Three candidates are running for sheriff. Frank Tucker is seeking re-election and his opponents are J. B. Williams and E. L. (Jug) Dennis.

Carl Elliott and H. R. (Pop) Garrett are in the race for County School Superintendent.

Jan. R. Boggs is seeking re-election as Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1. He has two opponents: C. W. Cooper and C. C. Street.

Loy L. Lane seeks re-election as District Clerk. John C. Nicholas is his only opponent.

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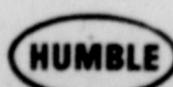

Time Your Drapes To Wall Designs

Take a good, long look at a room before you make curtains, draperies, of slipcovers, advises Magdalene Pfister of the University of Nebraska extension service.

She says plain fabrics are best if walls have figured paper. With plain materials, there is no competition for attention between draperies or slip covers and the walls.

With solid colored walls, Miss Pfister said, the homemaker can choose either small, indistinct all-over designs or a bold prominent design in a patterned fabric. The small figured fabrics are best in a small room and the bolder designs for a larger room.

No Buffalo Milk From This Herd

COLDWATER, Mich. — One of the nation's few remaining buffalo herds roams freely across the 150-acre ranch of Ed Butters near here.

The herd now totals 70 animals. Butters has a strict rule that no more than a half-dozen animals will be taken for meat purposes each year.

Butters bought the herd from a group of Sioux Indians in South Dakota and brought it here in 1945. Since then, he has received several additions from zoos. He hopes to increase the herd because of requests for buffalo meat and related products.

Aside from meat orders, Butters gets requests for such things as Buffalo skins for lamp shades, heads for mounting, skulls for lamp stands and teeth for den decorations. He tries to fill the requests whenever possible, but there was one he wouldn't even consider.

It was for buffalo milk. "You just don't milk buffaloes," Butters said. "At least I don't."

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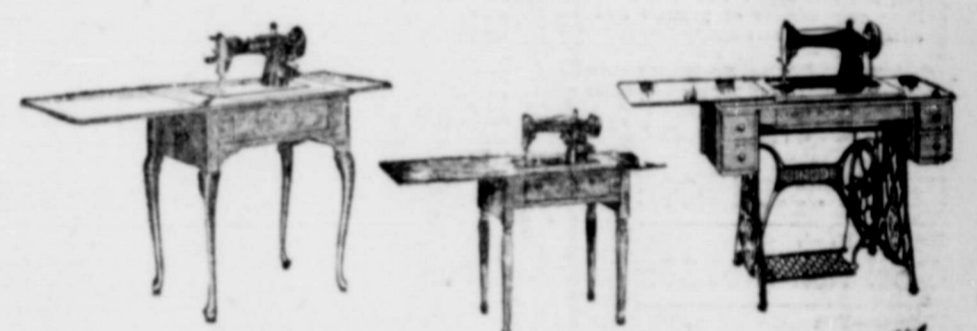

HANDY HOME HINTS

Something New For Chocolate Pudding

The next time your family clamors for chocolate pudding, try it with a colorful and tasty topper of whipped cream, tinted pink and lightly flavored with peppermint extract. The kids can add a few chocolate sprinkles for fun if they wish.

Coconut Cubes

Cake and bread leftovers can be made into something delicious. It's coconut cubes. Cut leftover cake and bread into 1 1/2-inch cubes. Roll in 1/2 cup maple-blended syrup, being sure to coat all sides. Then roll in 1/2 cup shredded coconut. You can tint the coconut if you desire. Place on greased baking sheet and bake in oven of your automatic gas range (375 degrees F) from eight to ten minutes. Re-

move at once from baking sheet. Makes about 18 coconut cubes. Serve with tea, or as a dessert accompaniment.

An Easy Dessert

Cake crumbs can be useful. For instance: combine one cup of cake crumbs with 1/4 cup chopped almonds, pecans or peanuts. Spread on a cookie sheet and toast for 10 minutes in a moderate oven of your gas range. Roll scoops of ice cream in the crumbs, and serve with fudge sauce.

Banana Shortcake Here's a snowy version of banana shortcake: split a pound cake into two layers. Place whipped cream and sliced bananas between layers and on the top. Sprinkle generously with chipped chocolate and chopped nuts, then cover with whipped cream. Chill in your refrigerator until serving time.

Loosening Glasses

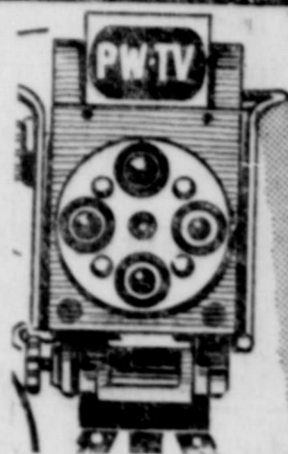
