Dogs End District Play Against De Leon

Moore... ABOUT RANGER

It's hard on the nerves, that's what it is.

This football is getting out of hand. Seems that we can't even get a handful of right guesses on paper anymore. Last week-end was a rough one from the sport scribbler's standpoint. What with the Pioneer Junior College Conference going nuts, we just cannot produce a record that can be boosted about.

The truth is not always nice but here's how we came out last week. We were right on the Ranger High School tilt. In fact we picked the score at 41-6, but the Dogs made it 48-7. That wasn't off very much, however. Then we picked the Dublin win over Wylie, (we said it would be 33-0; it was only 26-0) the Bangs victory over Rising Star (picked again by one touchdown; it was 12-0 and we said 10-0); and the Eastland victory over Santa Anna. We shouldn't claim the Eastland win though! We said the Mavs would beat Santa Anna 6-0 and they actually beat them 52-0.

It was those Junior College games that hurt. How did we know Tarleton State was going to upset San Angelo or that Schreiner could handle Blinn? Fact is we almost missed all three games. We picked Arlington to beat Ranger 20-7 (they beat the Rangers 13-7) and JRC almost took an upset victory in that one.

Thank goodness there are only two Pioneer Conference affairs this week. Ranger meets Henderson, powerful Texas Junior College Conference eleven, in Athens, and we will pick an upset and choose Coach Henderson's charges to win through the air 20-14.

In the other college tilt we will string along with favored San Angelo to beat Coach Rusty Russell's Schreiner eleven.

In District 7-A games we see Tanges smashing DeLeon by about 41-13 Eastland getting by Dublin 19-7 to take runner-up honors in the district.

Getting back to Ranger Junior College. The Rangers are probably the most respected team in the nation with less than a 1,500 average. No team has come so close to winning all their games and yet losing the majority of them as Ranger has in a long time. Just look at the statistics. The Rangers lead the Pioneer conference in passing with a net gain of 1,798 yards. That is way ahead of San Angelo, the second best passing team, which has 1,311 in the air. Then Coach Henderson's team rates second in total offense. Arlington leads with 2,364 yards in eight games while the Rangers have made 1,981.

Tommy Wood rates second in passing in the conference with 26 completions in 65 pitches. Yet Ranger has lost four of their eight games and tied one. Wharton gave them their worst beating, winning 20-0 in the opening game. Cisco edged by the Rangers 20-7, San Angelo came from behind to win 13-6. The Rangers tied Navarro 20-20 and beat Allen Academy 26-6. Midwestern B. 26-7 and Tarleton State 12-7.

We don't know if we were insulted or complimented. A gentleman who we did not know stepped up on the street today and said, "Moore, I like your ideas but they are not coherent."

It was nice to see Ranger take a holiday Wednesday. Armistice Day is a day that many of us have a tendency to overlook. We feel that the day should be more prominent on our calendar.

Henderson JC Hosts Ranger At 8 Tonight

Ranger Junior College's Rangers travel to Athens tonight to take on the Henderson Junior College Cardinals in a non-conference clash between two of the outstanding junior college aggregations in the state.

Ranger will be representing the Pioneer Junior College Conference colors into the tilt. The game will get underway at 8 p.m.

Coach Dick Henderson's charges face the task of trying to cook up a defense strong enough to hold the Cards, who are unbeaten in TJCC play and heavily favored to win the crown, and at the same time get an offense going to 'get enough points to win. If the Rangers showing against powerful Arlington State College can be used as a gauge the Rangers will probably do just that. Ranger was keyed up for the ASC game, however, and the Rangers are not expected to show such fine form this week.

NINTH VICTORY TARGET OF WARDENMEN IN HOME CLASH

Ranger's classy Bulldogs end their 1953 regular gridiron season Friday night when they play host to the De Leon Bears at Bulldog Stadium in a District 7-A clash that has little bearing on the outcome of the district. The Dogs won't be hanging up their toes after the game by a long shot, however, they must represent the district in the Interscholastic League Class A state play-offs. Kick-off time is 7:50 p.m.

