Probably no other problem is as of so much vital importance to Texas as our water supply-or the lack of one.

The Texas Water Resources Committee has just made a special report which they named "Plan for the Alleviation of the Water Shortage in Texas." Their report a series of dams on all our rivers of water a year to the gulf.

But their plan isn't going to belp us out here on the High ns-we don't have any rivers n up and it doesn't look like All have any floodwaters for long time to come.

Back in May, 1949, a Missourian engineer came up with a plan that was so large in scope that it staggered the imagination. It was a plan that would theoretically work but in this day and age would cost millions or billions of dollars. He estimated it would cost about the same amount in 1930 dollars, as the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Purpose of the project would be to irrigate with and to control the flood waters of the Mississippi. Both would be good reasons for serious consideration of the plan.

It consisted basically of a long canal, with eastward tributaries, running from the headwaters of the Missouri in Wyoming to the Nueces River in Southwest Texas and entering the Gulf of Mexico at Corpus Christi. It would have a three-fold purpose of flood control on the Mississippi, irrigation for the High Plains regions, and navigation.

Much publicity was given this idea at the time of its conception and the plan received a cold shoulder from the government and everyone else in a position to do anything about it. It has been our understanding that a similar plan has been kicking around in a congressional committee for sev eral years but it has, and will

continue, to lie dormant. Naturally we are concerned with floodwater control, but the main project would be irrigation water and it is highly unlikely at this time that the government will consent to even consider putting more land in cultivation. But with the water table in this area depleting as fast as it is, the time will come soon when everyone in this area will be searching for a way of keeping water available to

According to the engineer, Cha-5,200 feet above sea level and wind a main ditch down the eaststream until a crossing can be made behind a low dam.

This makes possible the control of volume of these streams, valuable for irrigation of their lower valley. Between rivers he would dig subsidiary canals, winding from the main canal along the crests of the watersheds a hundred or more miles eastward, providing water for those areas now drop. These canals would fill thousands of ponds or sinkholes, providing storage and also practically eliminating floods in the flat lands

The big canal would thus curve south, dropping only a few inches per mile, through Wyoming, Colorado, Oklahoma and West Texas to the Nueces river, 200 miles east of El Paso, swelling the Nueces all the way to Corpus Christi and the Gulf.

In addition to irrigating its millions of acres, spreading a blanket of vegetation that would halt erosion from the dust bowl area of the 30's to Montana and preventing floods, the contour canal would provide easy navigation from Corpus Christi to the Arkansas river and lock navigation from there all the way up to the Black Hills.

Later he proposes contour canal systems which would be laid down along other eastward slopes. Altogether they would be aimed at diverting four-fifths of the water from the Mississippi before it reaches the river.

Actually the Federal Power Commission engineers have approved the Sexton plan's basic recommendations — but that's as far as it has officially gone in eight years.

Soon after this proposal was announced in President Eisenhower's first message to the Congress, a campaign got anderway to sell it to the American people. The two major items in he proposal were the vesting of power in the President to send American boys into the Middle East, and the granting to the President of wide powers to spend money in that area. They quickly brought forth opposition from a number of people in our country. these were generally divided into three groups. One group was against the granting of any of the powers re-

quested by the President on the theory that the right to declare war should remain in the Congress; that the granting of power the President to use armed ces in foreign areas was, in ffect, granting to the President the right to wage war, declared r undeclared. Another argument y this group was that the United Nations had been formed to provide a police force to handle mat-American tax dollars that had prisingly wide area. en poured into the bottomless it of foreign aid had not produced results that had originally n anticipated, and that the urther lavish expenditures of such funds would constitute additional

waste without effective results. The second group vigorously opcosed the use of armed forces of the United States, but did subscribe to the use of American tax money for both military and economic aid in the troblesome areas of the Middle East. Their reasoning was to the effect that, since we were a member of the United Nations, the entire matter of policing the area should be left to the UN, but that money would be needed by these countries in order to meet their economic needs, and that the providing of ample sums for this purpose would lessen the danger of shedding American blood most good in the long run. in those areas.

The third group followed the school of thought that the power to send American armed forces into these areas should be vested in the President, because it was the only way that moves of dictatorships could be countered by this country. n other words, if a dictatorial antil Congress acted before such an order could be given, we would be at a serious disadvantage. This group felt that all sums expended nomic aid grants. They argued that the military operation would be much more effective in settling the matter and that the granting of economic aid cculd well create a situation that would make the military operation more difficult.

Tom Rambo in the Hale Center American: America has long been described as a nation of churches, and in the past year we have read alot about the return to religion.

Apparently this return is a free riding kind. A recent survey published in Changing Times magazines reveals that most church members give mere pittances to their church. Most people give \$1 a week, if they are regular attenders, and there are many who attend occasionally and give as little as \$2 a year to their church.

We were surprised to learn the Presbyterians lead the nation in giving-although they give only \$75.54 per year per member. The Southern Baptist are near the tail of the list, with \$42.17 per year, followed by the Methodist, \$37.53 and the Disciples of Christ at the bottom-with \$34.77 per year.

This isn't much of a record for a Christian nation. The average American wastes more money than he gives to his church-and certainly the average church goer could double his, contributions without straining his pocketbook. For some of the birds who give \$2 a year, a doubling could be taken in stride.
