WF&S RAIL HEARING SET FOR NOV. 2

The Commerce Commission will hold a public hearing in Breckenridge Nov. 2 on the petition Wichita Falls & Southern Railroad to abandon its 176-mile freight line.

At the same time, the ICC will consider the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific's request for permission to buy the 162-mile segment of the road from Wichita Falls to Breckenridge.

According to prior announced plans, the line from Breckenridge to Ranger and on to Dublin will be abandoned. The railroad has been serving Eastland County for over a third of a century. M. J. Winger is Ranger agent for the WF&S.

The Wichita Falls & Southern was bought May 8 for \$825,000 from the Frank Kell Estate by the Texas Investment Corp. of Austin. The corporation applied May 22 for permission to abandon the line.

The Rock Island filed its petition to buy the 162-mile strip of the road for \$575,000 last Tuesday in Washington.

John D. Farrington, Rock Island president, said the company wants to operate the Wichita Falls & Southern section from Wichita Falls to the Warren Petroleum Corp. plant two miles south of Breckenridge for three years on a trial basis. The line would become a permanent part of Rock Island's system if the test were successful.

Both are slated for 1,850 feet. In the same field, Star Oil Co., Inc. No. 1-B Robert Jackson is to be a project 330 feet from the south and east lines of the north-east quarter of Section 78, Block 4, T&P Survey.

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Baker & Camp Co., Breckenridge, No. 1 Chose Fambro is a regular field project one mile east of Wfalyard. Site for the 1,850-foot rotary project is 187 feet south and west of the southeast corner of Section 10, B&L Survey, but in Section 37, Block 6, T&P Survey.

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Cattle Buyer Is Indicted

Joe Bontricht, prominent Colorado City salesman, was indicted in Eastland by the District Court grand jury for "conspiracy to commit theft by false pretext," Joe Nusselle, Eastland County district attorney, announced late Wednesday.

Bill Wallis, a San Angelo cattle buyer, also was named in the same indictment.

Nusselle said the indictment arose out of a purchase by Wallis and jettied by the grand jury Tuesday, Fairbairn Sales Barn on July 28. Wallis purchased the cattle with a check exceeding \$5,000 which was signed "Joe Bontricht by Bill Wallis," Nusselle said.

Bontricht, manager of the Colorado City Cattle Auction, was released from the Eastland County jail about 6 p.m. Wednesday on \$2,500 bond. He had been brought from Colorado City to the Eastland jail by Eastland County Sheriff Frank Tucker and Texas Ranger Aubrey (Cocky) Yeager of Eastland about 4 p.m.

Wallis had made bond about three weeks ago on a charge filed earlier in Breckenridge, one Justice Court at Eastland, Nusselle said. But both he and Wallis were indicted by the grand jury Tuesday. Faircloth has a civil suit pending against Bontricht and Wallis in the 51st District Court in Eastland, in connection with cattle purchase, Nusselle said.

T. M. Turner Collier, judge of the 51st District Court, said Wednesday night he did not know when the case would come up for trial in his court.

OPENING KICKOFF COUNTY'S ANNUAL GRID CLASSIS IS SET FRIDAY AT 8 ON MAV TURF

In an advance-billed thriller which may decide the 1953 District 7-A schoolboy grid championship, the Ranger High Bulldogs and the Eastland High Mavericks clash at Maverick Stadium in Eastland Friday night.

The opening kickoff of the annual Eastland County grid classic—always one of the top pigskin tilts of the year—has been set for 8 p.m. sharp and an over-capacity crowd of fans from both cities is expected to pack the stands and spill out along the sidelines of the battle site.

Coach Ed Hooker, Eastland mentor, and Ranger's Stubby Warden were sending their Maverick and Bulldog charges through final light, brush-up drills this afternoon, winding up a week of long, rough and rugged workouts in preparation for the all-important tilt for their hoppe-47 schoolboy eleven.