And Coaches O. C. "Stubby" Warden and Eoone Yarbrough won't be letting the Dogs think too easily of this final game. De Leon faces among the upper half of the district and the Cats have played some good games this year. They are, in fact, the only team besides Eastland and Dublin that was rated a chance of knocking off the Dogs when the season began.

Ranger goes into the game with a seven game win streak—all dis-

trict games—and an 8-1 record for the season. They must also strive to keep their number one rating in the state.

Coach Warden's big four in the backfield, Bill Browning, Charles Masseege, Jim Littlefield and Scott Farney, are all in top shape for the clash. From end to end Warden will also have his best in the lineup.

The Bulldogs record to date shows that Ranger has beaten Colorado City, Wylie, Eastland, Bangs, Rising Star, Santa Anna, Cross Plains and Dublin while losing by one point to Class AA Mineral Wells. The Dogs have scored 332 points this season for an average of just under 37 points a game. That's more than five touchdowns a tilt. While running up the big score Ranger has allowed their opponents only 96 points for an average of 16.6 points a game.

The Dogs haven't scored less than two touchdowns—13 points—in any game this year. The most points in any one game was scored against Dublin, the team which was favored to win the district when the season started.

De Leon has lost only one district game so far this year, but a tie ruins the Cats hopes for winning the district. Ranger could lose to De Leon and still get into the state playoffs even though they would actually be tied with Dublin for the crown. That is, of course, if Dublin can get by Eastland this week. De Leon tied Eastland 7-7 and fell to Dublin.

Here are the probable starting line-ups:

For the Bulldogs in the line, at left end, Coach Warden will most likely have 185 pound Tommy Hinds. At left tackle, it will be Jimmy Wheeler, 190; at left guard, Gary Faltinsen, 195; at center, John Rush, 163; at right guard, Bobby Justice, 170; right tackle, Eddie James, 210, and right end, Chico Mendoza.

In the backfield it will be Scott Farney, 162, at quarterback; Bill Browning, 143, at left half; Charles Masseege, 145, right half; and Jim Littlefield, 150, fullback.

Darden will probably use Benny Robinson as a defensive back. Other defensive players who will start if Ranger kicks off are tackle Jim Nail and end Dan Mitchell.

Other Dogs who will probably open include Johnny Graves, tackle, 200; Tommy Young, guard, 170; John Hagaman, center, 160; Tommy Sutton, guard, 165; Jerry Cantrell, end, 165; Johnny Swiney, quarterback, 120; Archie Block, tackle, 180; Paul Hinds, back, 115; Don Vasquez, guard, 140; and Dan Cruse, guard, 115.

De Leon will have Glenn Campbell, 156 pounds, at left end; James Ottwell, 209, left tackle; Charles Lindsey, 165, left guard; Jim Golden, 155, center; Benny Barnes, 265, right tackle; Coy Nelson, 200, right tackle; Clyde Noonster, 160, right end; Fred Adams, 140, left half; Waylon Daniels, 150, right half; and M. L. Nance, 170, fullback.

Jr's Still At It!

"It was the ghost of the former Oklahoma quarterback star, Jack Mitchell, that was on the field in the guise of Junior Arterburn."

That praise was heaped upon the back of the lad who made Ranger High School, Ranger Junior College, Texas Tech and now Navy's Great Lakes eleven one of the best quarterback in the four schools' histories. It was Abe Chasing, sports editor of the Tucson Star, writing after Junior had displayed his abilities in leading Texas Tech to an upset victory of Arizona.

Junior got his start in the gridiron world here at Ranger High. He was all district on the district championship team. Then he led Ranger Junior College to two titles in a row.

And Junior hasn't stopped yet. Last week the ex-Ranger star took ed 33 completions in one game to tie the standing record for Great Lakes and lead his eleven to a 27-19 victory over powerful Pensacola. Arterburn was the whole game as he hurried completion after completion to lead his mates to victory.

And the win was not the first of the year for Great Lakes. They have won eight of nine games and lost their only game 15-6 after Arterburn was sidetracked early in the game with injuries. The Great Lakes eleven has defeated Stout, Wayne University, St. Norbert College, Seattle Air Force Base, Central Michigan, Camp Atterbury, Danbridge and Pensacola. They lose only to Fort Leonard Wood. Arterburn, the captain

of the team, has completed 100 passes this season to pare his record. In addition he is a deadly runner.

