The Cisco Indians cashed in a walk, a pair of singles and a slam-bang three-bagger here Monday night for a 3 to 2 victory over Manager J. A. Estes and his Ranger Eagles.

The Ciscoans did all their scoring in the top of the first inning. From then on, however, Jack Allen, Ranger righthander and curve artist, kept the door closed tight and the visitors went scoreless for the remaining six innings. Allen fanned 12 Cisco batters, gave up four bases on balls, one of them a deliberate pass, and allowed but five hits during his 7-inning mound stint.

Greenhaw, pitching for the Ciscoans, struck out 10, yielded two bases on balls and also allowed but five hits. He also went all the way for the Indians.

Sister Ranger Woman Killed In Auto Crash

The body of Mrs. Naomi McDonald, 43-year-old auto accident victim and sister of Mrs. Lessie Jones Sanders of Ranger, is being flown from Alaska to Texas for burial this week.

Funeral services at Austin are pending arrival of her remains via a cargo plane.

Mrs. McDonald, the former Miss Naomi Straue, was killed last Thursday near Valdez, Alaska, when the automobile in which she was riding plunged down a 35-foot embankment following failure of brakes. Two other occupants of the car, both women, also were killed in the crash. Another woman was critically injured and Mrs. McDonald's son, Bobby George, 14, is being treated in a Fairbanks, Alaska, hospital for broken legs and head injuries.

The father of the youth and husband of the crash victim has arrived in Austin by plane.

The McDonalds moved to Alaska from the United States two years ago. They have been residing in Fairbanks where Mr. McDonald is a building contractor. Only recently they had been visiting back in the States and during their trip they stopped by Ranger and enjoyed a sojourn in the home of her sister, Mrs. Sanders.

Mrs. McDonald was born at Edna, Tex., on January 29, 1910 and had lived in Texas continuously until moving to Alaska.

Survivors include the husband and son of Fairbanks, Alaska; her mother, Mrs. Anne Straue of Houston; two brothers, Dewey Straue of Edna and Schley Straue of Victoria; and three sisters, Mrs. Mary Header of Edna, Mrs. William Traylor of Austin and Mrs. Jones of Ranger.

Population Once 30,000—1,500 ATTEND DESDEMONA OIL CELEBRATION SATURDAY; BIG BOOM IS RECALLED

Desdemona oldtimers, 1500 strong, Saturday celebrated the 35th anniversary of the discovery of oil at "Hog Town" when the Joe Duke well blew in a flame of fire.

After the blaze was quenched, the well produced 4,000 barrels of crude oil daily.

Fifty other immense wells followed and overnight Desdemona jumped its population from about 350 to an estimated 30,000.

A program was presented, old-time hymns sung, a big picnic dinner spread in the 40-year-old tabernacle, and business was transacted in the afternoon according to Hamilton Wright of the Abilene Reporter-News.

The celebration was climaxed Saturday night with music by the Eastland Quartet, Desdemona String Band, and Gainesville Rhythmites of Stephenville.

At the afternoon session Zolie Koonce was elected president, Sam Powers, vice president; and Mrs. Eva Abernathy Sparkman, secretary-treasurer. They succeeded Dove Lewis, president; Polly Brooks secretary-treasurer; and Zolie Koonce, program chairman.

Mrs. Pearl Powers Duncan was master of ceremonies. Her childhood spent in Desdemona enabled her to call almost everybody by their first names. Congregational singing was led by Dove Lewis, invocation by the Rev. Rupert Coles, Methodist pastor; welcome address by Sam Powers; and response by R. E. Murray, new Desdemona school superintendent.

Miss Essel Carruth, working for an oil corporation in Arabia, came the longest distance to the reunion. Others were from Pennsylvania, Houston, Kermit, Harlingen, Orange, Mesquite, Odessa, Kerrville, Lamesa, Midland, Levelland, Amarillo, Robinson, Denison, Fort Worth and many other distant points.

Bible verses presented to the oldest man and oldest woman attending. The man was West Tollet, Ranger, 81; and the oldest woman, Mrs. S. E. Browning, 88, Ranger. Presentation was made by Loraine Koonce.

Tom Northeuth who has been a bed patient for 17 months has developed pneumonia.

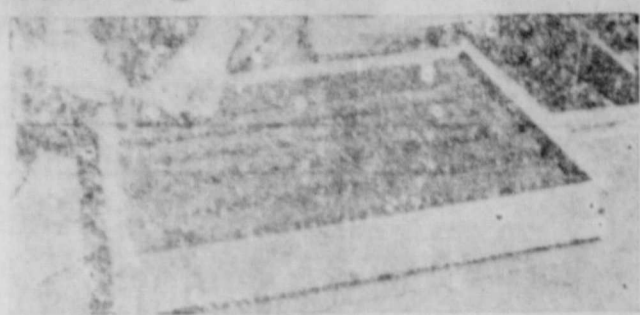

Use These Techniques in Starting Seeds Indoors



Seedling tray compartments are shallow drills two inches apart.

There are advantages to starting seeds in flats. First, they are easy to handle and can be moved to a warm place to germinate. They can be started in a shallow tray, and the seedlings can be transplanted into pots or flats when they are ready.

The chief rule comes when the seedlings are ready to transplant. They should be handled carefully, and the soil should be kept moist. It is best to transplant them into pots or flats when they are about two inches high.

When the young plants are growing a lower temperature is preferable, with full daylight. If the light is inadequate the seedlings will bend toward it. This may be corrected by turning the box daily, or by placing a white cardboard or mirror behind the flat to reflect the light.

Inadequate light may be corrected by electric light from a tungsten or fluorescent lamp added to the daylight. The light of a 40 watt bulb will usually be sufficient, if burned several hours a day. Avoid raising the temperature unduly by keeping a tungsten light too close.

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Do not sow seeds in flats too deeply or thickly. Cover them lightly with finely sifted soil, sand, or sphagnum moss. A layer of sphagnum moss half an inch thick on top of the soil, in which seed is sown, will prevent damping off, a fungus which may destroy seedlings even before

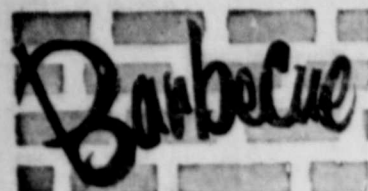

dition of another name. Citizens then named it Desdemona in honor of Desdemona Wynn the attractive daughter of a Hog Town blacksmith. But during the boom days most people hereabouts referred to the town and oil field as Hogtown and Hogtown field.

"Immediately after the boom started here," Jones reminisced, "a visitor late at evening might see wagons unloading lumber on the side of the road. The next morning he would see a new house there with a family occupying it. That was the hurry and bustle of 1918."

Hundreds who worked here during the boom scattered to the four winds but return annually to renew friendships, to reminisce and to see their old haunts.
