The Senate passed without objection Wednesday two bills designed to close loopholes in the law barring interstate transportalaw barring interstate transportation of obscene books, pictures or

One bill would broaden the present definition of banned material to make it apply to anything that to be one or filthy.

The other would prohibit the interstation transportation of such materials by private conveyances, az well as by mail or common carrier, for sale or distribution.