In a personal duel with Notre Dame's ex-star quarterback, Bob Williams, Junior came out way ahead. Williams completed three of 17 passes and Arterburn 10 of 18. Then on the ground Arterburn gained 68 yards to take the lead in the game in statistics.

But tales could go on all day about Junior. Every game he manages to star in. He has never had what you could call a bad day except when he was sidelined by injuries.

Soon the Ranger are will get his discharge from the Navy. He hasn't made any definite plans yet, but we can tell you the pros are going to be after our boy.

Ranger Band To Go To Texas U. Contest

The Ranger High School Band will be among some 10,000 Texas high school bandsman who will be on hand to participate in the 18th Annual University of Texas Band Day celebration Saturday in Austin. Fred Steffy, band director, said today.

The celebration is sponsored by the University of Texas Longhorn Band and is the largest of its kind in the United States.

According to Milton H. Crockett, Jr., director of the Longhorn Band, a special feature of the celebration will be a band twirling contest also sponsored by the Longhorn Band.

Working with Crockett is Weldon Covington, Coordinator of the twirling contest.

Scheduled to last approximately one hour and forty-five minutes, the parade will be led by a Austin Public Schools Band. New featured will be the winning bands from last year, Brownwood High, Hartings High, Leavert's Chapel High and Diane High.

The four winning bands from last year will also join the Longhorn Band in the Texas-TCU half-time show. Approximately 500 twirlers are expected to take part in this performance.

All bands will be the guests of the Longhorn Band and the University of Texas at the Texas-TCU football game on Saturday afternoon.

The twirling contest will be conducted from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Gregory Gymnasium on the University campus. Trophies will be presented first place winners in each division and medals will go to the next four place winners in each division. These awards will be made at the football game half-time.

According to Crockett, it is a purpose of this contest is to give twirlers the opportunity to rate themselves, accurately, with other twirlers from all over the state in one, two, three order rather than by division rating, which sometimes leads toward rating the individual performer.

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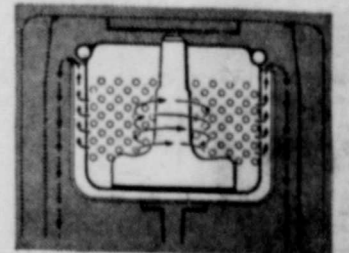

Control Board Adds Inspectors

The addition of ten new inspectors by the Texas Liquor Control Board will be of tremendous help in bringing about closer observance of the state's liquor laws, Coke R. Stevenson Jr., the board's administrator, said today.

A training school for 10 applicants for the position of inspector began Nov. 2, Stevenson announced.

The men will be taught rules of evidence, the law as it applies to search warrants, and details of the liquor control act as it applies to both wet and dry territory.

At the end of their training period, and upon passing an examination, the men will be commissioned inspectors.

The names of the trainees were not given because most of them will go into service as undercover men.

Five additional inspectors were authorized by the last session of the Legislature, Stevenson said, and five more are needed to replace men who are no longer with the department.

With the ten new men, the board will have 111 inspectors scattered over the state.

Grand juries of Houston, San Antonio, and many other cities have asked for more L-men to help enforce the liquor laws, Stevenson declared.

He said the enlarged force will be better able to supervise liquor and beer establishments and to watch for movement of beverages into dry territory.

To do a complete job of liquor law enforcement, however, still more men will be needed, Stevenson said.

Dr. Cox Offers Posture Tips To Aid Health

Guilty of pretzel posture? Does your body profile look like the bent part of a capital "D"?

Then harken to the words of State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox as he explains that good health and appearance have their starting point in good posture.

Here's how you, too, can obtain the stance of a Grecian god or goddess, as the case may be:

Hold your head high and pull your chin in until your eye level is parallel to the ground. Pull your shoulders back and make the shoulder blades form as near a flat surface as possible. Raise your chest up and push it forward until the buttons strain. Draw your abdomen up and in, and when you breathe in, pull your chest that rises and falls rather than the abdomen. Flatten the lower part of your back, trucking the buttocks as close under the hips as possible. Tip your back down. Hold your knees straight but not stiff. Put your feet parallel, with the weight evenly balanced.

