

Cheaney Group Asks Court For New Highway

A committee of five men and one woman called on Eastland County Commissioners Monday morning to present a petition with approximately 200 signatures asking for an "assurance" from the court that work on the farm-to-market road to connect 570 and 571 will begin this year.

E. Blackwell, told the group, "We just want what we think is right for our county. We feel very strongly that we should have the assurance of this court that this road will not be sacrificed in order to appease other groups."

Charging that certain groups have fought the connection for money reasons, Blackwell said, "We realize you had an emergency and we are not opposed to the Staff road. We are not trying to take any road away from anybody."

Resident Engineer Gordon Smith told the group, "We (the State Highway Department) are going to build that road if you people will just bear with us. We always have planned to build the road and we still do."

The petition: "We, the undersigned, do hereby petition the Eastland County Commissioners Court to connect the farm-to-market roads numbers 570 to 571. It was our understanding that this link would be blacktopped with construction beginning in November 1954; however, due to the many rumors and misinformation being circulated, we feel very strongly that we should have the assurance of this court that this road will not be sacrificed in order to appease other groups."

"We understood the necessity of the new Staff road project and were cooperative; however, we feel justified in requesting the Court to declare its intentions at this time that work on said road will be started in November of this year and completed as soon thereafter as possible."

"This road is needed to serve the people of this area; it is also our school bus route and the mail route. It has long been approved as a part of the farm-to-market road program in our county. We feel with good reason that we have been very patient in this matter, and that the time has now arrived for a full understanding between the people who will be affected by this road and their representatives, the commissioners of their court."

Commissioners also approved the bond of Mack Gibson, new justice of the peace in Rising Star.

All commissioners were present and Judge John Hart presided.

Mr. Woods is survived by his wife of Ranger; one son, Pink B. Woods, Jr., of Spur; six brothers, H. O. Wash, Crockett, Henry and Morris, all of Ranger and John of Wichita Falls; and one sister, Mrs. Pink Stafford of Ranger.

Funeral services were held at the Cooper, V. V. Cooper, M. G. Jacoby, C. B. Osteen, Calvin Brown, and Luther Kirkpatrick Interment was in Pioneer Cemetery with Billingsworth Funeral Home in charge.

MARKET SURVEY STARTS NEW EXPANSION PROGRAM FOR RANGER INDUSTRIES

A program aimed at aiding the expansion of existing industries in Ranger is being launched by the Chamber of Commerce, according to R. V. Galloway, secretary. Heading the general activity will be C. B. Pruet, chairman of the Local Industrial Expansion committee.

The first step in the program will be to conduct a survey designed to locate potential markets for products which can be manufactured or processed in existing plants now located in Ranger. Work toward such a survey is expected to get underway this week. A Market Survey committee, appointed by J. F. Killingsworth, president of the Chamber of Commerce, will be composed of Morris Newnam, chairman, Wilson Guest and James W. Ratliff.

It was pointed out that emphasis will be placed on seeking outlets for Ranger-made products which can be produced in shops and plants already located here. After the survey is completed, other committees will be named to work under the general industrial expansion program. These will then work with plant owners and seek to obtain maximum production potentials, as well as assistance in plant expansion in event markets can be developed which may exceed present production capacity.

Five other projects are planned in District 23, of which Eastland County is a part. Stephens, Mills, Comanche, Lampasas and Brown counties each have one project scheduled.

The Stephens project calls for 12.5 miles of surfacing on Highway 67 from 5.6 miles northeast of Highway 180 near Breckenridge northeast to the Young County line.

In Mills county, 18 miles of surfacing on State Highway 16 is planned from the Comanche county line to Highway 84 near Goldthwaite.

Fifteen and five-tenths miles of surfacing on Highway 67 and 377 is planned in Comanche County. The project calls for construction from Comanche east to near the Erath County line.

In Lampasas County, 9.4 miles of surfacing from near Lampasas east to the Lampasas River is scheduled on Highway 190.

Brown County is scheduled to get 13 miles of re-surfacing on Highways 67 and 377 from Highway 84 east to Comanche County line.

A total of 87.8 miles on surfacing is planned, at a total estimated cost of \$3,606,000.

Little League Scores

In the first game of Monday night's double-header in Ranger's Little League play the Yankees outscored the Dodgers 11 to 9, in a game that saw the lead change several times.

Fans almost filled the baseball stands to capacity by the time the first game ended. The attendance was estimated to be the largest turnout so far this season.

