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## RANGER JUNIOR COLLEGE WINS AGAINST MIDWESTERN ELEVEN 26-7 NON-CONFERENCE CLASH

Ranger Junior College's Rangers struck swiftly in the first quarter to build up a 13 point lead and then hammered heads with the visiting Midwestern University B Indians until late in the fourth quarter before going on to win the non-conference tilt 26-7 in Bulldog Stadium Thursday night.

The game, a show of defensive power for both teams during most of play, gave the Rangers their second victory in six starts. RJC also has a tie to their credit.

Joe Angel, 190 pound center from Fort Worth, was in an about 60 per cent of the Ranger tackles and played sensational ball during the whole game from his line-backers spot. Two of Ranger's ends, Cecil Gilstrap, 195 pound hefty from Big Springs, and Charles Brazil, a 200 pounder from Jacksonville, were a thorn in the side of the Indians all night. The two hard charging ends threw the visitors back for long losses time and time again on would-be pass plays.

The Indians ended up with a net yardage gain of 27 yards. They had a gross gain of 127 yards, but lost 100 yards on ground plays.

Rangers Score Early  
The Rangers scored when the game was just one minute deep when Bobby Pharis gathered in a punt off the toe of Bob Crawford on his own 15 and raced 85 yards for a TD. Tommy Wood failed to convert. The touchdown after only four plays from scrimmage—all by Midwestern.

Ranger made it 13-0 minutes later after Gilstrap jumped on an Indian fumble on the Midwestern 15 yard-line. Jimmy Cole went over from the two on a quarterback sneak and Allen Gibbs converted. It took the Rangers six plays to go over.

That ended the scoring until the Ranger eleven struck again with just five minutes of game time remaining. During the remainder of the first quarter and the whole of the second and third periods, the game was strictly a defensive affair. Neither team could find the right combination and a punting game highlighted play with Midwestern getting the best of the kicking game.

Then the offense took over. Cole, the man under in Coach Dick Henderson's formation, took the snap on the Midwestern 34, then gave ground back to the 45 before tossing a perfect throw into the waiting arms of Tommy Wood in the endzone. Gibbs converted.

The Rangers kicked off a n d Midwestern took over. The Indians only TD came with just over a minute of playing time remaining in the game. Fred Nelson passed to Bob Crawford, who by the way was the star of the Midwestern offense, and the shift back raced over. Crawford made a good catch on Ranger's 30. The play started back on RJC's 41. The Bulldogs, using a tight defense to make things easy for the offensive backs, scored almost at will. The Dogs continually took over the ball deep in Wildcat territory as the hard rushing line kept the cellar dwelling 7-A eleven hemmed in all night.

Again it was Charles Massee, the football playing pastor, who sparked the Dogs' offensive attack. Massee personally ran over three touchdowns, passed for another and had another 58 yard dash called back while spending much of his time on the bench as Coach O. C. "Stubby" Warden used his reserves at will. Other standouts in the backfield—Brazas and Massee—made the tally for the drive he ate up 45 yards after taking possession of Alvin Halsey's passes. Gibbs kick failed.

### Cisco Junior College Nips Airmen 26-12

Cisco Junior College smashed the Goodfellow Air Force Base Skyhawks from San Angelo 26-12 Friday night in a non-conference game played in Cisco.

Cisco scored two minutes deep in the second quarter when Enoch Reed went over from his own 38. Glen Hutson converted.

The Skyhawks quarterback, Roy Smith, passed to end Odell Gary in the end zone for the first Skyhawk TD late in the second quarter. The second Cisco touchdown came on a pass from Billy Witt to end Don Denard.

In the third period Chuck Burnett intercepted Billy Wood's pass on the Cisco 20 and carried over for the final TD for the Airmen.

Bobby Lynch passed to Denard at the goal line for the third Ranger score and Johnny White scored the final Cisco TD late in the final period on a three-yard bootleg play. Hutson converted.