Both coaches reported their charges in fine fettle and bring to go in the Friday night clash.

"This is going to be the game of the season," Eastland's Hooker said this morning. "My boys are really ready and I believe they'll play heads-up ball against Ranger Friday night."

Ranger Warden had little comment to offer. "The Bulldogs are ready," he said. "The Ranger squad, like Eastland, is in tip-top shape physically and mentally."

On the basis of comparisons of squad weights, records, etc., the Maroon & Whites of Ranger are deemed as slight favorites to win the Friday night contest. However, the annual Ranger-Eastland duel is one that usually defies all standards of pre-game jockeying.

The usually famous Williamson Grid Rating System, however, Wednesday picked the Mavericks to come out on top in the 7-A skirmish.

The Rangers have a two won, one lost record. They clipped the Colorado City Wolves of 4-AA in their opener, 28-7, on to 9-AA in Mineral Wells Mountains, 14-13, and opened their 7-A campaign last Friday night at Abilene with a 53-13 triumph over the Wylie High Bulldogs.

The Eastlanders knocked off the 8-AA Cisco High Lobos, 7-0, in their opener three weeks ago, dropped a 14-7 decision to the Double A Coleman Bluecats, and last week opened their District 7-A grid war with a 7-7 deadlock with the De Leon Beakrats.

The Beakrats and the Dublin Lions are tilted of top caliber this fall, but most sportswriters and grid observers believe that the Eastland High Mavericks or the Ranger High Bulldogs are the teams in forenoon, running for the 1953 district title. Thus, the Friday night tilt may easily decide the 7-A championship.

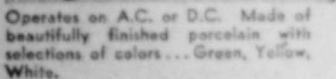

### Change Plan For Training U.S. Draftees

The Army streamlined its basic training procedures for draftees to get them ready for combat sooner and save money at the same time.

For one thing, except for "minimum" necessities, the recruit will not be issued his clothing for five weeks. The Army pointed out that "most trainees experience changes in their physical measurements" during the first five weeks.

The draftee will no longer given a 14-day leave after he completes the first 16 weeks of training. Instead, the seven-day leave authorized after seven weeks is doubled.

The Army said most draftees will receive their second weeks of training at the same station as they do the first weeks. This is designed to save travel time and expenses—although some will still be transferred for special training.

The Army said: "It is anticipated that the new plan will increase the productive service of most listed personnel by several weeks and at the same time, effect saving in money and some head personnel."

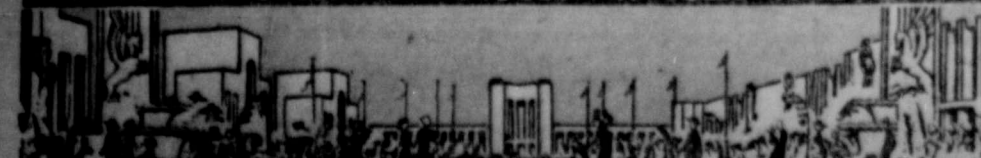

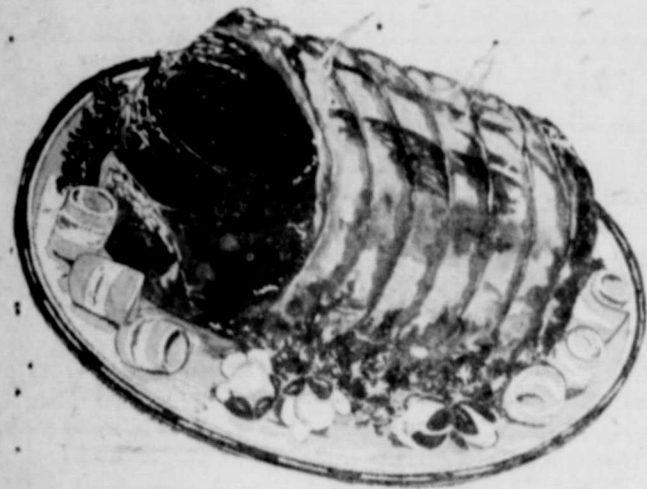

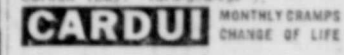

As the Pioneer Conference season turns into the third week of play for most teams the San Angelo Rams have taken the lead in total offense with 579 yards net gain from scrimmage in two games.

