Should these rendering plants lose, he is faced with an unpleasant task to perform. In the past, he has been able to have his dead stock removed free-of-charge by a ing service he would have to either bury or burn the carcass himself within 24 hours of the animal's death, as required by most

Fortunately, the farmers in this ea can still rely on Central Hide Rendering Company. However, this company also is feeling the pinch, as evidenced by this recent nnouncement by Mr. Frank Bass, Vice-President and Abilene Plant Manager.

"It has been necessary for Central Hide & Rendering Co. to cut expenses because of the depressed market in hides and non-edible grease. In order to do this, the ollowing changes in policy are be-

1. There will be a nominal fee for each trip to the farm for dead

2. We will not be able to accept COLLECT telephone calls regarding animals. (This call will cost you .37c or less and if accepted by Central Hide & Rendering ompany, it costs us .74c.)

It would seem that the considerable time and labor saved by the farmer in having the rendering plant handle his dead stock will more than make up for the small expense to him for this service


