



Remember when mother worked all morning preparing the picnic lunch and after putting the finishing touches to the bowl of potato salad just had time to grab her hat and rush breathlessly to the car?

Sometimes the work of preparing for these family outings takes all of the fun out of the picnic itself. Now, however, the sandwiches, salad, carrot sticks, strips of green pepper, celery—all of the time-consuming food items—can be prepared at her leisure even the day before and still be just as moist and tasty when taken out of the picnic basket, thanks to a new transparent food wrap made of saran. It enables mother to "beat the heat" and also avoid that last minute rush.

During the picnic the wrap serves as a protective, highly transparent cover as it clings to the edge of the tray or bowl so that bands or strings are unnecessary. It keeps foods appetizingly attractive and meets the challenge of insects or dust. Each person simply lifts a section of the saran, helps himself, and then tucks the material back again.

Potato salad, of course, is a traditional dish among picnic-going Americans, and a home-made, boiled salad dressing will make the dish even more flavorful.

Boiled Salad Dressing

cup sugar tablespoons flour tablespoon dry mustard teaspoon salt ta teaspoon pepper

is teaspoon paprika
3 eggs, or 6 yolks
4 cup vinegar
4 cup water
1 tablespoon butter

Mix dry materials together in top of double boiler or heavy saucepan.

deat eggs slightly; add water and vinegar, and blend into dry ingredients. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Remove from heat; add butter and cool before using. Makes about 1 pint.

It is best to cook the potatoes in their jackets; peel while warm and put the salad together in alternating layers of sliced potato, sait and pepper, minced onion, salad dressing and sliced, hard-cooked eggs. The warm potatoes take on the flavor as they cool. Garnish the top with egg slices and tuck leaf lettuce around the edge. Cover with the moisture-proof saran and let stand at least an hour before serving.



Good Judgment Means Safety When Driving

"Would you put on your best Sunday suit to go walking in the rain?"

€ol. E. B. Tilley of Houston, president of the Texas Safety As ciation, and Services Advisor for the Gulf Oil Corporation put this question to motorists today as he discussed the speed control pro gram which the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council are conducting during June.

"'Of course you wouldn't," he continued. "And you wouldn't think of serving yesterday's left-overs when the boss comes to dinner. There's a time and place for everything, and the sensible man fits his actions to the conditions in which he finds himself."

"A good driver always uses his head when he's behind the wheel," he said. "He doesn't travel at the same rate of speed when driving farsnow, rain or darkness as he does when driving on a bright, sunny day. And, when he's not feeling up to par, or when he knows his car is not in top condition, he drives slower than he does when both he and the car are in the pink. He also slows down on rough or narrow roads.

"Driving at a speed that's safe for conditions merely means using ordinary good judgment," Col.

Tilley said.
"Most of us pride ourselves on bur good judgment," he said, "and there's no more important place to exercise it than behind the wheel. It means the difference between safe driving and dangerous driv-ing. Let's keep it safe."