Tom Hudson, fleet Ranger halfback, is the league's leading runner with 15 carries for 128 yards, an average of 8.5 yards per run.

His teammate Gene Ward is the leading punt returner, two for 40 yards.

Leading scorer is halfback Roy Halliburton of Schreiner Institute with three touchdowns for 18 points.

Department officials told the industry representatives at a closed-door session that about 105,000,000 pounds of beef have been contracted for delivery between August and March, 1954, but only 12,000,000 pounds actually have been delivered. The department's program calls for purchase of almost 95,000,000 additional pounds.

To carry out the program, the department said in a statement, it will be necessary to make large purchases between now and mid-November. This is designed to increase competition and bolster prices in the cattle market during heavy fall marketing.

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**U. S. Stockmen Again Score Price Support**

Cattle and meat industry representatives went on record anew against government price supports for livestock.

After meeting with Secretary of Agriculture Benson, they said a price support program "would serve mainly to complicate the industry's economic problems and would delay the establishment of a sound operating program" for the industry.

Sam C. Hyatt, president of the National Cattlemen's Association, Hyattsville, Wyo., told reporters he and other felt the livestock market would be even lower than it is if it had not been for the government's beef purchase program.

"We are eating our way out of this," Hyatt said.

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**Urged To Curb Hunt Accidents**

Stiff penalties are imperative, authorities believe, to curb the mounting totals of deaths and injuries caused by trigger-happy hunters who mistake human beings for deer and other game.

Writing in the October Reader's Digest, William Chapman White states that "officially reported" accidents in the hunting season last year totaled 1982, with 390 deaths. Not all accidents are reported, and ten states do not even keep records. Hence last year's death toll was "certainly at least 600," White says. Michigan alone reported 25 fatal accidents; Pennsylvania followed closely with 24.

The author urges that reporting of accidents be compulsory, that victims or their survivors be encouraged to file civil suits, as in highway accidents, and that the license of a hunter causing injury or death be revoked until he has been proved blameless.

Other reforms are needed, White believes, particularly in the teen-age group. Last year, in most states, hunters under 17 were responsible for a fourth of all accidents. Licenses are obtainable at 16 in the majority of states; in New Jersey the minimum age is 14; in four other states it is only 12.

New York, concerned about the problem of the teen-ager and his gun, requires all hunting-license applicants under 21 to present a certificate from an "approved

agency," such as the National Rifle Assn., as proof of "satisfactory training in the safe handling of firearms." Since this program was effected three and a half years ago, accidents involving the under-21 group in New York State have been cut by more than 75 percent.

Most authorities believe that more publicity about accidents would make a hunter think twice before he shoots. Many hunting accidents have no witnesses, the author points out, and those who kill or wound a man because they "thought it was a deer" are seldom punished. Local juries are often unwilling to convict, feeling that mitigating circumstances make penalties too severe. Only a few states revoke the license of a person proved negligent.



