## Citizens Help Lemonds Family Following Fire

The V. C. Lemonds family, which suffered a total loss of all personal and household possessions in an early morning fire on June 17, Wednesday moved into one of the Terry Place Apartments of the Ranger Low Rent Housing Authority on North Austin Street.

Ranger citizens were quick to respond to a call for assistance to the Lemonds family following their loss. Since the time of the fire, they have been residing with friends and relatives. Late Wednesday employees of the Lone Star Gas Company, where Lemonds has been employed for a number of years, began to move the large collection of clothing, furniture, dishes and other household items which had been donated to the Lemonds.

Tuesday night, the Ranger Volunteer Fire Department assisted in the collection of a number of donated items. A part of the donations had been stored at the Lone Star Warehouse in Ranger. Other items donated had not been collected, awaiting the location of a new place of residence for the family.

Donations have consisted of cash, and almost every kind of personal and household items which could be used. Every effort was made by the Times to determine the names of those who came to the aid of the Lemonds family, but it is possible that names of some parties who

## LARGE CROWD OF FANS WILL ATTEND GAME

Ranger's Little League baseball team, accompanied by parents, sponsors and fans will storm into Fort Worth Friday afternoon for "Ranger Night" at La Grave Field, when the Fort Worth Cats meet the Houston Buffs in a Texas League game.

The Little Leaguers, will be special guests of Spencer Harris, president of the Fort Worth Baseball Club.

Just before game time, two teams selected from the rosters of the Dodgers, Yankees, Giants and Indians, will take the field for a work-out under the direction of Al Vincent, manager of the Cats. These lucky players will sit in the Cat dug-out until the time they go on the field, and after the work-out will rejoin their team mates in the grandstand. All team members will wear uniforms to the game.

Reports this morning on ticket sales to the game indicate that a large crowd of both Little League and Cat fans will make the trip.

It is planned that Ranger people will assemble by 5:30 p.m. in Fort Worth, at the parking lot of Buddie's Super Market just beyond the traffic circle at Highway 80 enters Fort Worth. From that point the Ranger fans will move in a motorcade to La Grave Field. Arrangement are being made to obtain a police escort from the assembly point to the baseball field.

It was thought that traffic hazards would be avoided on the highway if the assembly point was in Fort Worth instead of the entire group leaving Ranger at one time. The Chamber of Commerce is providing "Ranger" arm bands for every person going to the ball (Continued on Page 7)

## RANGER NATIONAL GUARD UNIT LEAVES SUNDAY FOR TWO WEEK TRAINING CAMP AT FT. HOOD

Preparations for movement to North Fort Hood for intensive training from June 27 to July 11, are rapidly being completed at the Texas National Guard Armory in Ranger, M-Sgt. Jess Cole, said today.

The local unit, Service Battery 648th Armored Field Artillery Battalion of the 49th Armored Division, will leave Ranger at 7:30 a. m. Sunday and make the trip to Fort Hood by truck. Capt. Cecil C. Carr is commanding officer. A total of fifty-six enlisted men and three officers will go from here. The battery is not at full strength, Sgt. Cole said. All men are to report to the Armory by 7:20 a. m. Sunday, with departure scheduled for 10 minutes later.

The 49th Armored Division will undergo the heaviest tactical training in its history during the encampment at North Fort Hood. Convoy units of the 49th toward encampment will be on the march Sunday from various points in East, Central and parts of West Texas.

Major Gen. Albert Sidney Johnson of Dallas, division commander, said that the division's hardest training would take place July 5 to 8 when the entire organization will move to a field bivouac.

The most grueling events will be on July 6-8 when tankmen, infantrymen and artillerymen go through the Tank Infantry Combat Course, using live ammunition. The course demands the closest coordination between the three arms.

Brig. Gen. John W. Naylor of Fort Worth, assistant division commander, will be in charge of this phase of training. General Johnson said safety would receive heavier emphasis than ever before, in view of the arduous training schedule. A special safety program has been set up with safety officers designated in all units.

The division review will be held on July 5 at 10 a. m. with Gen. Allan Shivers heading the list of civilian and military dignitaries on the reviewing stand.