Pitcher Ronnie Wynn of the Dodgers struck out eight Yankees in five innings, but issued ten walks, while he was nicked for 5 hits, one of which was a home run in first inning from the bat of Robert Ferguson, Yankee pitcher.

Two Yankee pitchers gave up five hits, but two of these were four-baggers off the bat of the Dodger pitcher. Four walks to Dodgers, coupled with five errors proved costly to the Yankees. Eight Dodgers were struck out by the two Yank moundmen.

In the second game of Little League play Monday night, the Indians fell to the league leading Giants in a contest which saw both teams battle gusty winds and dust as well as the opposing team.

Despite seven strike-outs by the Giants, and the fact that they were badly out-hit by the Indians, eight walks and four Indian errors enabled them to come out on top and cling to a perfect record in league play.

The Indians nicked Giant pitcher James Nelson for only one run in the first inning but almost needed the aid of the local fire department to retire the Giants.

Breeders Asked To Bring Panels To Calf Show

Breeders exhibiting animals at the one day creep fed registered beef calf show to be held at the Cisco Show Barn on the Albany Highway Friday, June 25, are asked to bring their own 8 foot by ten foot panels show officials explained today.

The panels are to be four foot high and made out of six inch rough boards. They suggest that the panels be brought in the day before and set up if at all possible.

No entry fees are required. It is not necessary to list or enter the animals prior to the show. The show will be unique in that the calves to be shown in pens of three of the same sex will not be halter broke or will they know how to lead and will come to the show direct, off of the range. All calves entered in competition must have been dropped after Sept. 25, 1953.

Since some of the calves will not have been weaned it will be a one day show starting at 9 a.m. and being through by 3 p.m. No cash prizes are to be given. The winners however will get ribbons furnished through the courtesy of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce.

Howard Turner is general show superintendent and Ed Huettis is Ground Superintendent. Both are from Cisco. Breeders in not only Eastland but also in adjoining counties are eligible to show their calves at the one day affair.

J. E. Pumphrey, Jr., prominent Harford Breeder of Old Glory, Tex., will judge entries.

The graduating class also included 84 seniors who were graduated with honors. Norman N. Richardson of R. 2, Eastland, received his MS degree in meteorology.

Grain Harvest Producing Good Yields In Area

Rains of several weeks ago are credited with a greatly improved small grain crop in Eastland and adjoining counties. With the harvest getting well underway there are estimated potential yields of 25 bushel per acre wheat and as high as 75-bushel per acre oats in this area.

Barring delays by reason unfavorable weather, the harvest should be in full swing by the middle of this week, according to grain buyers and farmers. Some of the earlier wheat and oats have come from Stephens county, but Monday saw the beginning of harvesting activities in the Staff community.

It is reported that most of the wheat is being trucked to Ft. Worth as rapidly as it is harvested. Very little wheat is being sold. Most of it is being placed in storage under a government loan. This is by reason of the fact that the current market is \$1.80 per bushel, while the government is making a top loan of \$2.15 per bushel.

The market price for oats is ranging from 60 to 65 cents per bushel.

Ranger College Issues Catalog For Next Year

The 1954 - 1955 catalog of the Ranger Junior College is off the press and now being distributed, according to Dr. Price R. Ashton, college president.

The 60-page catalog is being sent prospective students and carries the complete schedule of college plans for the next year. The fall semester will begin with enrollment on Sept. 6 and 7.

This year's catalog is bound with a purple velour cover, which is printed in white ink, thus effecting a display of the college colors in an attractive form. Dr. Ashton stated that comments regarding the catalog have been very favorable.

The Ranger College faculty is composed of 23 members. All courses to be offered by the college are outlined in detail in the new catalog and covers a wide range of preparatory subjects leading to degrees in 19 fields of study. Also listed are the names and home towns of the 350 students who were enrolled in the college during the 1953-1954 school year.

The catalog was produced in the commercial printing department of the Times Publishing Company.

I see that A. A. Smith in replying to my recent letter in The Ranger Times has taken me to task. He points out that colored men hold government jobs, have achieved high goals in science, and served in the armed forces, etc. That is all fitting and proper. He then raises the question, "Should we deprive these men of their freedom?" I do not recall of mentioning or suggesting such an idea. I merely pointed out that, "In my opinion the Negro imposing on the facilities of the white was unconstitutional." If Mr. Smith would look history, perhaps he would find that the Civil War gave the Negro his freedom and the right to vote. Mr. Smith appears to be laboring under a delusion that I would wish to take the Negro's rights away. That is far beyond my means and wishes to do.