A good posture can be had without stiffness or strain, so don't exaggerate.

Some people feel it is more comfortable to walk, stand, or sit in a slouchy position, drooped over like a wilted weed. In your vain attempt for more comfort in daily activity, don't forget that the true secret of good posture is to keep the body well balanced throughout the day.

The old saying has it that

"there's a place for everything," and Dr. Cox says that goes for the human body. Each organ has a specific space in which its function is performed. The vital organs—heart, lungs, abdomen, etc.—tend to be cramped when the body is slumped over.

Cramped lungs cannot deliver a full supply of oxygen; circulation is slowed up when the heart is cramped; and a cramped stomach impairs digestion.

"Remember," the doctor cautions, "true comfort and true relaxation comes with good posture." In street parlance that means "straighten up, friend, you'll feel better."

A. Z. Myrick Named Farm Bureau Head

A. Z. Myrick of Cisco, was re-elected president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau at the annual county convention held Thursday night, Oct. 29, in Eastland.

Other officers presented by the nominating committee for re-election were: Jimmy Sparks, Desdemona, vice president; Ray A. Norris, Flatwood, secretary-treasurer; Mrs. Bill Tucker, Cheaney, will again serve as reporter.

New directors elected are: I. S. Echols, C. Pippin, J. D. Harrell, A. W. Hendricks, W. R. Usery, J. H. Tidwell, Hilburn and Bicks who will serve along with John Lewis, T. C. Conart, W. E. Kirklin, C. T. Dawkins, who were re-elected for another term.

Resolutions given at the county level were considered and adopted as follows: (1) That Farmers Marketing Carbs, after complying with regulations, be mailed to them, if so required. (2) All unused allotment acreage of all crops under the supervision of P. M. A. be transferable, for one year, within the county. (3) Measurement of all allotted acreage to stay within 8-10 acre of the allotment, without penalty. (4) Use both old and new formulas in determining parity prices, which ever is the highest. (5) Favors the equalizing of grading of Spanish peanut versus runner-type peanut, to insure fair competition. (6) In favor of more scientific research for the pecan growers in Texas. (7) Opposes the importation of beef when it affects prices on the cattle industry in this county. (8) Favors the cushioning of cotton acreage reduction over a period of at least two years.

B. J. Gist of Abilene, district 7 state director briefly discussed legislative issues which will be given consideration at the state meeting, to be held in Mineral Wells Nov. 8-12.

PROSPECTS FOR GOOD DEER HUNT FAIR; TURKEYS ALSO RALLY FROM SEVERE DROUTH

Texas deer and turkey have rallied somewhat from the severe drouth period and prospects are for a fair season, according to the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

The annual big game hunt under the General State Law opens November 16 and continues through Dec. 31. There are special seasons for larger areas like West of the Pecos, Panhandle, Possum Kingdom, as well as several special dates on the county level. Bag limits and shooting hours likewise vary.

An expected 100,000 hunters will take to the field for the fall classic. The kill on deer usually runs about 40,000 in Texas. The turkey harvest is estimated at close to 6,000. Both deer and turkey suffered from the prolonged drouth but rains beginning in the late summer have at least partly relieved the crisis, on the basis of reports to the Executive Secretary.

Even in Deep South Texas the deer have rallied, although there was some die-off in the heat of the summer. Game Warden Supervisor Herbert Ward of Catalina and Supervisor John E. Henry of Cotulla agreed that deer were on the upturn although some ranchers in their area will restrict the harvest.

Game Warden Supervisor G. M. Stricklin of Beeville said deer are coming back in his area which embraces the lower coastal plain.

In the Hill Country, game wardens reported a definite pickup in deer prospects and said wild turkey were slowly rallying from three bad hatching seasons.

The Executive Secretary advised hunters to study their Game Law Digests on hunting regulations and to look up the local game wardens for any additional information needed.

