Fewer than 20 members of the Eastland group of Alcoholics Anonymous attended the state convention of the organization in Fort Worth which ended last Sunday night. The Eastland group includes members in Eastland and Range.

One of the principal speakers at the closing day of the three-day convention was "Bill W." one of the co-founders of Alcoholics Anonymous. More than 1,000 members of the AA attended from throughout the state and 11 other states.

Alcoholics Anonymous is an organization in which members help themselves and others to overcome the habit of drinking alcohol and alcoholic beverages. A member of the group pointed out that a number of people are mistaken as to the membership of the organization which seeks to aid in the cure of drinking liquor. No member is solicited to join, but if a person wants to give up the drinking habit, he will be welcomed into the organization. A small percentage of the members are known as "hard core" due to years of excessive liquor drinking. Many of the members are young persons who wanted to fight off the habit before it was too late.

Most persons who gave up strong drink before they ruined their lives and their businesses.

Father's Day Cards Say Dad Can't Be Beat



FATHER'S DAY is Sunday, June 20. But Mom and the kids will be in Dad's corner whenever things get rough. So say the typical 1954 Father's Day cards pictured above. They've crowned Dad "the winner and still champ," and promise he'll be treated like one, too. At least, for 24 wonderful hours. Good 'ol Dad, needless to say, is a title-holder in more ways than one. He's tops as banker, teacher, built-in plumber and all around good sport—a rating that every Father's Day card he receives will confirm.

TWO PERSONS DIE IN AREA LAST MONTH; FINES LIGHT

The Texas Highway Patrol of the Abilene District in their duties of traffic supervision on the rural highways of the 13 county district investigated 87 motor vehicle traffic accidents during the month of May.

Captain G. L. Morahan, commanding officer of the district, reported that two persons died in the two fatal accidents in May, 35 persons were injured in 23 personal injury accidents and there were 62 property damage accidents. Damage in the 87 accidents amounted to \$50,038.50.

In comparing May of 1953 with May of 1954, nine fatalities were recorded in May of 1953, while only 2 were recorded in May of 1954. The first five months of 1953 22 persons were killed while during the five months of 1954, thirty-one have died in traffic accidents in the 13 county area. Taylor and Jones County each have recorded six deaths, Stephens five, Callahan four, Mitchell three, Scurry two, and Fisher Haskell, Nolan Shackelford and Stonewall have had one traffic death each, while none have been recorded in Treckmorton County.

Patrolmen stopped 1,487 traffic violators of which 1,096 were warned and 391 were cited to court. One hundred and eighty-three were charged with excessive speed, 20 with DWI, 20 for stop sign violations, 19 for improper passing and 15 were charged with defective headlight or tail light violation.

Patrolmen in the Abilene District traveled 48,550 miles and worked 3,158 day hours and 1,605 night hours for an average of 264 hours each for the month. Fines were paid by traffic violators to the following counties as follows: Callahan \$815.35; Eastland, \$252.00; Fisher, \$223.10; Haskell, \$305.50; Jones, \$411.00; Mitchell, \$448.00; Nolan, \$295.65; Scurry, \$562.00; Shackelford, \$258.00; Stephens, \$506.60; and Stonewall, \$58.50; Taylor, \$1, \$1,567.20 and Treckmorton none.

Swine Raisers Urged To Kill Parasite Lice

COLLEGE STATION (Spl.) — Hog prices are favorable and profits can be stretched further if producers will control the lice on their animals.

This parasite constantly irritates the hog, slows its rate of gain, and in turn, raises the producer's feed bill, explains E. M. Regenbrecht, extension swine husbandman. Lice also are a common spreader of Swine Pox.

Hog lice too often are taken for granted, but they can be easily controlled with DDT, chlordane, toxaphene or methoxychlor sprays at 0.5 percent concentration or with 0.06 percent lindane or gamma BHC. The latter two insecticides give best results, Regenbrecht adds.

Sows with suckling pigs should not be sprayed with any of these insecticides, the specialist precautions.

We Can Move Mountains In Jesus' Name

average Arab drinks twenty-five to thirty cups of coffee a day, roasting his coffee-beans at home pounding them in a mortar. He boils water in a long-handled pot called an "ibrik," (shown at left in illustration) toasty in the pulverized beans and lets the brew foam up three times, removing it from the heat each time. Then he serves it in tiny, egg-shaped cups called "andjans." Moving into Armenia, Syria and Turkey, we find the same type of coffee, but with powdered sugar added to taste. In all these countries, a pinch of saffron or cloves, or a few cardamom seeds, may be added before serving.

Need Sanitation And Insecticides For Fly Control

COLLEGE STATION (Spl.) — Only continuous sanitation and proper use of chemicals can hold fly populations to small numbers this season.

Neal M. Randolph, extension entomologist, says this is a critical time in fly control. The pests now are becoming established for the season. And this is the usual time for manure-hauling and general clean-up around the farm.

Sanitation—the removal of materials in which flies breed and develop—holds the real key to the control of these disease transmitting, and annoying insects.