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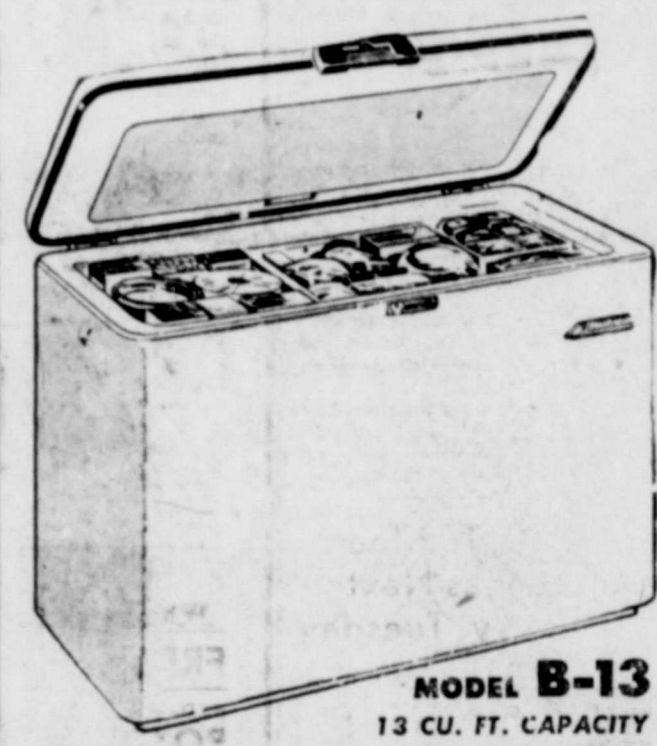

### 'The Ranger', New Dream Home To Be Unveiled At State Fair

A new dream home designed for the Southwest and aptly dubbed "The Ranger" will be unveiled at the 1953 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 10-25.

The new type of factory-engineered home will stand in the heart of the mammoth General Exhibits Building. It will be completely furnished and landscaped. Charles M. Goodman, one of the Nation's foremost architects, designed the house for National Homes Corporation, Lafayette, Ind.

The State Fair was chosen for "The Ranger's" debut because the exposition is the nation's biggest and because the house is extremely well suited to Texas and the Southwest, said Clifford A. Smith, vice president of National Homes. Architect Goodman used two clever devices, one... plenty of

all-glass walls and two... wood screen enclosures for patio, playground and porches, to capture the air of spaciousness and informality.

The Ranger has an extremely low-pitched overhang roof of white chips. Finishes include a new, grooved wood siding, board and batten or cedar shake shingles.

The three-bedroom home includes an unusual family room and kitchen combination, living room, bath and wood screen enclosed children's play area outside the kitchen-family room.

Goodman's floor plans were carefully devised to make separate sections of the home. For example, bedrooms and bath are accessible from both the family room and the living room.

Central heating and a new method of attic ventilation add to the comfort of the moderately priced home.

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### Christian Science

"Unreality" is the subject for this week's Christian Science Lesson-Sermon. This ideal is either temporal or

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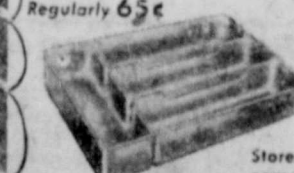
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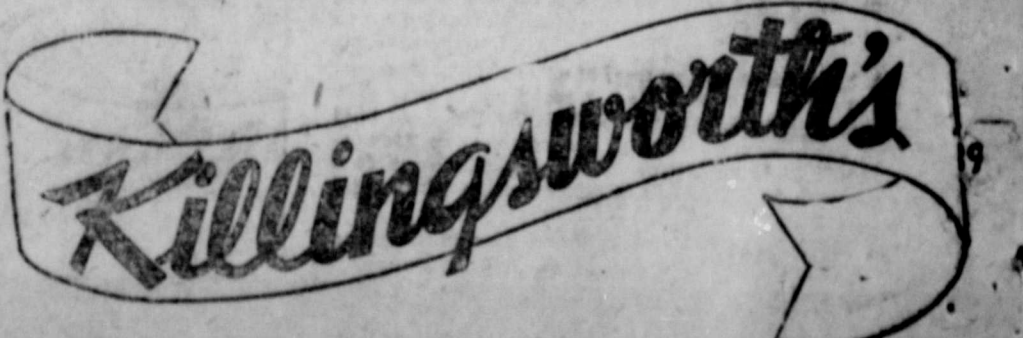
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