He mentions a great colored scientist, George Washington Carver, and asks, "Is he to be considered as still a slave?" My reply to that question is he was no doubt a slave to his own idea or he would not have been as successful as he was. Mr. Smith says, "If we are going to keep our own country as a world leader, we must have complete freedom and equal rights for all citizens." I agree with Mr. Smith. I, too, stand for freedom and equal rights, but in my opinion these principles should be retained each within its own sphere. In other words, SEGREGATION, yes; DISCRIMINATION, no.

As for a colored funeral and wondering why supposedly certain racial prejudices, who are supposed to be Christians would have a separate heaven set up for the colored on Judgment Day, borders on the ridiculous and lies far beyond the means of mortals.

been given the highest value. Known as the Stone of Royalty, it was sought by kings and emperors for their crowns and as love tokens for beautiful princesses. In many lands, every large ruby became, automatically, the property of the ruler.

July's birthday list represents a variety of interests, talents and professions: author and Pulitzer Prize winner Ernest Hemingway, industrialist Henry Ford, and manager of the Yankee baseball champions, Casey Stengel. Also born in July were Simon Bolivar, South American liberator, and French authoress George Sand.

When cut cabochon — dome-shaped—the ruby will sometimes show a six-rayed star, similar to that in a star sapphire. The most desired color is a bluish red known as "pigeon blood," according to the Jewelry Industry Council. Rubies of the finest quality come from Burma. Other sources are Ceylon and Siam.

Combined with diamonds or colored stones, rubies make handsome clips, rings, earrings and necklaces. They are also used with diamonds in gold watch cases and at the terminals where the wrist bracelet joins the watch. The ruby has always been considered a masculine as well as a feminine gem and, because of its durability, is particularly appropriate for rings, cuff links, jeweled tie clips and studs.

Chickens Become Lazy During Hot Summer Months

COLLEGE STATION (Spl.) — Chickens become extra lazy during hot weather and they, like humans, seek summertime comfort. A chicken not only wants plenty of cool, fresh drinking water, but it wants it convenient. If a watering fountain is more than 10 feet away, a bird may go thirsty rather than make the trip, says E. D. Farnell, professor of poultry husbandry at Texas A&M College.

Farnell advises poultrymen to survey their equipment and its placement to make certain it is ample for summer weather. "Water is a cheap item round the farm, but when not provided in sufficient quantity, chickens just don't do well," he says. Sometimes it's necessary to give medicine in the drinking water. Some drugs do not taste good to the birds and may cause them to go off water. If it effects their drinking habits better find another way of giving the dose.

The professor sums it up this way. Unless they drink plenty of water this summer, there will be fewer eggs laid or less meat produced.

According to the Bureau of Supplies and Accounts sailors are currently draining the life out of an average of 50,000 pounds of coffee per day.

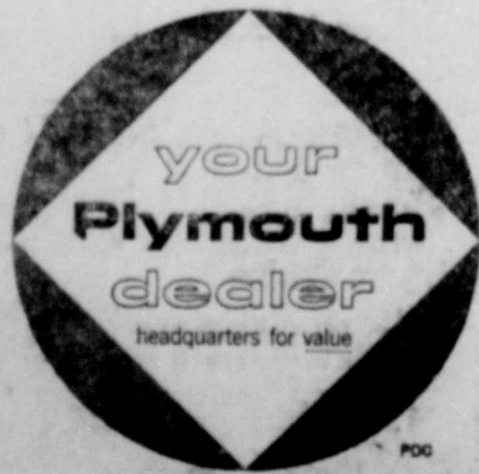

Present Outlook Good For Pecan Crop This Year

COLLEGE STATION (Spl.)—Texas' 1954 pecan crop probably will exceed the 10-year average.

A more accurate estimate of the forthcoming crop is hard to make because of the large number of trees either killed by drouth or seriously effected by drouth die-back, says John E. Hutchinson, extension horticulturist.

The 10-year average is roughly 30,000,000 pounds.

Here are the comments from growers over the state:

"Prospects in this area are spotted and range from fair to good," says Randolph Terrill of Seguin.

"Pecans look extremely good; very little damage so far," reports David Shelton of Gonzales.

Out-of-state prospects which also effect the Texas market sound about the same.