## Three Eastland County Players On Jacket Team

The advance issue of the 1954 football information booklet from Howard Payne College at Brownwood lists four Eastland County boys as members of the Yellow Jacket pre-season roster for 1954. Two of the players are from Cisco, and one each from Eastland and Ranger.

They are: Jack Browning, Ranger, a two-year letterman who will be a senior this year, and plays tackle; Larry Miller, Eastland, who will be a sophomore this fall, and who was a guard on the 1953 squad.

Douglas Johnson, a junior from Cisco, lettered last year at halfback; and Irvin Brunkenhoeft, also from Cisco, who will enroll as a sophomore, having been a member of last year's squad at the position of fullback.

The Jackets will open the 10-game season at Lake Charles, La., against McNeese College on Sept. 8. Five of the 1954 games will be played on their home field. The coaching staff is headed by Guy B. Garner, assisted by Jack H. Brewer and Bennie B. Williams.

## Over A Million Gallons Per Day Places Water Plant At Capacity

The current summer season has placed a capacity load on Ranger's water system.

Since June 15, water consumption in Ranger has reached an all-time record, exceeding by far any previous period in the history of the city. Les Crossley, City Manager, said today, that he did not believe records of the city would show the use of water had ever reached the present peak load since Ranger has owned the distribution system. Records of recent years do not approach the present rate of water use which now has the filtration plant operating at maximum capacity.

June 15, when 1,102,000 gallons of water left the city plant at Lake Haganam, set the all-time high for any single day. Since then there have been six days, five of them in succession, when Ranger has used more than a million gallons of water, according to the records of W. O. McMillan, pumper at the city plant.

The total amount of water which has been pumped from Lake Haganam, sent through the filtration system at the water plant, and into the mains of the city's distribution system since June 1, amounted to 20,092,000 gallons, through Tuesday. The day-by-day pumping records for the past nine days ending at 12:01 a. m. Thursday are as follows:

June 15	1,102,000 gallons

During the same period in the months of June, 1953, no single day's water use approached the million gallon mark. The lowest single day's use between June 15 and June 22 a year ago was 625,000 gallons and the highest 880,000 gallons. Prior to last week the last time the city used over a million gallons of water was June 2, 1953, when 1,001,000 gallons went through the lines. On that date the Municipal Swimming Pool at Willow Park was filled in a single 24-hour period, and this accounted for approximately 450,000 gallons. Prior to last year, and before the pool was opened to the public this year, it had been filled partly each day for a period of several days.

The water level at the lake is about equal to or perhaps slightly above that of last year. On May 31, 1953, it was 14.8 feet at the spillway, while on May 31, 1954, it was standing at 17.5 feet. Daily records are not kept on the water level at the lake, but are checked following rains and at the end of each month.

City Manager Crossley said that present indications do not point toward water rationing soon, and reminded citizens that there was no water rationing in Ranger last year.

The first time city records show Ranger used over a million gallons was on July 25, 1952, when the total was 1,006,000 gallons. At 3 p.m. Wednesday, water was leaving the filtration plant at a rate of 710 gallons per minute under 135 pounds pressure. McMillan said the plant has a pumping capacity in excess of 800 gallons per minute, but that the capacity of the present filtration plant would not produce that much treated water. Water can be pumped from the lake faster than it can go through the filtration process.

Even with a peak load on the distribution system all water is being fully treated before it leaves the plant. Extra care is exercised to see that no partially treated water enters the main line from the plant to the city.

It was also pointed out that the filtration capacity is greatly increased now as compared to a year (Continued on Page 2)

## Firemen Burn Grass To Cut Fire Hazards

During the bi-weekly drill meeting, Ranger Volunteer Fire Department members Tuesday eliminated fire hazards by burning weeds and grass from several blocks of vacant property on South Hook street and vicinity.

Virge Johnson, Volunteer Fire Chief, said the department members plan to devote a part of each meeting night during the next month to the burning of vacant lots to remove the danger of grass fires. The regular meeting nights are the second and fourth Tuesdays in each month.

