## Nice Weather Is Forecast For Weekend Period

A very pleasant weekend was in store for Eastland County residents, according to the Saturday morning forecast of the U. S. Weather Bureau.

Bright, fair and sunny skies were due Saturday and Sunday with afternoon high temperatures both days due to be registered in the high 70s.

Saturday night's low was scheduled for the 40s.

## LIVING COST SHOWS DROP

Good news came to Eastland County and all Americans on the nation's capital Friday.

The government in Washington reported that living costs dropped two-tenths of one per cent between mid-December and mid-January.

The decline, mainly due to lower retail prices for food and clothing, was reflected in a new consumer price index put out for the first time Friday by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The new index is designed to reflect consumer price changes more accurately than did the one used previously. It prices more items, covers more cities and brings the calculations up to date on new consumer buying habits.

The new index for mid-January figures always are a month or so late because of time required to be 113.9. Government living cost compile them.

The figure means that in mid-January living costs were 13.9 per cent above the average for the 1947-1949 period, which is used as the index base. It is 0.7 per cent above a year ago.

Many labor unions had contracts under which wage rates were to be adjusted upward or downward according to changes in the old index.

A spokesman for General Motors Corporation said the new living cost figures indicated a one-cent-per-hour decrease in wages for about a half million of its employees.

# RJC Tracksters Start Workouts Next Monday

## RJC '53 Ranch Day Is Rated As Big Success

Ranger Junior College's track and field squad will begin pre-competition workouts Monday afternoon, Coach Dick Henderson said today.

The Purple & White thin-clads will prep for coming meets with other Pioneer Conference track and field aggregations and also will be ready for entrance in two other important competitions—the Southwest Recreational Track & Field Meet at Fort Worth on March 6-7 and the triangular meet (Tarleton State, Cisco and Ranger Junior Colleges) at Stephenville on March 26.

Coach Henderson's 1953 cinder squad will be built around two veteran campaigners of the '52 season—William L. Hart, distance ace from Aspermont, and Rusty Talbot, Electric speedster.

Other track and field candidates to report for the initial workout Monday afternoon are Jerry Harvey of Woodson, Don Cook of Graham, Johnny Wilson of Quanah, Joe Nesbitt of Harold, Tommy Nix of Graham and Freddy Sanders of Fort Worth.

The Harrold flash, according to pre-running ratings, is the speediest of current breeders—Nesbitt, a dash artist with lot of pepulsion, has been officially clocked at 18 seconds flat in the 100-yard distance. On an unofficial heat, it is said that the Harrold speedster has covered the length in 9.9 seconds.

Johnny Wilson of Quanah also looms as a very promising member of the '53 squad. He ran the mile in 4:41 last year to win the regional championship in that event for Quanah High.

Hart and Wilson will do the distance heats for the Purple & White this season, with Talbot, Nesbitt, Nix and Sanders handling the dash sprints. Woodson's Jerry Harvey specializes in the high jump, and Don Cook of Graham will run the hurdles and compete in the pole vault events.

## Breck Man Is Charged With Arms Violation

Bond for Gene Loving, 28-year-old Breckenridge man charged in U. S. District Court with violation of the federal firearms act, was set at \$500 by U. S. Commissioner Gladys Walls at a hearing in Abilene Friday afternoon.

Loving was arrested in Breckenridge earlier Friday by Deputy U. S. Marshal Eugene Williams.

The complaint charged that Loving transferred an illegal firearm without paying tax, was possessor of an unregistered firearm, and was possessor of a firearm on which transfer tax had not been paid.

It was filed by Donald S. Chadsey of the Alcohol and Tobacco Tax Division, Wichita Falls.

## Retail Business Brisk In Texas

Texas' retail business activity continued brisk last month, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported Saturday.

January sales dropped 18 per cent under December's Christmas rush but gained 13 per cent over January a year ago.

Durable goods continued their recent uptrend with an 18 per cent jump from last year. Nondurables gained 9 per cent.

## Buy Car License Now; Avoid Rush Says Collector

Car license plates seem to be a "drag on the market" this year, for only a very few people have availed themselves of an opportunity to buy. To date, according to Tax Collector Stanley Webb, of Eastland, only about 1,000 people have purchased 1953 plates, while last year more than 12,000 plates were sold to car, truck and trailer owners.

