Quarter Report Due This Month

Quarterly returns in two types of Federal taxes are due in April, Mr. Eli's Campbell Jr., director of the Internal Revenue Service today advised affected taxpayers in the Texas area. The returns due are those called for on Forms 941 and 720.

Form 941 is the employer's first quarterly Federal tax return on funds withheld from the salaries of employees for withholding and social security taxes. Form 720 is the first quarterly excise tax return and applies to all vendors of materials or services subject to such taxes.

In both instances firms owing taxes had the responsibility of obtaining from the Federal Reserve Bank depository receipts each month where the amount of monthly tax due amounted to \$100 or more. This responsibility applies to the tax due on both Forms 941 and 720. These depository receipts are to be attached to each form when it is filed with the Revenue office. In the event that a receipt has not been obtained for the final month of the quarter, or if any additional tax payment is due, a check for that sum also must accompany each return.

Nearly all employers, regardless of the number of persons employed, are required to file Form 941 and must make returns for anyone employed for any period during the quarter. There are very few exemptions from requirements of this filing obligation, and they constitute less than five per cent of the total number of employers in this Revenue area, Mr. Campbell said.

Mr. Campbell also cautioned firms filing Form 720 on excise taxes to be sure to give complete details, particularly concerning the basis upon which they compute taxes due. This entry is frequently omitted on this return, he said.

The district director also pointed out that the tax rate on excise payments is the same for the first quarter of 1954 as it has been in previous quarters. No congressional action will affect that period, he pointed out. He also reminded taxpayers in either category that their returns must be filed in the district where their company has its principal place of business. The principal place of business is generally defined as that office which

maintains the central accounting and control records.

Those taxpayers who have been furnished Internal Revenue Service forms were urged by Mr. Campbell to make use of them rather than filing forms of their own containing similar information since the Federal documents contain numbers assigned taxpayers and other data requisite to proper processing of the returns. About twenty percent of the firms normally filing Form 941 neglect to do this, he said. He asked their cooperation especially to facilitate the work of the agency.

Any taxpayer in either of the two categories who has any questions concerning the proper completion of these or other forms is urged to call the district Revenue office at Sterling 5611 for further information.

"Perhaps the most important requirement other than an accurate return is the attachment of the Federal Reserve depository receipt to all Forms 720 and 941 that are filed with us," Mr. Campbell said.

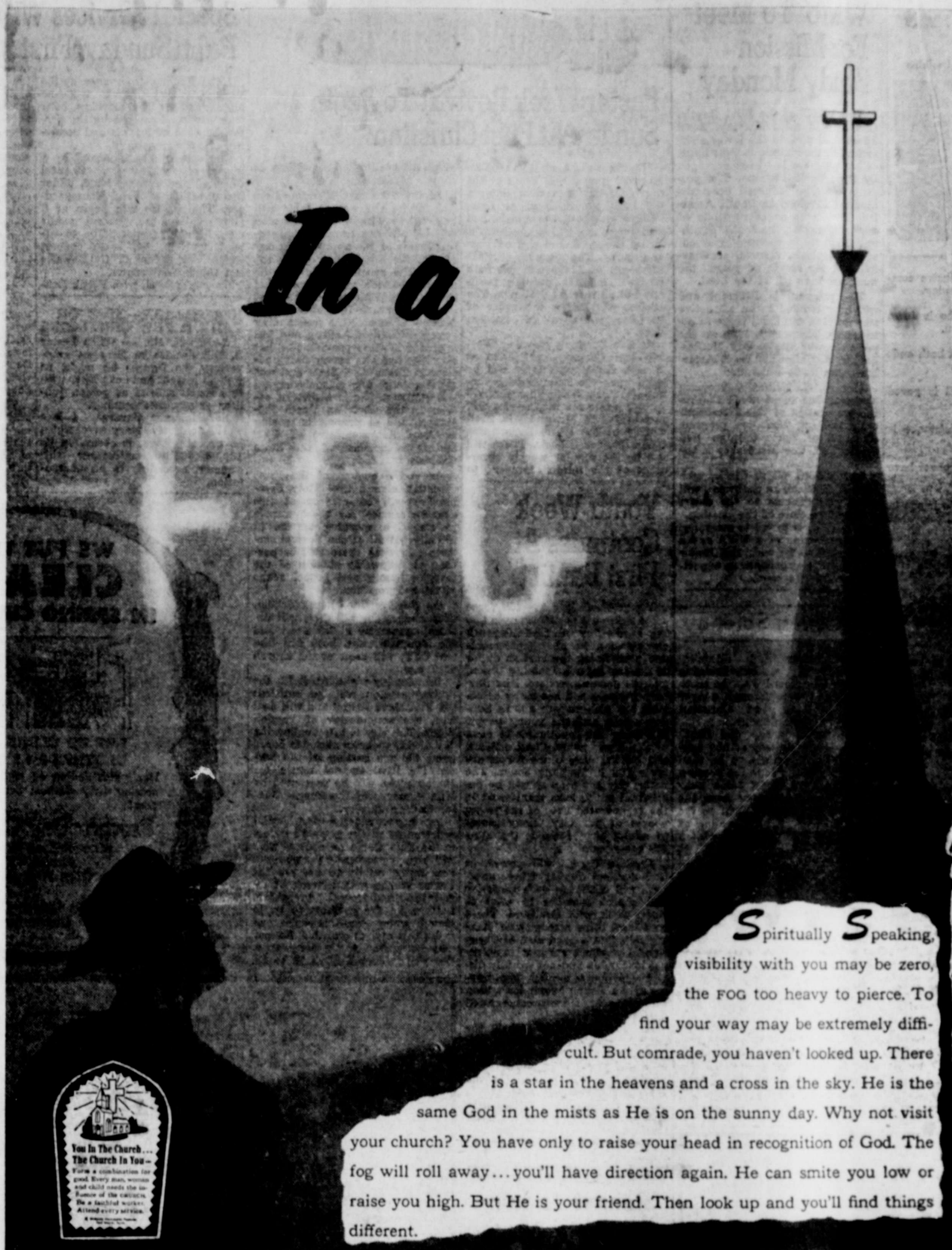

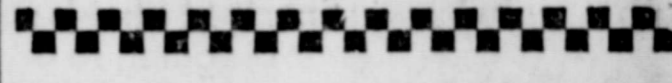