Within the past 10 days the department has answered several calls on the grass fires, none of which have resulted in property damage, but all have been potentially dangerous to property in the immediate area of the fire.

The latest alarm was Wednesday afternoon shortly before 6 o'clock, when a grass fire was extinguished on vacant lots in the 700 block on Spring Road.

The Municipal Golf Course at Willow Park will be re-opened within a few days, as a result of action taken by the Ranger City Commission Tuesday night. The Commissioners entered into an agreement with Corle Pierce to operate the miniature course on a percentage basis, and to open the course to the public as soon as it could be put in readiness for playing.

The course has not been operated this season and has been closed since July 19 of last year. Under the new arrangement the city will receive 40 per cent of the gross receipts.

## Ranger Jaycees Start Publicity Drive On Rodeo

An advertising campaign to publicize the Ninth Annual Ranger Jaycee Rodeo, July 21-22-23-24, began in earnest this week. Multi-colored placards appeared in Ranger stores and shops, and automobile bumper stickers were beginning to make their appearances about Ranger.

Morris Campbell, president of the Jaycees, said that an intensive campaign, which will later include motorcades into the surrounding area are being planned.

Jaycee members are taking advantage of the Little League trip to "Ranger Night" at Fort Worth Friday, to give further advertising to the rodeo which will open with a purse of \$2,900 plus entry fees.

Members of the rodeo advertising committee today urged all Ranger citizens to place bumper stickers on their automobiles. This committee is composed of Pat Henderson, James Townsend, Dick Henderson, Seldon Brown and Richard West.

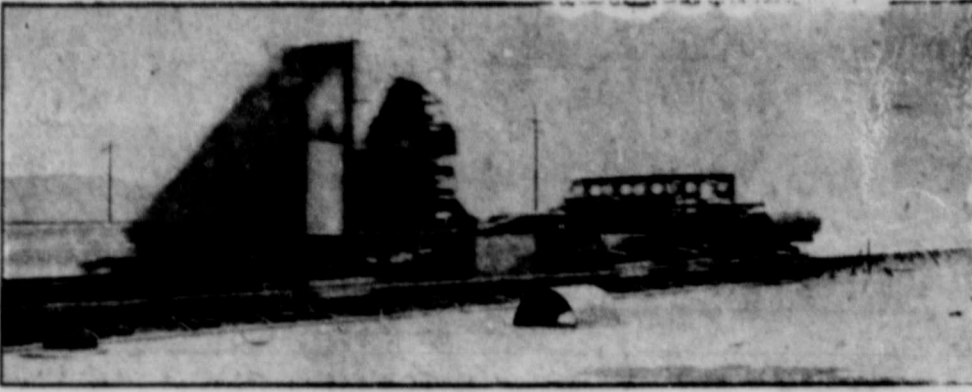
Now, I ask you how can I be expected to keep up with the fishing news if folks don't tell me what goes on.

Stapp, at a record-breaking trip ground speed of 421 miles per hour at Holloman Air Development Center near Alamogordo, N. M. The Northrup-built device, nicknamed "Engine No. 1, Volunteer Fire Department," is being used to study effects encountered by crews of jet planes during supersonic bailouts. When equipped with 12 rockets, the device is expected to attain a speed of 1800 miles an hour, and simulate conditions which a pilot would face at approximately 1800 miles per hour at a 40,000-foot altitude.

 ags, as it was completely cleaned and re-worked during a low period of consumption less than a year ago.

Crossley explained that due to the heavy demand upon the water distribution system within the city limits, it was necessary to maintain a higher pressure than normal, resulting in numerous breaks in old lines within the past few days.

There is a booster pump on the main 8-inch line between the plant and the city distribution system, with a capacity of 222 pounds pressure, as well as three smaller booster pumps located in the Ghelston addition, on Highway 80 east and in Mount View Addition. These are kept in operation in an effort to maintain adequate water pressure throughout Ranger.