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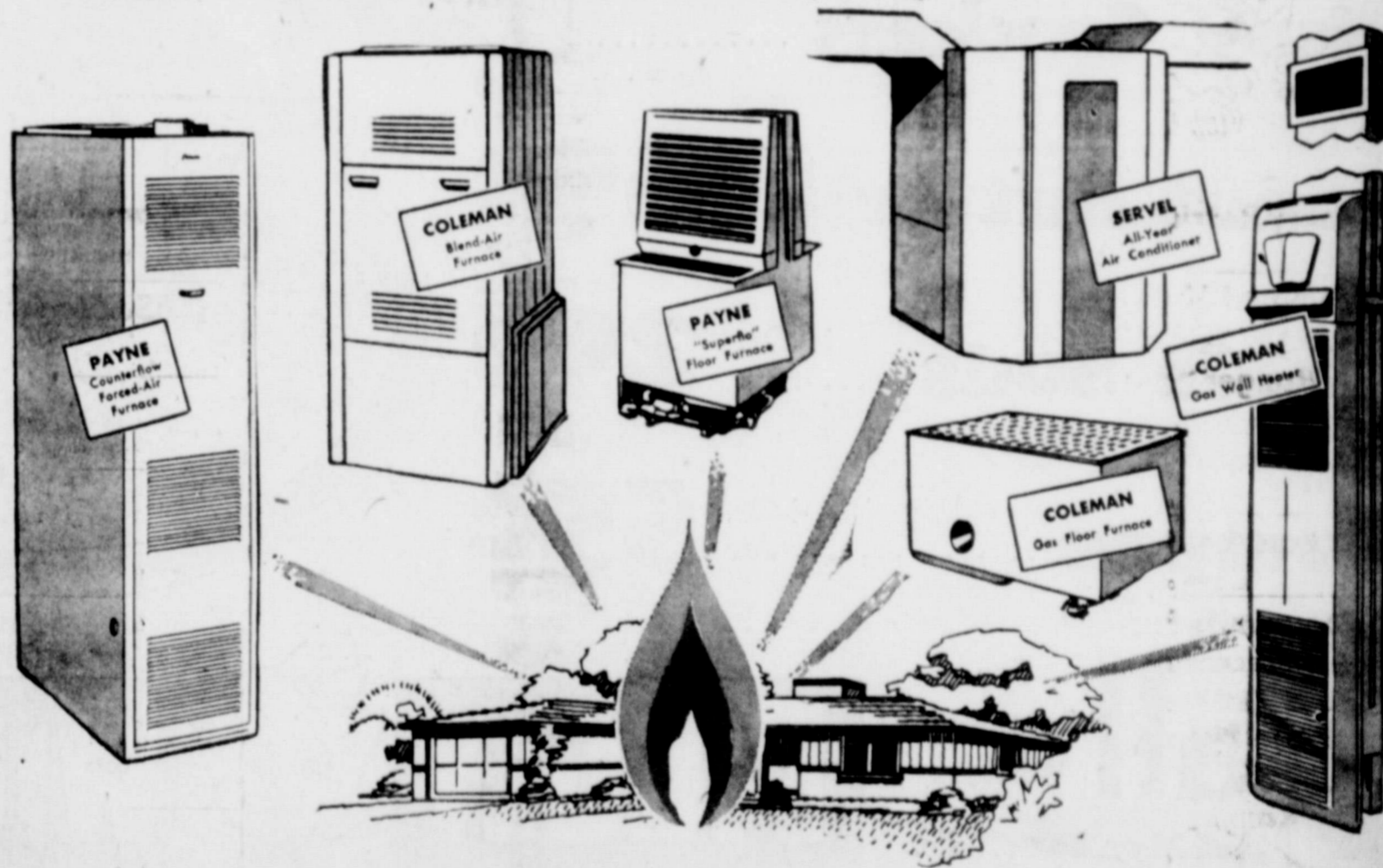

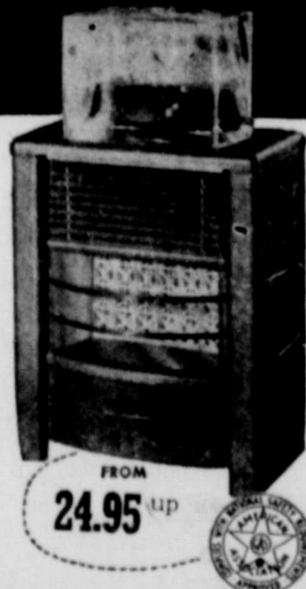


