer of 1950, would end a week or 10 days. Instead it has turned out to be one of the greatest stalemates in all history. 'Our stopping Communist aggression in Korea was a victory and is a victory," Thomas said. ### F1 Hybrid Flowers Give **Bountiful Yield of Beauty**



Every seed hearing flower must be pollinated by hand to produce F1 hybrid seed.