The deadline is April 1st, but if you postpone your purchases you may expect to stand in line for a few hours while those ahead of you are taken care of. Buy your car license now.

# Jail Breaker May Be Hiding In County Area

The "mysterious man" who appeared near Oiden at dusk Thursday and was the object of a search by State Highway Patrolmen, and county and city officers of Ranger and Eastland following a telephone alarm from a farm woman may have been one of the escapees still at large from the sensational mass jail break in Fort Worth 11 days ago, W. G. Pounds, chief of the Ranger Police Department, said in Ranger Friday night.

Many persons, including some officers, had thought that the man, who had been hiding in a barn on a farm four miles south of Oiden, was the 30-year-old ex-convict who is wanted in the knife holdups at a tavern near Breckenridge Monday. However, the knife bandit has not been in this vicinity recently,

Chief Pounds disclosed, stating that he had a letter, written by the 30-year-old ex-convict to his wife in Ranger, which was mailed several days ago from Denver, Colo.

Still at large from the Fort Worth break are Floyd Hill, formerly Alcatraz inmate, and two Fort Worthians charged with rape—Michael Kenneth Davis, 19, and Glenn C. Crawford, 22.

Last week one of the fugitives was believed to have arrived in the Ranger area about 11 a. m. Thursday, the morning following the big break of ten prisoners from the Tarrant County jail in Fort Worth.

The driver of an automobile transport, loaded with four brand new cars, stopped at the Ranger Hill Cafe on U. S. Highway 80 east

of Ranger Thursday about 11 a. m. and was surprised when a man, unshaven and in muddy, wrinkled clothing, suddenly leaped from one of the vehicles on the transport and fled.

Officers were notified immediately and launched a long and intensive search, scouring the hilly and brush-covered area in the vicinity but found no further trace of the man.

The driver of the transport said he had passed through Fort Worth early Thursday morning—a few hours after the Tarrant County jail break—and that he had stopped at a cafe between Fort Worth and Weatherford prior to the stop at the Ranger Hill Cafe.

It is possible, officers say, that an escapee climbed into one of

the new cars on the transport in Fort Worth—or that he did so when the big vehicle made the stop between Fort Worth and Weatherford.

It also is possible, officers say, that this same man is the one reported seen on the farm near Oiden late Thursday. The farm woman, who discovered the man in her barn, screamed and ran. The man, she told officers, followed a short distance, pleading with her not to get excited, that he "just wanted something to eat." A few seconds later, panicked, he turned and fled.

Floyd Hill is not believed in this area, according to reports from state and federal authorities who are still seeking his whereabouts.

However, the two young breakers charged with rape also remain missing.

In Fort Worth, the 29-year-old Los Angeles woman, victim of a sex attack by those two fugitives and Howard Higham Davis, 29, uncle of one of the escapees, was disappeared.

The Star - Telegram learned Friday that the victim has left Dallas tourist court, where she has been staying for almost a week to return to her home on the West Coast.

A woman friend of the victim, a resident of the same court, said the woman became terrified when she learned two of the attackers had escaped the county jail and still are at large.

The friend said the victim feared for her life and decided "to get as far away as she could." She had been ordered to appear before the grand jury last Tuesday but failed to show up.

At that time the jury considered rape charges against Howard Higham Davis, 29, one-armed police character; his nephew, Michael Kenneth Davis, 19, 1609 E. Tuckers, and Glen C. Crawford, 22, 2016 Burchill Rd., Fort Worth.

The woman had previously identified the trio as the same men who ordered her at knife point from a Manfield Highway tavern Feb. 16, took her in a car to Cobb Park, beat and criminally attacked her and forced her into unnatural sex acts.

The men were caught later at a police road block, set up to check driver licenses.

The district attorney's office said it was concerned about the woman's disappearance but her absence did not prevent grand jury indictments.

The jury is not bound by rules of evidence and can return true bills if the complaining witness is not present.

Assistant District Attorney Grady Owen said he hoped the victim would contact the office when she believes it safe to appear.