Once the city begins to get its supply of water from the new Eastland County Lake, the volume of water use is not expected to be a problem. The line to the city from the filtration plant for the new lake will carry more than twice the capacity of the present line from Lake Haganagan. The line leading to Ranger from the new filtration plant has already been connected to the city system, and this is filled with water from the

benefit source of supply. The line is closed at the new filtration plant with a gate valve and the city is serving customers along this line. The largest customer is the Premier Oil and Refining Company, which began buying its water from the city on November 7, 1953.

Crossley said everything is in readiness to begin taking water from the new lake on Leon River just as soon as it reaches a level from which engineers will think it safe to begin using.

An interesting fact revealed by the City Manager was the daily average of water use in Ranger for a five year period prior to 1951. This amounted to only 450,000 gallons per day for the five years.

## Deadline For Filing For '55 New Grower Wheat Acreage Set

June 30 is the final date for filing applications for a 1955 "new grower" wheat allotment, Emmett E. Powell, county office manager of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office announced today.

Powell said producers on farms on which no wheat was seeded for grain in any of the years 1952, '53 and '54 may apply for a new farm allotment, if what is to be seeded in 1955. A producer must meet all of the following requirements to be eligible for a 1955 new grower wheat allotment, he said:

- (1) The farm operator will not have an interest in any other farm for which a 1955 wheat acreage allotment will be determined.
- (2) The applicant is largely dependent on the farm for his livelihood.
- (3) The land for which the allotment is requested must be well suited to wheat production.
- (4) The applicant establishes to

the satisfaction of the county committee—composed of E. E. Blackwell, J. R. Webb and Ed Townsend—that the system of farming has changed to the extent that wheat rather than other small grain should be included in the rotation system for 1955.

(5) An application must be filed not later than June 30.

Powell also pointed out that it will soon be time to measure cotton and peanuts. It will be necessary to measure each farm that has a cotton or peanut allotment, he said.

The ASC chief said it will be necessary that the producer go with the reporter to measure the crops so that he can show the reporter where crops are planted.

A re-check fee of \$3 for the first plot plus \$1 for each additional plot will be made for re-checking destroyed cotton and peanuts, he said. Producers will have 15 days to destroy excess cotton acreage.

Any producer who remains overplanted on cotton will not be eligible for price support, nor ACP cost sharing and in addition there will be a penalty on the excess production, Powell warned producers.

"Many producers are now placing their wheat under a commodity loan," he said. "Eastland County is not approved for grain storage, but producers are hauling wheat to Brownwood, Fort Worth and Moran. Be sure to contact the dealer before you haul the wheat. We are now making listing sheets for 1955 wheat allotments. There will be a Wheat Marketing Quota Referendum held July 23. More information regarding voting boxes and hours of voting will be issued later."

The yellow color in beef fat is not necessarily a sign of poor quality meat. The yellow color is due to the presence of carotene, an important source of vitamin A. Green pasture grasses and legumes contain a considerable quantity of carotene. So-called "grass-fed" beef is more commonly identified by the yellow fat it yields.

The number of cattle and calves slaughtered in Texas for the first four of 1954 is higher than for the same period in 1953 while hog slaughter was down.

### Easy Cooking With Stuffed Onions

Flavorful, prepared foods graced the dinner table in Old Mexico hundreds of years before the discovery of the New World, and the ancient Aztec cooks have passed down many delightful recipes.

In their continuing search for a variety of easily prepared meals that are somewhat different, the American homemaker has begun to turn to foods with a Mexican background. The subtle tasty blending of seasonings and common meats and vegetables that can only be found in recipes with a Mexican background is one of the main reasons behind this new interest.

One of the most popular recipes is for Chili Stuffed Onions. This dish is exceptionally easy to prepare and keeps cooking and dishwashing time down to a minimum.

#### CHILI STUFFED ONIONS

2 cans chili con carne with beans  
1/2 cup diced green peppers  
6 large onions peeled  
2 eggs  
1/2 teaspoon white pepper  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 1/2 teaspoon black pepper  
2 tablespoons flour  
1/4 cup raw onion slivers

Saute the diced green peppers until soft, add to the chili mixture and set to simmer. Boil six onions until barely tender. Scoop out centers (this can best be done by placing the onion in a muffin tin or a cup while scooping). Beat the eggs slightly, blend in the salt, black pepper and flour. Dip the onions into the egg mixture and fry in deep fat, 375 degrees F., until they are golden brown. Ladle chili mixture into the fried onions, and sprinkle with raw onion slivers and white pepper.