The entomologist's advice to farmers who are willing to work at fly control includes these points: Haul manure, trash and rotting plant refuse to the fields and spread out to dry. Clean up around livestock feed bunks. Scraps feed lots to the concrete in paved lots and to the fresh earth if unpaved.

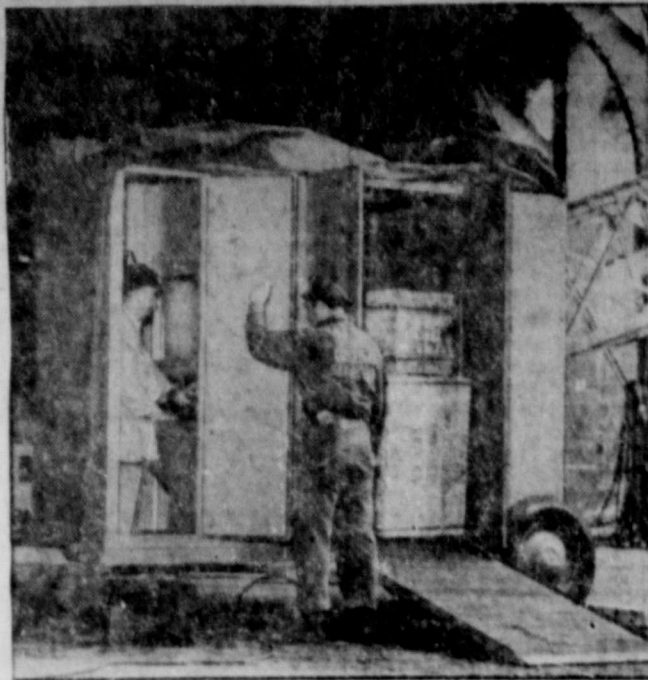
Keep a clean up campaign going the year-round, Randolph advises.

Many farmers do a good job of removing the obvious breeding places but they miss other important "hot-spots." Some of these are the corners of barn gutters, spilled feeds and other small accumulations of organic matter that may begin to decay.

This, together with insecticides, properly applied, will pave the way toward a neater, better-appearing farmstead and relief from the annoyance and health-hazard of flies.

Hens Need Help During Summer For Production

COLLEGE STATION (Spl.) — High temperature and low humidity are two of the greatest enemies of good egg quality.

With warm weather here again F. Z. Beamblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist warns poultrymen that unless extra precautions are taken the quality of their eggs will drop rapidly. For producers who sell eggs on a graded basis, a drop in quality brings lower prices. Sold ungraded, a drop in quality means decreased consumer demand.

Here are Beamblossom's summertime tips for top egg quality: Keep the eggs clean. Use clean, dry nesting materials and keep the birds confined on wet days to avoid mud-tracked nests.

Gather the eggs two or three times a day in a wire basket. This allows air to circulate, quickly carrying off the heat.

Store eggs in a cool, humid, but well ventilated place. And, market regularly and often.

Grade AA eggs will become inedible in three days at 98 degrees in eight days at 77 degrees and 45 days at 44 degrees. Eggs usually will remain Grade A for six months if held just above freezing.

Ramsey Seeking Re-Election As Lieutenant Gov.

With the increasing tempo of candidates and their campaigns for election to public office, subject to the action of the summer primaries, Lieutenant Governor Ben Ramsey, in seeking re-election is conducting a quiet campaign. He is basing his campaign on his faith in the voters and their desire to have competent men in public office.

His own words seem best to explain Ramsey's campaign attitude. "A man or woman doesn't buy a suit or dress without feeling the cloth and I don't think the people of Texas will select their officials without checking the record. That is all," Ramsey said, "that I ask."

His long-time friends and neighbors who know him intimately are his staunch supporters. In fact, when he became ill during his first campaign for Lieutenant Governor, the friends, many of whom had never participated in a political campaign, from the county and towns alike, came to his aid and carried on his campaign. He won by a wide margin of votes.

Perhaps the key to Ramsey's success as a legislator and public official is his studious approach to problems, his experience and respect among colleagues as a sound thinker.

Ramsey served eight years in the Senate and four years in the

House of Representatives. He was appointed as secretary of state by the late Governor Beauford Jester and continued under Governor Allan Shivers until he resigned to make the race for lieutenant governor.

The lieutenant governor had announced strengthened insurance laws "to weed out the few parasites" as one of the planks of his platform for re-election several months before headlines spotlighted certain insurance operations.

Ramsey, who doesn't have a vote in the Senate except in case of a tie, does head the Legislative Council and Legislative Budget Board. They are the research arms of the Legislature.

F. W. Pitzer of Breckenridge has plugged his No. 1-C Pitzer, wildcat seven miles northeast of Caddo in Section 8, Block 4, T&P Survey. Total depth was 3,983 ft.

Ernest Loyd of Ft. Worth has staked two new test projects in Palo Pinto County, both on the Mrs. Helen H. Johnson lease, 12 miles west of Graford and in H. McNelly Survey, A-329.

No. 2-D Johnson spots 1,620 feet south and 460 feet west of the northwest corner of CEIP&M Co. Survey. No. 3-E Johnson will be 2,330 feet south and 1,550 feet west of the same corner. Both projects are slated for 1,900 feet with rotary.