Davis and Crawford escaped county jail Feb. 18 with eight other prisoners. They remain free along with Floyd Hill, former Alcatraz inmate.

## Paving Of Road To Scranton Is Due Very Soon

Paving work on the new farm-market road for the Scranton community southwest of Cisco is expected to begin in the near future, it was announced today. Bids for the paving work were opened last week by the State Highway Department in Austin.

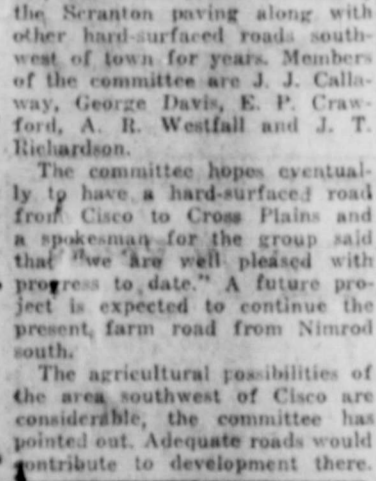
A. L. Bucy, Brownwood contractor, was low bidder for the contract. His bid was \$37,932 on the project, which called for 4.7 miles of grading, structures, base and surfacing work. The new road, Farm Road 1864, will extend from Farm Road 569 seven miles southwest of Cisco west through Scranton to the county line.

Farm Road 569 extends from Cisco to Nimrod.

The Cisco Chamber of Commerce, through its highway committee, has been active in seeking the Scranton paving along with other hard-surfaced roads southwest of town for years. Members of the committee are J. J. Callaway, George Davis, E. P. Crawford, A. R. Westfall and J. T. Richardson.

The committee hopes eventually to have a hard-surfaced road from Cisco to Cross Plains and a spokesman for the group said that "we are well pleased with progress to date." A future project is expected to continue the present farm road from Nimrod south.

The agricultural possibilities of the area southwest of Cisco are considerable, the committee has pointed out. Adequate roads would contribute to development there.

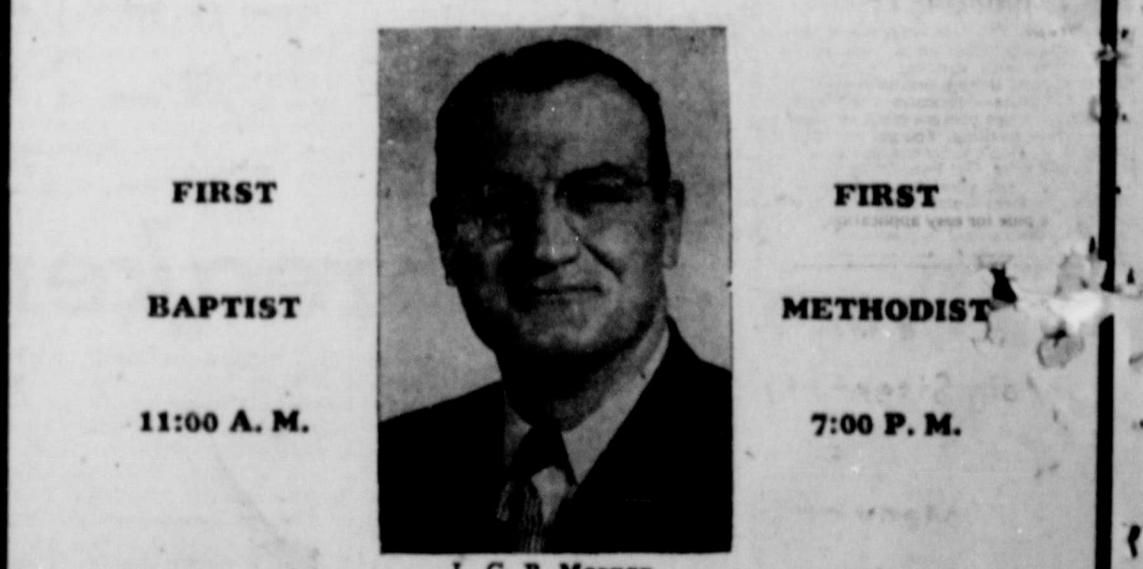
