YOU ARE CONTAGIOUS, STAY AWAY FROM THE LIVESTOCK

If farmers will keep visitors away from stock barns and poultry buildings they will help keep new diseases off the farm, the American Foundation for Animal Health said here today.

"Stringent precautions to keep all visitors away from livestock and poultry may seem harsh, but they will pay dividends in reduced disease losses," Foundation officials said. "Visitors may bring in the germs and viruses of many diseases on their clothing and shoes. Such infectious diseases as hog cholera, foot pox, erysipelas, shipping fever, and many others may be spread in this way.

The recent outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease in Canada may have resulted from the virus being brought from Europe on someone's clothing, Foundation authorities indicated.

"Owners should not hesitate to keep visitors away from livestock quarters," officials said. "This is especially true when there are outbreaks of contagious diseases on nearby farms!

"Farmers should also apply the 'keep out' rule to new stock brought to the farm. All newly-purchased animals should be held in quarantine long enough to make sure they are disease-free. If the new animals show disease symptoms, a veterinary diagnosis should be obtained so the trouble may be recognized and treated before it spreads to healthy animals."

One of the best materials for starting seeds indoors is finely screened sphagnum moss. The moss holds moisture well and reduces losses from disease.

BELTON, Tex. (Sp.) — The first Career Day sponsored by Mary Hardin-Baylor college is scheduled for Saturday, April 3, Dr. A. C. Gettys, acting president, announced today.

High school and junior college senior girls including those in Eastland County, together with their parents and teachers are being invited to the campus for the day.

Careers in art, music, business, teaching, physical education, home economics and speech will be featured in panel discussions set up by the college departments. Speakers will include representatives of each field.

An outstanding speaker, to be announced later, will highlight the morning program to be followed by a campus tour. At noon a chicken dinner will be served, without charge, to all guests.

In the afternoon they will break up into groups according to special interests for panel discussions with individual conferences afterwards when desired.

All departments of the college will be open for inspection and have a representative on hand to answer questions. Several are planning exhibits and demonstrations for the occasion.

Homer H. Hallum Completes Basic At Fort Bliss

FORT BLISS (Spl.)—Pvt. Homer H. Hallum, husband of Mrs. Emma Jean Hallum, Rt. 2, Carbon, and son of Mr. W. A. Hallum, Gen. Del., Eastland, recently began eight weeks of basic training in the Antiaircraft Artillery Replacement Training Center at Ft. Bliss, Texas.

The first eight weeks of basic training are spent on fundamental Infantry subjects like army drill, rifle, machine gun, and bazooka marksmanship, and familiarization with army technical subjects. This first phase of training is climaxed with a one-week maneuver in the field.

Upon completion of the first week cycle, Pvt. Hallum will either be assigned for further training at Ft. Bliss in the techniques of antiaircraft artillery, or he will be transferred to another Training Center for schooling in some other army skill.

Should he remain at Ft. Bliss, his second eight weeks will see him learn the uses of various electronic equipment employed by the AAA-RTC. He will also be expertly trained in the firing of light and medium antiaircraft artillery at low-flying and high altitude aerial targets on the one-and-one-half million acre Ft. Bliss ranges.

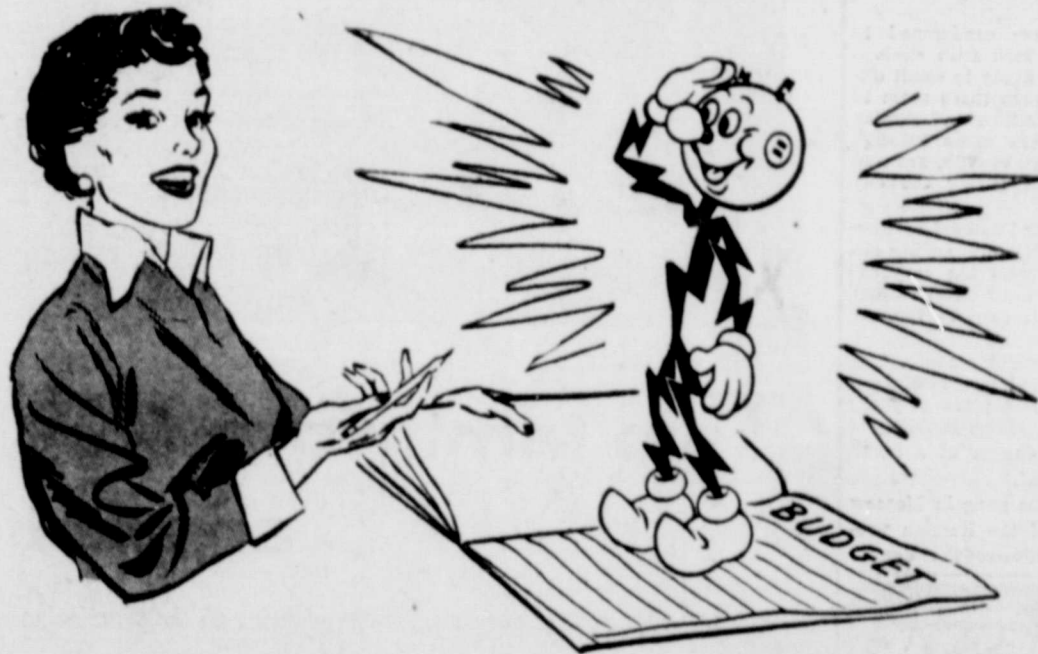


