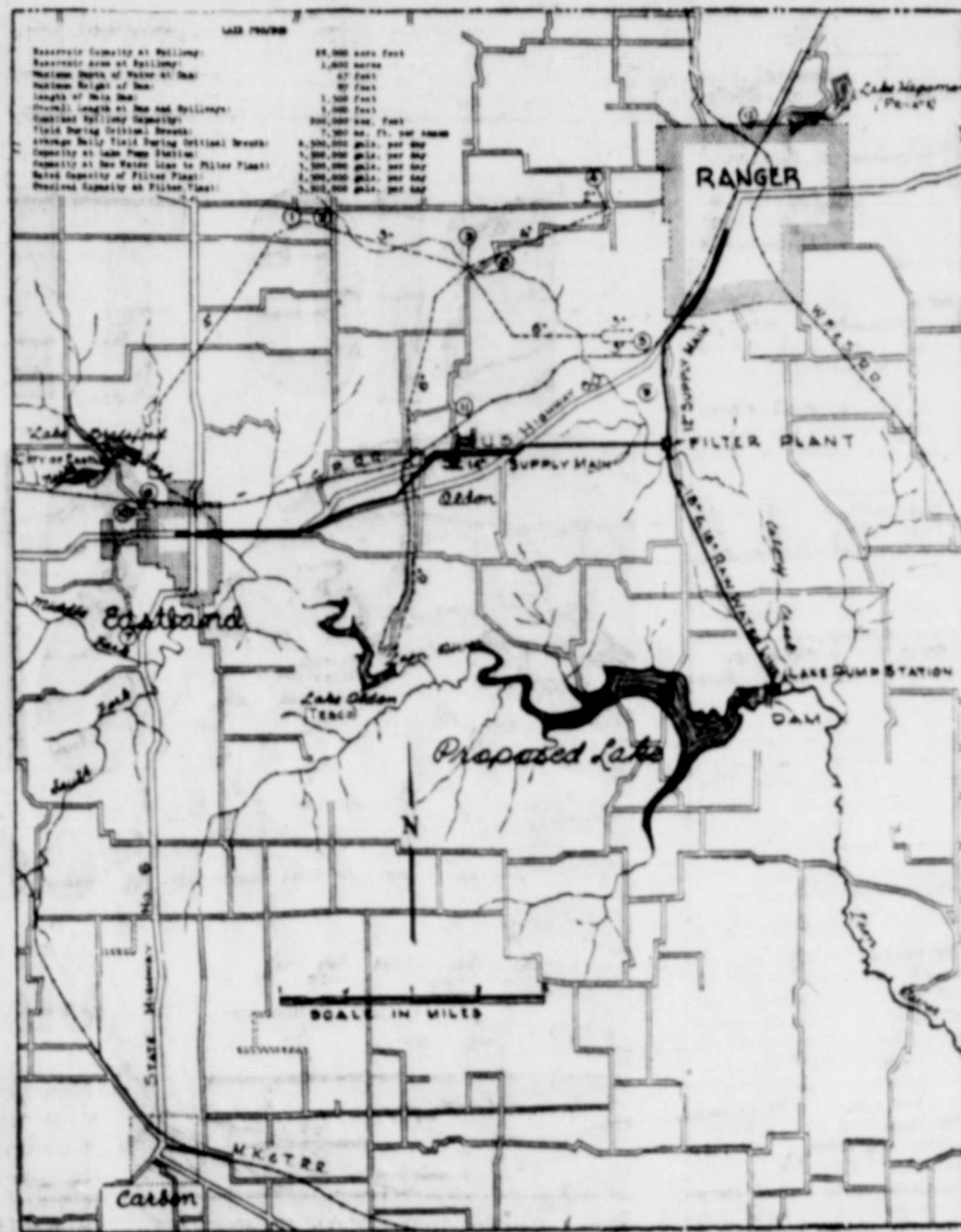

One of Ranger's pioneer merchandisers, D. Joseph, owner of Joseph's Dry Goods, is planning to retire with a few weeks. Joseph, 67, who began his successful career of more than a half century of retail merchandising as a foot-peddler in young manhood, is staging a big "Going Out of Business Sale" beginning next Wednesday morning. Purpose of the sale event, one of the largest and most drastic in Joseph's long career, is to trim the stock of Ranger's largest department store. Following the sale the store will be sold to a new owner. Or—it will be turned over to a new manager. Joseph himself is definitely going to retire. The popular merchant who founded the dry goods firm here in January, 1919, when he purchased the store of C. I. Williams with a partner, graduated from a foot-peddler to a store owner in Walnut Ridge, Ark.

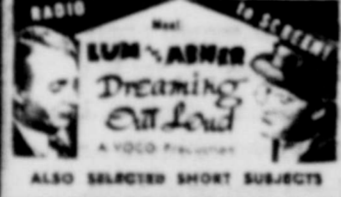

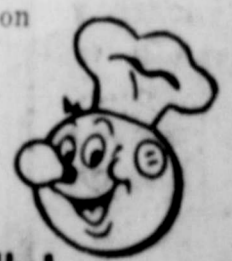