Serve these chili stuffed onions hot, on a plate garnished with either sweet or hot pepper slices.

If your family likes their chili more spicy than usual, add to the chili mixture 2 teaspoons chili powder, 1 teaspoon hot sauce and a pinch of cayenne pepper. These chili stuffed onions will fit perfectly into spring menu planning, and can be served as a main dish meal or on the side. Try them soon and watch the smiles of appreciation when that first bite is tasted.

### Slow Down and Live' Campaign Of Safety Groups Saving Lives

Figures from the 24 states participating in the 1954 summertime highway safety campaign, "Slow Down and Live," show a reduction of 16 percent in traffic deaths for this Memorial Day weekend as compared with the same holiday last year.

Highway deaths in the region, which includes every state from Main to Texas, totaled 165 this year, on the basis of incomplete reports. Last year's figure was 196.

The reduction, according to J. O. Musiek, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association, which is sponsoring the program in Texas in cooperation with the Texas Department of Public Safety,

came in the face of a near-record death toll for the nation as a whole. Musiek, who is coordinating the project in Texas, also pointed out that this Memorial Day weekend covered a full three days. Last year's was listed officially as a two day holiday.

Fourteen of the participating states showed decreases in the numbers of deaths this year. They were Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, West-Virginia, Virginia, Maryland, New Jersey, New York and Rhode Island.

Two states, Georgia and New Hampshire, held even with the toll of a year ago, while the eight states of Kentucky, Louisiana, Connecticut, Delaware, Maine, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania and Vermont reported increases.

In announcing the holiday figures, Musiek said: "This is a heartening start for our 1954 'Slow Down and Live' project, which will extend through Labor Day. State, county and local officials in the area from Maine to Texas will redouble their efforts to continue this trend throughout the summer vacation period."

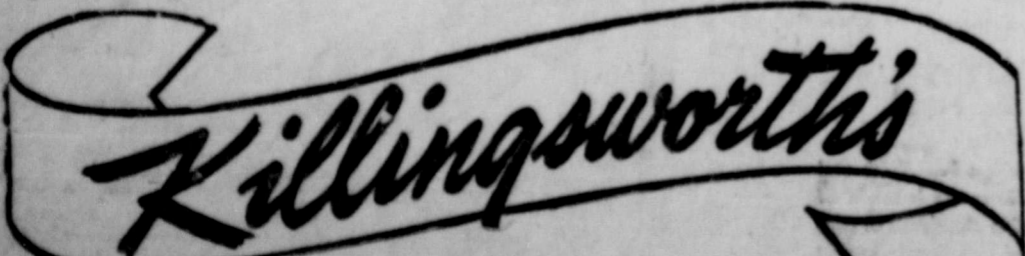

**Extra Care Needed Now For Poultry**

Poultry and livestock needs extra care during the summer months, warns Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian.

Farm animals lose body moisture more rapidly at this time of year and such losses hit the producer as a loss of weight, drop in milk production or drop in egg production.

Water, and lots of it, can help prevent these unprofitable summer conditions. A cool, continuous water supply for all animals is especially pertinent now, Dr. Patterson says.

Adequate, ventilated shade takes a high priority. Air must circulate freely through the shaded areas to carry away body heat and moisture.

Supply feed according to need. Breeding, dairy and work animals should remain in a thirity, but not fat, condition.

Salt is essential in the regulation of body heat and should be

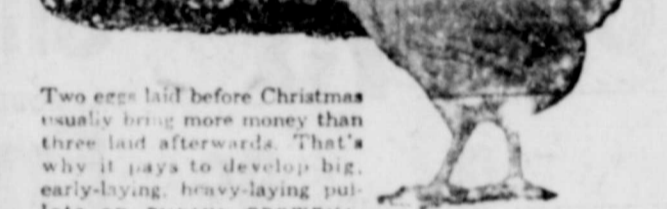
